Wounded Warriors is one of the charities that our Club has supported throughout the years. I want to assure everyone that our Club has never made donations to the Wounded Warrior Project. All of our donations have gone directly to the Camp LeJune Marine Corps Wounded Warriors Battalion.

Once again this year we will be awarding (2) \$1000 college scholarships to the child, grandchild or great grandchild of a Club member in good standing for 3 consecutive years.

During February we will be distributing/mailing raffle tickets for the National NYCPD 10-13 Organization's **Mega Prize** fundraiser, along with information about the National's 27th Annual Convention. (See page 14 for information about the convention).

Only 400 raffles will be entered in the drawing. (Last year one of our members won the grand prize of \$10,000).

Please support the National our Club and buy/sell your raffle ticket. Proceeds from the raffle help keep the yearly dues we pay to the National at \$1 per member. It also allows the National to continue to participate federally and locally in seeking legislation that protects and/or enhances our retiree benefits and helps fund three \$1,000 National Scholarships.

To sponsor a participant in the National scholarship you must be a member in good standing for two consecutive years and to participate in our Club's two \$1,000 scholarships, a sponsor must be in good standing for three consecutive years. (See pgs. 7 & 8 for applications for both scholarships).

Denver Defense Firing Range, 1417 Hwy 16 North, Denver, NC 28037 **Telephone:** (704) 489-1000 has agreed to conduct an HR 218 qualification class for our Club members.

Cost of the class will be \$50 per person (**paid in cash**). They will provide goggles & ear protection for those who do not have them and the price will include the use of the classroom, range, and targets.

Each person will need their gun, holster, flashlight and 100 rounds of ammunition.

They will sell ammunition at a special rate for Club member who need it. .40-\$15 per box, 9MM- \$ per box, .45- \$19 per box, .380- \$15, .38- \$14

Each person will need to go online and fill out the state form beforehand so that the range officer will only have to sign and fill out his part of the form. You can access the form at: <u>http://www.ncdoj.gov/getdoc/76cf2a48-988b-4432-baec-36ea82e9cb25/F-9R-8-09.aspx</u>

There will be classroom time from 0900 to 1300, then qualification. Qualification will be day/night, and combat.

Depending on the number of people wanting to shoot more than one handgun, and those having trouble qualifying you may be able to qualify with an additional gun. If you do there will be no additional cost except for the ammunition.

So that they can adequately pay their class instructor and their range safety officers they are hoping to have 18 people qualify per session.

The first available date is Sunday Feb. 7, which is Super bowl Sunday. They assured me that qualifications will be completed in plenty of time to watch the game.

If there is not enough response for Feb. 7 the next available date will Feb. 28.

Please let me know ASAP if you plan to attend the Feb 7 class and if there is an inadequate response for that date, if you will be able to attend on Feb. 28. (As of now it does not appear that we will have people for the Feb. 7 class).

I am happy to report that VA Governor McAuliffe agreed to reverse the concealed carry decision that was due to take affect on Feb. 1, 2016. Virginia will now allow gun owners from other states to carry in the commonwealth.

Please tell them all we appreciated it and had a great time!





RETIRED MEMBER OPTICAL BENEFIT

Optical benefit for retirees offers **both** a voucher system and an enhanced option with Davis Vision (details regarding the Davis Vision coverage are provided below). Optical exams and glasses are provided through a network of various vendors.

BENEFIT OVERVIEW

I exams and glasses are provided through a network of various vendors. Your optical voucher may be used at any of the participating providers listed. Co-payments and available products vary with participating providers.

HOW TO CLAIM BENEFIT

Retired members and spouses are entitled to an optical benefit every two years by calendar year (benefit is available each change of the second year; a full two years is **not** required to pass between benefit distributions) and <u>eligible dependents</u> are entitled to an an-

nual optical benefit by calendar year.

To claim the optical benefit, call the SOC Health and Welfare Fund Office at 212.964.7500 to request an optical voucher. A separate voucher is issued for each family member for whom a voucher is requested. The voucher(s) will be mailed to the member along with a listing of participating providers.

If there are no participating providers in your area you may have services provided by an optometrist of your choice and submit the optical voucher along with the paid itemized bill for reimbursement. Reimbursement for the retiree optical benefit is a combined benefit for an examination and glasses. The total cash value of the optical voucher is \$40.

Vouchers are valid for six (6) weeks. If a voucher **expires unused**, the member may mail back the original and indicate that he/she wishes the voucher to be reissued. If the **voucher is lost**, a request for a new voucher must be received **in writing** either by mail or by fax: 212-406-3105.

NEW "DAVIS VISION" OPTICAL COVERAGE FOR RETIREES

The Superior Officers Council Retiree Health Benefits Fund is pleased to announce an enhancement to our vision care benefits effective January 1, 2011. In an effort to provide our retirees with the greatest possible value while significantly enhancing our vision care benefit, the trustees have elected to add Davis Vision as one of our vision care providers.

