PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hi All.

I want to thanK all of our members who contacted their US senators and asked them to support S. 546, the Never Forget the Heroes Act.

I have received correspondence back from NC Senators Burr & Tillis. (See page 17). Both said they would keep my request to support this legislation in mind when it came before the senate, but disappointedly neither said they would actually support it. I will keep their responses in mind on election day.

I am happy to report that after hearing testimony from NYPD hero Ret. Det. Luis Alvarez, on June 11th, the House Committee on the Judiciary favorably reported by voice vote H.R. 1327, the "Never Forget the Heroes Act," which will reauthorize the September 11th Victim Compensation Fund (VCF) and extend it until 2090. This is the first of many hurdles cleared for the VCF to be reauthorized. (See page 2).

Additionally, Mitch McConnell, the Republican senate majority leader, agreed to allow this legislation to go to a senate floor vote in August, but the Senate version which has bipartisan support, is still short of a veto-proof majority.

With the vote not taking place until August, there is still time for those of you who have not contacted your senators to ask them to support this legislation to do so.

On page 19 is a list of senators who have cosponsored the bill and a list of states and the number of senators in these states that cosponsored the bill.

Capriotti, and NYNJ PAPD Officer John Leahy died of 9/11 related illnesses. And tragically, during a three week period in June, the NYPD lost the following active members to suicide, Deputy Chief. Steven Silks, Det. Joe Calabrese, P.O. Michael Caddy and P.O. Kevin Preiss.

House panel unanimously passes 9/11 victims fund bill after Jon Stewart shaming (Excerpts) By Nikki Schwab

WASHINGTON — The bill that permanently authorizes the 9/11 Victim Compensation Fund passed out of the House Judiciary Committee unanimously on Wednesday.

The move comes a day after former "The Daily Show" host Jon Stewart shamed members of a Judiciary subcommittee, https://nypost.com/2019/06/11/jon-stewart-shames-lawmakers-for-not-showing-up-to-9-11-victims-fund-hearing/ as only Judiciary Committee Chairman Jerrold Nadler (D-NY) and four subcommittee members were present for testimony from 9/11 first responders.

They included Luis Alvarez, a retired NYPD detective who was about to begin his 69th round of chemotherapy for liver cancer. There are 14 members of the subcommittee.

"It's an embarrassment to the country and a stain on the institution and you should be ashamed of yourselves, for those who aren't here, but you won't be because accountability doesn't appear to be something that occurs in this chamber," Stewart said Tuesday.

The bill, sponsored by Rep. Carolyn Maloney (D-NY), will need to be scored by the Congressional Budget Office before it can get a full vote in the House, but is expected to pass, as the legislation has 313 bipartisan co-sponsors.

The Senate version, sponsored by Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand, also has bipartisan support, but it's still short of a veto-proof majority.

The White House has yet to respond to requests for comment on whether President Trump supports the legislation.

TESTIMONY FROM RET. NYPD DET LUIS ALVAREZ

Good Morning Ladies and Gentleman -

My name is Luis Alvarez and I am a retired NYPD Detective from the Bomb Squad and proud military veteran. Less than 24 hours from now I will start my 69th Round of Chemotherapy. Yes that's correct 69th Round.

I should not be here today but YOU made me come. YOU made me come because I will not stand by and watch as my friends with cancer from 9/11 like me are valued less than anyone else is because of when they get sick or die.

I have been lucky enough to have 69 rounds of chemo. Yes i said lucky. Many others only had 5 and some had none. Their families would love to have had the time with them that mine has had with me. So because I have been lucky enough to have the pain and suffering of 69 rounds of chemo and countless other treatments, it is my goal and will be my legacy to see that YOU do the right thing for all 9/11responders.

Please understand that we do not want ANYTHING for ourselves. We became police officers, fire fighters, paramedics to help others. We went to Ground Zero, the Pentagon and Shanksville to help people first and then to help their families bury something. We were there together with one mission and we left after completing the mission.

I have been to many places in this world and done many things but I can tell you that I did not want to be anywhere else but Ground Zero when I was there. We were part of showing the world we would never back down from terrorism and that we could all work together. No races, no colors and no politics.