Vision benefits provided by Davis Vision will be provided as an in-network only benefit whereby an eye examination, frames/lenses or contacts lenses can be obtained at any of the available participating providers. If you choose to use Davis Vision for your optical benefit, you will not be required to obtain a vision voucher from the SOC Benefits office and can access your benefit directly from your provider of choice. You simply present the enclosed ID card and your electronic eligibility will appear on your provider's screen. It's that simple.

As part of the SOC Retiree Health Benefit Fund's commitment toward protecting confidentiality of your information, Davis Vision will no longer be using your social security number for identification. Instead they will be utilizing your Tax ID number for identification to access their optical benefit for you and your dependents. So, when scheduling appointments with a Davis Vision provider, please use your Tax ID number for enrollment verification to obtain vision care benefits.

Described below is a summary of Davis Vision's vendor benefits effective January 1, 2011 and enclosed are descriptive brochures as well as provider listings.

DAVIS VISION

The Davis Vision program being introduced to retirees effective January 1st closely mirrors the current active member program (basic copayments are applicable), and will feature an in-network benefit that offers the opportunity to obtain services for an eye examination with dilation, as professionally indicated, as well as obtain eyeglasses or contact lenses at fixed co-payments.

You now have the opportunity to select any frame from Davis Vision's exclusive "Collection". Independent providers have the exclusive "Collection" on display with over 200 frames to choose from in multiple sizes and colors. The "Collection" features three levels of frames: Fashion, Designer and Premier, with retail values of up to \$225. Approximately eight out of ten members take advantage of the tremendous savings by selecting a Davis Vision "Collection" frame.

In addition, spectacle lenses are offered in glass or plastic, and in any range of prescription (single vision, bifocal, and trifocal) at a basic co-payment. All of the most popular lens options (Progressive Lenses, Scratch Protection, Anti-Reflective Coating, High-Index Ultra-Thin Lenses and many others) that typically result in large out-of-pocket expenses have been included in the program at fixed significantly discounted prices. Dear Sergeants,

I am writing to update you on the appeals argument that was heard yesterday on the SBA's motion to void the City's bias based profiling law. That law is targeted squarely at the hard-working men and women officers of the NYPD.

What's at stake is the validity of a 2013 law which prohibits "bias based profiling," and allows for lawsuits directly against NYPD officers. Bias based profiling is described as making a stop where the "determinative factor" in making the stop is based on *actual or perceived race, national origin, color, creed, age, alienage or citizenship status, gender, sexual orientation, disability, or housing status.* Anybody who is stopped by an officer can sue the officer in State Court or before the City Commission on Human Rights. The plaintiff can get attorney's fees, injunctive relief, and, basically the opportunity to screw with the officer's career. (Sadly, there are already a number of lawsuits brought against officers under the law.)

The law was vetoed by Mayor Bloomberg, but passed by the City Council over Mayor Bloomberg's veto. After the election, Mayor de Blasio reversed the City's position, and joined the City Council in supporting the law. After the Mayor switched sides, the lower court upheld the law over our objection, and the objection of the PBA, and we both appealed.

We argued to the appellate court that the City Council and Mayor do not have the jurisdiction to pass a law that affects police procedure, like stop and frisk, because the State already has legislated in the area -- the State Criminal Procedure Law already specifically addresses "stop and frisk." Therefore, the City law must be pre-empted and voided because there's a "superior" State law on the same subject matter, and the City Council law conflicts with the existing State law. The State law, by the way, does not create a new cause of action against a police officer, does not establish a "determinative factor" test, and does not have the same long and vague list of protected characteristics that an officer has to consider in making a stop.

I have since been informed that the SBA made a strong argument, and we are hoping that the Court will see it our way. A decision is expected in the next 45 or so days. I will continue to keep you updated as this case progresses.

Member, spouse and eligible dependents are entitled to an eye exam and eye glasses every 12 months.

Effective January 1, 2010 two vision vendors are available for retirees who reside in New York or New Jersey, Vision Screening and Davis Vision. Vision Screening will provide a vision exam, frames/lenses or contacts at no charge in New York State and for a \$15 co-payment in New Jersey. Davis Vision will provide a vision exam, frames/lenses or contacts for a \$25 co-payment in New York State.

For out of state (non-New York) retirees, Davis Vision is the sole vendor and will provide an exam, frames/lenses or contacts for a \$67 co-payment (\$25 basic eyewear + \$42 basic exam). You may choose from the selection of Davis Vision "Designer" frames at any participating Davis Vision provider. Should you wish to upgrade your frames to Davis Vision's "Premier" frame selection, you may do so for an additional \$25.

As of January 1, 2010 optical certificates are no longer required as eligibility is maintained by both Vision Screening and Davis Vision. Appointments can be scheduled directly at the participating provider's office by providing your DEA unique ID number.

Lastly, in addition to the elimination of the vision voucher requirement, the new retiree vision benefit replaces the previous \$32.50 eye examination/eye glass benefit and \$10 examination only benefit, effective January 1, 2010.

Enhanced vision benefits for PBA members

The PBA Health & Welfare Fund's new four-year agreement with Davis Vision will result in enhanced benefits at no additional cost to PBA members.

Vision Plan

The PBA Health and Welfare Fund Vision Plan provides coverage for periodic eye examinations and prescription eyewear through a contract with Davis Vision.

In-Network Benefits Provided

The Plan provides one (1) comprehensive eve examination per twelve (12) month period and one (1) set of prescription evewear (choice of eyeglasses or contact lenses) per twelve (12) month period to members and their eligible dependents when obtained using a Davis Vision Network Provider.



SUBJECT: Fraternal Order of Police Confirms Compromise of Website - TLP: AMBER

The Fraternal Order of Police (FOP) confirmed the compromise of their website on or before January 27, 2016, and the associated data has been posted online by the known malicious cyber threat actor, Cthulhu. The FBI is currently investigating this compromise. The FOP has stated that they will try to notify all members whose information was taken in the breach.

FOP is a fraternal organization consisting of sworn law enforcement officers and has a reported membership of over 325,000 members. In several communities a local lodge of the FOP also serves as the bargaining unit for law enforcement officers. While many law enforcement officers in your state or community are members of the FOP, not all law enforcement officers are FOP members.

MS-ISAC has obtained and examined a copy of the compromised data, totaling over 626,000 records. The data includes database records of members, contracts and collective bargaining agreements for over 1,000 law enforcement agencies, and internal forum postings. Many but not all of the member records included a combination of usernames, passwords, addresses, dates of birth, phone numbers, and email addresses. The data was posted online by a known malicious cyber threat actor named Cthulhu and is also possibly posted elsewhere. MS-ISAC is aware of some portions of the data being posted to sites such as Pastebin.

It has been reported that the data was given to Cthulhu by a third party. Cthulhu claims to have 18 terabytes of data related to law enforcement, although only a small percentage of that was made available through the FOP release. It is likely that not all of the 18 terabytes of information was obtained from the FOP and may indicate that Cthulhu has obtained information breached from additional law enforcement entities or is exaggerating. Of note, Cthulhu does not honor takedown requests.

MS-ISAC is currently parsing the compromised data based on the member's state. This information, parsed to include only your state's information and excluding personally identifiable information (PII) and passwords, is available to each state and/or primary state fusion center. States and primary state fusion centers may contact MS-ISAC, in writing at <u>SOC@cisecurity.org</u>, to receive this information.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

Names, addresses, and dates of birth may be used by malicious actors to conduct financial fraud, while victims often reuse usernames and passwords across multiple websites and this information may be exploited to gain access to additional user accounts. Email addresses may also be exploited as targets in phishing campaigns. In the unlikely event that a specific law enforcement agency is the target of a hacktivist campaign, such information may also be used to target individuals with doxing (the public release of personal information) and other forms of harassment. MS-ISAC recommends that anyone who believes their data may have been compromised take the following actions:

- FOP members should immediately stop using their FOP password and change the password on any business/personal accounts in which that password is reused. - FOP members should monitor their credit reports, financial, and tax statements for any unusual activity.
- FOP members should take steps to secure/remove information about themselves and their family online, which could be used to draw connections with the compromised data to more effectively target victims with malicious activity.

We perform a variety of free incident response services including log analysis, malware analysis, computer forensics, and can assist with the development of a mitigation and recovery strategy.

Doctor: 'No Cure' for Afflicted First-Responders

Dust Be Their Destiny: Growing Signs WTC Residue Caused Nerve Damage

When a doctor examines a survivor of the Sept. 11 attacks, she's likely to ask a certain set of questions. She's looking for the telltale afflictions triggered by the toxic dust of the World Trade Center.

Lung disease, stomach com-plaints, sinus problems and post-traumatic stress syndrome are common, particularly among first-responders who spent weeks downtown after 9/11.

But a few years ago Marc Wilkenfeld, the chief of occupational and environmental medicine at Winthrop University Hospital in Mineola, began observing another set of symptoms.

'Heard the Same Stories'

Dr. Wilkenfeld has treated hundreds of World Trade Center patients, and continues to see about 20 a week. He became alarmed when many began reporting a "terrible numbness" in their hands and feet. Their extremities would tingle or cause them pain. Something was clearly affecting their nerves.

"It's amazing how you start to hear the same stories," Dr. Wilkenfeld said in an interview last week. More than one patient's hand went so numb that he dropped a coffee cup.

Dr. Wilkenfeld worked with Mark Stecker, the hospital's chair of neuroscience, who had done previous studies testing how the nerves of rats reacted to various substances. The two obtained some dust from the Trade Center and gave it the same treatment. The results supported what they were seeing in their patients: the rats' nerves were damaged.

On Jan. 15, Drs. Wilkenfeld and Stecker announced they'd found further evidence that this type of nerve damage was a problem for Sept. 11 survivors. They surveyed 255 people, half of whom had been exposed to the Trade Center dust.

Those patients were 15 times more likely to have severe symptoms of neuropathy than the unexposed people.

'Your Feet Feel Dead'

"It's numbness; it's tingling; your feet feel like they're dead. I have it all the way up to my calf in both legs," said John Coughlin. "I can't stand for any length of time."

A retired Police Officer, assigned to the Emergency Services Unit, Mr. Coughlin work-ed in recovery after the attacks. At 57, he is managing a litany of illnesses, from heart disease and diminished lung capacity to sinusitis, chronic acid reflux, sleep apnea, stomach problems and PTSD. He recently had open-heart bypass surgery.

The numbness and ting-ling in his feet began years ago. Now he's starting to get it in his fingers.

With his neuropathy, Mr. Coughlin must be extremely careful when he walks. With little feeling in his feet, he could stub a toe or step on something sharp and not realize it. Because the nerves are damaged, wounds can be slow to heal.

'Can't Walk Barefoot'

"I can't walk barefoot," he said. "I'm always afraid that I'll trip or something-forget about it."

The most recent Winthrop study provides further evidence that it is Sept. 11 dust that triggers symptoms like Mr. Coughlin's. Those who were most exposed to the dust reported the strongest symptoms. And the correlation was marked. Diabetics are long known to have higher rates of neuropathy, but in the Winthrop study, World Trade Center patients had much higher rates than a population of Type 1 diabetics.

Financially Squeezed

But his monthly income takes a hit from child support, the result of a divorce that Mr. Coughlin said was influenced by his PTSD. And the medical costs for his heart and nerve disease are adding up.

That's because neither ailment is covered under the Zadroga Act. Though Mr. Coughlin has decent insurance as an NYPD retiree, his co-pays for neuropathy treatment are a burden. He must see a podiatrist every couple of months, and has regular electrical conduction tests. He also takes monthly medication for the condition.

"I have medical bills outstanding in the thousands right now that I have to keep putting off because I can't afford to pay it," he said. The retired officer's other ailments are eligible for free medical care under the Zadroga Act, which also compensates victims for out-of-pocket costs. It was recently renewed for 75 years.

Neuropathy is being considered for Zadroga coverage, but scientists must conduct a formal peer review before any new illness is added. Dr. Wilkenfeld believes neuropathy should be covered. The Federal program included cancer for the first time in 2012, after a long battle by advocates. At first, government officials said there wasn't enough evidence to prove the link, but studies similar to the Winthrop one helped tip the scales.

'A Horrible Disease'

Dr. Wilkenfeld hopes that his peers begin to check for signs of neuropathy when they treat 9/11 responders and survivors. The condition has no cure, he said, and is progressive in most cases—that is, it gets worse over time.

"It's a very disabling and painful disease," he said. "When you hear people describe it, it's horrible."

<u>Radon</u>

Do you know about radon? Radon is a gas you can't see, taste or smell but may be a problem in your home. Radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer.

Radon (<u>http://www.epa.gov/radon</u>) could be a problem in your home, but it's a problem you can fix. The radioactive gas comes from the breakdown of uranium in soil, rock, and water and gets into the air you breathe. You can't see, smell, or taste it. The two main sources of radon in your home are water and soil.

Radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer in the U.S. Living below ground level in a basement apartment or below the third floor of a dwelling may put you at a higher risk for lung cancer because of greater exposure to radon in the soil. To find out the level of radon in your home, get it tested. You can do it yourself by purchasing a test kit online from the National Radon Hotline (<u>http://sosradon.org/</u><u>test-kits</u>) (operated by Kansas State University in partnership with the EPA) or by phone at 1-800-767-7236. You can also get a professional to come in and test your home. UNDERSTANDING THE NYPD 20-YEAR REVIEW OF CANCER

Recently, the eagerly awaited NYPD Medical Division's 20-year review of cancer within the Department, was published comparing the periods before and after the 9/11/01 WTC disaster. Our team of co-authors include highly regarded cancer and radiation epidemiologists and bio-statisticians from the Weill-Cornell Medical College and Columbia University/NY-Presbyterian Medical Center and its Mailman School of Public Health.

Our report **on cancer data among** the largest WTC responder group, appears in the October 2015 edition of the Journal of Occupational and Environmental Medicine, a noted scientific journal geared toward physicians and scientific researchers, the findings of which have been widely circulated in the media. We thought it prudent to explain the study findings in lay terminology, so that everyone can better understand its implications.

Our study—the largest cancer study ever of police officers—reviewed the records of nearly 40,000 MOS, who were employed on 9/11/01 as active duty officers, and followed their cancer rates through 2014, noting every cancer diagnosis reported, along with their descriptive features. We <u>also followed all exposed retiree cancer rates</u> following their exposure in 2001.

Here's what we found:

NYPD

- There were 870 cancer diagnoses in 859 MOS (11 MOS had more than one cancer)
- About 56% of MOS with cancer served at Ground Zero in the first 24 hours, experiencing the debris cloud at its most intense, while 81% served there at some period thereafter
- · The majority of MOS with cancer (72%) were exposed less than 1000 hrs
- 16.5% of MOS with cancer were smokers, while 49% were non-smokers
- None of the cancer cases had any known toxic work-related exposures except WTC exposure
- Overall cancer rates in MOS increased about 1½ fold in the 2002–2014 period, compared to the 1995–2001 period, including common cancers such as colon, prostate, and female breast, which had also increased in the general population during this period
- NYPD cancer rates were lower than that of the general population—as was
 expected—due to a "Healthy Worker Effect," seen in populations of cops, firefighters
 and others, whose initial job entry requirements demanded physical fitness (an
 epidemiologic observation that appears to last a long time).

However, somewhat unexpectedly, we also found elevations in four cancer types that are not

particularly well known to the public, and have not been featured in screening campaigns like those mentioned above. These included:

- 1. Malignant brain tumors, which appear to have tripled in the post-exposure years
- 2. Kidney cancer, which also increased three-fold after 2001
- 3. Thyroid cancer, which approximately doubled since 2001
- 4. Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma, which increased about 1 ½ fold since 2001

What do these findings mean to researchers and how does it affect MOS?

As a matter of introduction, it might be helpful to review a few background points about epidemiologic studies such as this.

Investigative medical studies come in a variety of types, some looking at entire populations, or at specific groups within a population, such as steel workers, teachers, or police officers. They can be retrospective, reviewing historical medical records, or prospective, or forward-looking, at how a group exposed to a specific event such as the Japanese nuclear reactor leak, or the 9/11 WTC disaster, fares over a period of time thereafter.

Studies such as these are complex and must be designed to take into account a whole host of possible "red herrings" or "confounders," that can mislead one toward erroneous conclusions regarding event A causing effect B. Only after being subjected to sophisticated analysis, can determinations be made as to whether there exists any association between the two "factors."

In order for a study to be meaningful and to allow researchers to reach conclusions about cause or effect, or recommend one treatment over another, it makes a difference if there were 100 subjects versus 10,000 subjects in a study. Thus, the "power" of a study's conclusions depends upon the number of subjects in the study population.

In addition, the makeup of a study population is critical, in that comparisons must be made between similar subject groups—between apples and apples, not apples and oranges—in order to be meaningful, and must take into account demographics such as age, gender, ethnicity, and common backgrounds, such as similar baseline physical characteristics, training or exposure history. In this way, observed results coming out of a group or 'cohort' studied, can be deemed "statistically significant," or not.

Epidemiologists view the elevated rates of commonly recognized cancers such as some of those seen in our study with concern, but wonder whether cancers the public has become educated about are really increased, or only appear to be, due to the fact that more people have been getting screened, by colonoscopy or mammograms, and therefore represent a possible "red herring" or confounder known as "surveillance bias."

However, the four cancers we unexpectedly found increased—brain, kidney, thyroid, and lymphoma—do not appear to us to suffer significantly from such bias, as most of these cancers came to medical attention through symptoms, and were not discovered at routine screening.

These cancers in MOS are thus troubling—even in their small numbers—due to the fact they have either doubled or tripled in our internal comparison between the pre and post-exposure periods, and there are no clear explanations for their increased rates. As was noted in WTC studies of firefighters and other exposed individuals, published by other groups, no <u>firm</u> conclusions regarding WTC exposure and subsequent development of specific cancers were possible then, as they are now, due to the very small numbers of cancer cases and possibility of "red herring" confounders.

Nevertheless, it is clear that monitoring of MOS and other exposed individuals must continue, while further research is conducted and clearer linkages between exposures and cancer are studied. The NYPD is exploring research avenues in conjunction with world-renowned cancer institutions on strategies for monitoring, and possible genetic testing of our exposed MOS, in order to protect our cohort and afford them the best in medical surveillance.


It is for this reason that it is so vital that exposed MOS –Active and Retired- schedule an annual appointment for NYPD WTC Medical Monitoring through the Medical Division, even if you are enrolled in another WTC monitoring program elsewhere, so that we can retain the integrity of this unique cohort and maintain the power of our numbers, as the largest exposed NYC WTC Responder group, to help one another get to the answers we all seek.

WTC monitoring at the NYPD Medical Division is always on job time, has no waiting period, is eligible to any MOS (active\retired) who has a WTC exposure or filed a <u>"WTC Notice of Participation"</u>, and covers all testing and monitoring costs.

The handbook contains information of all of the medical coverage provided to NYC employees and retirees covered by GHI Comprehensive Benefits Plan.

Additionally, many members are still unaware of the GHI Catastrophic Coverage provided by the Superior Officers Council, Sergeants Benevolent Association and the Detectives Endowment Association..

This benefit was established to assist members and **eligible dependents** to defray some of the non-covered medical and surgical expenses incurred for services rendered by non-participating or out-of-net-work providers and to provide coverage for catastrophic illness. The below information is listed on their respective websites.

SOC

Members must incur out-of-pocket expenses of more than \$4000.00 per year. (Out-of-pocket expenses are those medical and hospital charges that are considered reasonable and customary by GHI and that are not reimbursed by either the City Health Plan or private insurers).

Members must produce a statement of services, explanation of benefits form and cancelled checks for expenses submitted. Reimbursement is based on a contract year (January - December) 100% of GHI reasonable and customary charges based on the current profile.

The maximum lifetime benefit is 2 million dollars.

The SOC provides a self-funded \$1,000 direct reimbursement payable to the member after the member has submitted, qualified paperwork under the GHI Catastrophic Rider outlined above and the member still has a minimum of at least \$4,000.00 of out-of-pocket qualified. The exclusions and restrictions are the same as the requirement for the catastrophic coverage benefit.

For example you may have paid \$10,000 dollars out-of-pocket expenses, but GHI's payment schedule only deems the reasonable and customary payment for the services to be \$6,000 dollars. The Member pays the remaining \$4,000 dollars of the balance and may now be eligible to receive \$1,000 dollars from the SOC Catastrophic Benefit.

The first \$25,000 is covered for Private Duty Nursing care and thereafter 50% of the remainder with a lifetime cap of \$50,000 per person. The cap for in-hospital Mental Health charges is \$10,000 individual lifetime maximum.

SOC – After a \$4000 annual family deductible, GHI pays 100% of reasonable and customary charges based on a current profile with a maximum lifetime payment of \$250,000 per person.

Limitations: The first \$25,000 is covered for private duty nursing care and 50% thereafter of the remainder with a lifetime cap of \$50,000 per person. The cap for in hospital mental health charges is \$10,000 per person.

SBA—Eligibility

SBA members are eligible, as well as spouses/domestic partners and dependent children who are covered under a participating provider organization (PPO) or a point-of service (POS) plan presently being offered by the New York City Employee Health Benefits Program.

Definition of PPO and POS

Participating provider organization (PPO) indemnity plans offer the option to use either a network provider or an out-of-network provider for medical and hospital care. PPO plans contract with health care providers who agree to accept a negotiated payment from the health plan and predetermined co-payments from subscribers as payment in full for a schedule of medical services provided. When the subscriber uses a non-participating provider, the subscriber is subject to deductibles and/or a higher price schedule. GHI/CBP is an example of a PPO.

Point-of-service (POS) plans offer the freedom to use either a network provider or an out-of-network provider for medical and hospital care.

SBA GHI Catastrophic Coverage continued.....

If the subscriber uses a network provider, health care delivery resembles that of a traditional HMO, with prepaid comprehensive coverage and little out-of-pocket costs for services.

When the subscriber uses an out-of-network provider, health care delivery resembles that of an indemnity insurance product, with less comprehensive coverage and subject to deductibles and coinsurance. HIP PRIME POS and U S. Health Care (QPOS) are POS plans. The SBA H&W Fund catastrophic coverage plan does not cover subscribers of exclusive participating organizations (EPOs) because they do not provide any out of network benefits.

The catastrophic coverage benefit

The benefit pays up to 100 percent of reasonable and customary eligible expenses after a \$2,000 out-of-pocket annual deductible per person has been reached. Eligible out-of-pocket expenses are those SBA H&W Fund medical and hospital expense charges that are considered reasonable and customary by the basic City Health Plan and are not fully reimbursed by the City Health Plan or private group insurers.

Benefit limits and maximums

There is a lifetime maximum benefit of \$250,000 per covered person. Within this lifetime maximum are the following: (1) Mental health in-hospital care of \$10,000.

(2) Required and approved private duty nursing is covered in full for the first unpaid \$25,000 and then at 50 percent for the remainder up to a lifetime maximum of \$50,000.

Services or charges not covered by the catastrophic benefit

In addition the benefit exclusions of the SBA H&W Fund, the catastrophic benefit does not cover outpatient psychiatric care and prescription drug charges. Ineligible charges such as experimental procedures or services not approved by the member's health plan are likewise not covered by this benefit. Medical, surgical and hospital charges incurred for services rendered by non-participating PPO providers or out-of-network POS providers must be approved by the member's health plan.

Submitting an SBA catastrophic benefit claim

Once you have reached the \$2,000 out-of-pocket, per-person annual deductible, obtain and submit the catastrophic claim benefit form to the Fund office for processing. Instructions are printed on the form.

DEA—There are two parts to the DEA Catastrophic coverage. The first part is an extra rider that the DEA purchased through GHI. There is a \$4,000 deductible (retired members) per calendar year.

Claims for non-participating doctors are submitted through GHI for their basic allowance. Because GHI's payment schedule is so low the member always has an out of pocket expense. When the difference between what your doctor's charges and what GHI allows exceeds \$4,000 you may apply for the DEA catastrophic benefit.

(For example. Bills submitted to GHI are for \$20,000, GHI's basic allowance is \$5,000, your responsibility is the remaining \$15,000. You would send your GHI statements showing the above to the DEA, we would in turn forward it to GHI to be reprocessed under the DEA/GHI Catastrophic Rider. Of the remaining \$15,000 out of pocket expense*** GHI would minus the \$4,000 deductible and then GHI would send you a check for \$11,000. (Maximum benefit lifetime per family \$250,000).

The second part of the DEA catastrophic benefit is when you receive the Catastrophic payment from GHI, send the statement showing the \$4,000 deductible was met to the DEA and then the DEA itself will issue you a check for an additional \$3,000.

*** Please be advised that if GHI does not make an allowance for services rendered, that specific service will not be included in the calculations for catastrophic coverage.

There is also an additional benefit for Retired members under the DEA Catastrophic program . If your out of Pocket expense does not exceed \$4,000 but does exceed \$2,000

Spotting Veterans Fundraising Scams

So many legitimate veterans support organizations are doing terrific work in many niches. The criminals make it much more difficult for the legitimate operators to raise the much needed money for these charities to function.

Veterans tend to trust other veterans over just about anyone else. And most of us live up to that trust. In some cases, however, veterans are hired as sales representatives, specifically to gain the trust of other veterans. These recently retired officers and NCOs then go back to their former colleagues and leverage the trust and bond others have with them to form business relationships. In 99.9 percent of the cases, there is no fraud going on. Other times, there is, but the veteran may not be in on the game. Perhaps he just used his own influence to gather other veterans together in a seminar, and then turned it over to a guest speaker. In other cases, the veteran is in on the scam.

And in still other cases, the con-man is lying about being a veteran.

The tragedy is this: So many legitimate veterans support organizations are doing terrific work in many niches. The criminals make it much more difficult for the legitimate operators to raise the much needed money for these charities to function.

Fraud Prevention

There are really two levels of fraud you have to worry about: The first is agent-level fraud. This occurs when you have a legitimate charity that hired a bad, dishonest agent or representative. The agent then pockets some or all cash donations, and may launder other donations or misdirect them to his own bank account.

In other cases, the whole organization may be corrupt. You can have a hard-working, honest representative, but the charity's executive director may be corrupt or incompetent. She could be stealing money from the organization, or she may be a weak executive who has failed to implement the necessary accounting controls within the organization.

To guard against agent-level fraud, give directly to the organizations, rather than via an agent, if at all possible. For example, a credit card donation on a secure website of a reputable and wellknown charity is better and safer than a cash donation, handed to an agent you may barely even know.

To guard against organizational fraud, stick to charities you are already familiar with – particularly agencies whose effective work you've seen first-hand.

You can also use CharityNavigator.com, an online resource for investigating and evaluating charity organizations.

A few other tips:

• Don't give directly to a telethon or other pitch that involves a middleman or intermediary. A significant portion of your donation will go to the cost of the event or fundraising drive itself. Instead, do your own investigation, and give directly.

• Be careful of charities with names that sound very close, but not quite alike. Unscrupulous people will attempt to exploit donor confusion by naming themselves very similarly to established and reputable charities.

 \cdot Verify the 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status of charitable organizations independently.

• Compare executive compensation to the mission. Executive director salaries at the average charity that Charity Navigator.com tracks exceeds \$150,000 per year. In some cases, large charities can warrant paying a capable and experienced executive competitively with the private sector. A huge salary for the director of a small and/or inefficient charity should be a yellow flag your money may be better donated elsewhere.

SENATE BILL 212 Handgun Standards for Retired Sworn LEO

· Amends G.S. 14-415.12A.

• An individual who is a qualified retired law enforcement officer and has met the standards as approved by the North Carolina Criminal Justice Education and Training Standards Commission for handgun qualification for officers within the last 12 months is deemed to have satisfied the firearms safety and training course for purposes of applying for a North Carolina issued concealed handgun permit.

- Effective: October 1, 2015

GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF NORTH CAROLINA SESSION 2015 SESSION LAW 2015-195 HOUSE BILL 562

AN ACT to amend various firearm laws.

HB 562 makes several important changes to North Carolina gun laws, including:

- Requiring the chief law enforcement officer (CLEO) of a jurisdiction to certify the transfer or making of a firearm in a timely manner.
- Clarifying the exemption for keeping a firearm in a vehicle by a person with a valid Concealed Handgun Permit (CHP) while the vehicle is on the property of a public school.
- Establishing an affirmative defense for an individual in certain situations where he or she uses a firearm on prohibited school property "in response to a threatening situation in which deadly force was justified..."
- Improving the existing Range Protection Law, which would help to protect established shooting ranges from new local ordinances designed to shut them down.
- Improving the issuing process and removing unnecessary disqualifiers for CHP applicants.
- Lowering the penalty for carrying a firearm with a valid CHP on posted property from a misdemeanor to an infraction.
- Removing the prohibition on using a lawfully possessed short barreled rifle for hunting.
- Strengthening North Carolina's preemption statute.

There will be classroom time from 0900 to 1300, then qualification. Qualification will be day\night, and combat. Their instructor/range officers understands the limitations of some of our retirees.

Depending on the number of people wanting to shoot more than one handgun, and those having trouble qualifying you may be able to qualify with an additional gun. If you do there will be no additional cost except for the ammunition.

So that they can adequately pay their class instructor and their range safety officers they are hoping to have 18 people qualify per session.

The first available date is Sunday Feb. 7, which is Superbowl Sunday. They assured me that qualifications will be completed in plenty of time to watch the game.

If there is not enough response for Feb. 7 the next available date will Feb. 28.

Please let me know ASAP if you plan to attend the Feb 7 class and if there is an inadequate response for that date, if you will be able to attend on Feb. 28. (As of now it does not appear that we will have people for the Feb. 7 class).

Saturday, February 18, 1893

Brown's Widows.

When Patrolman Charles L. BROWN, son of Capt. William BROWN, of the Eighth precinct, died Feb. 4, 1892, he left two widows, consequently he was a bigamist. He lived with his first wife, Annie, at 218 Forty-fourth street, for a number of years, and they had seven children. He was a member of the police mutual aid; and his widow was entitled to \$1,000 from the association. He deserted her, however, and married another woman, Catherine BROWN, and in his will he left the pension fund to her, notwithstanding the fact that his first wife after he left her, kept his assessments paid up.

Frederick L. JENKINS, the treasurer of the Police Mutual Fund Association, paid the money over to the City Court, and both women have sued for it, and the evidence was heard by chief Judge CLEMENT, in the Special Term, yesterday afternoon.

25 February 1893

POLICE CHANGES

Roundsman Peter J. DOWNEY, of the First precinct, has been transferred to the Fourteenth, and Roundsman KLEIN, of the Fourteenth, takes his place. Roundsman CLANCY has been transferred from the First precinct to the Eighteenth, and Roundsman MURPHY, of the Eighteenth, goes to the First.

These changes are said to be in the interest of the department, on account of the frequent petty robberies in the First precinct.

28 February 1893

LANGAN DISMISSED. Officer Peter LANGAN, of the Eleventh precinct, was tried before Commissioner HAYDEN to-day and dismissed from the police force for having raised a row in the barroom of Tivoli Hall, at the corner of Fifth avenue and Second street.

FEBRUARY

4th February 1894 George URAN, of the Navy Yard, has been appointed on the New York police force. William THOMAS will get his place at the yard.

A Policeman Under Charges

Two charges were made against Policeman LANGAN to-day. Commissioner HAYDEN will examine into the case next Tuesday.

His Mother Said To Be In A Dying State The police at the First precinct station are trying to solve the mystery surrounding the peculiar actions of Officer MAXWELL this morning. He came to the station house this morning, accosted the different officers present with a cheery Good morning, changed his clothes in the dormitory, and reported for duty. He is stationed at the telegraph desk. About 8:40 o'clock he jumped up suddenly and announced to Sergeant DODGE that he wanted to go out doors for a while. The sergeant responded that such a thing was impossible. "But I must. "said MAXWELL. His superior officer remonstrated with him, but MAXWELL said that he would go anyway, with or without permission. The sergeant laid his hand in a kindly manner on MAXWELL's shoulder and asked him to remain. The man now was in a highly excited state, and with the words, "Oh I must go," rushed past the officer, and since leaving the station has not been seen or heard from since. The occurrence was related to Capt. CAMPBELL, who has preferred charges against MAXWELL to the Commissioner for leaving his post and disobedience to orders. The accused officer resides at 47 Little street, and lives with his mother, as he is unmarried. At the station is was said that MAXWELL has not been at his home for nearly two weeks, and that his mother was in a dying condition. The supposition is that he has been on a spree, and it is known that when in such a condition he acts like an insane person.

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
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
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