Now the 9/11 illnesses have taken many of us and we are all worried about our children, our spouses and our families and what happens if we are not here. The VCF has done a wonderful job and treated my family with great respect. But my life isn't worth more than the next responder to get cancer. My family's needs are not worth less than others that have already died.

This fund is not a lottery ticket to paradise. It is there to provide for our families when we can't. Nothing more.

Those of us that were at Ground Zero, the Morgue, Fresh Kills Landfill, the Pentagon and Shanksville WILL NEVER FORGET. Every single member of Congress has said they will NEVER FORGET and they say NEVER FORGET every September 11th. Its NOT one day per year for many of us, it's ever day.

You all said you would "Never Forget". Well I am here to make sure that you don't. I am here because others cannot get here. I would rather be back at Ground Zero again than be here, working together.

YOU MADE ME COME HERE THE DAY BEFORE MY 69th ROUND OF CHEMO and I am going to make sure you NEVER FORGET to take care of the 9/11Responders.

I am going to leave you with this ... I will complete my 69th round of chemo tomorrow ... for a moment I want you to think about how many tens of thousands of rounds of chemo the 9/11 first responders have completed so far and how many tens of thousands are still come ... WE DID THAT FOR YOU & WE WILL KEEP DOING IT ... PLEASE DO NOT DISRESPECT US & MAKE US BEG FOR OUR FAMILIES

In the last 48 hours, our NYPD Family has suffered the tragic loss of two members. Deputy Chief Steven Silks of PBQN and Detective Joe Calabrese of the BS Homicide Squad and a DEA Trustee.

Rather than try to dissect the circumstances right now, it is important to keep in mind that we all face battles in our lives - BUT - we don't have to do it alone. That is the focus of this message.

Touch base. Make that call. Be a shoulder to cry on. Be the sounding board. Embrace someone that needs to know that someone is willing to listen and to steer them towards a better place.

Don't presume anything. We are a family unto ourselves and we know better than anyone that we too often default to suffering in silence. This is an opportunity to do something about it.





Queens, NY – New York Police Department (NYPD) Patrol Borough Queens North Deputy Chief Steven Silks died by suicide on Wednesday, June 5.

Chief Silks was just weeks shy of his 63rd birthday – which was the day he would have also faced mandatory retirement from the NYPD, the New York Daily News reported.

"His family lives out of state. He's not married," one of his fellow officers said. "He absolutely lived for the NYPD... He was aged out. He's the kind of guy who would have served until he died of natural causes."

Chief Silks, a 39-year veteran-of-the-force, submitted his mandatory retirement papers at the NYPD pension office on Tues.

His 39-year career was scheduled to come to a close on July 9, according to the New York Post.

On Wednesday, he drove his unmarked patrol vehicle to a quiet section of Burns Street near the 112th Precinct station where he worked, and shot himself in the head, the New York Daily News reported.

A security guard for a nearby tennis club found Chief Silks inside the vehicle with a gun beside him at approximately 6:45 p.m. He was not in uniform, and responding officers did not immediately recognize the high-ranking NYPD officer.

Chief Silks was rushed to Elmhurst Hospital, where he was pronounced dead.

"I am speechless," Captains Endowment Association President Roy Richter told the New York Daily News. "Steve was an incredibly dedicated and great guy. He was great at what he does. This is a terrible loss."

He was heavily involved with both department and community events, Richter said.

"He was part of the fabric of just about every major police event over the last couple of decades," he explained.

Chief Silks was also an avid outdoorsman.

"He ran a 3:09 New York Marathon at one point in his life and reached the summit of Mount Everest," Richter told the New York Daily News. "He coordinated the U.S. Open on a regular basis."

During his nearly four decades of service with the NYPD, Chief Silks spent several years as the department's firing range commander and commanded two Bronx precincts.

He was also second-in-command at the police academy, Patrol Borough Queens South, the Patrol Services Bureau, and Patrol Borough Brooklyn North at various points throughout his career.

"He's a reliable guy, he's very friendly. He was a good friend," Richter said. "How do you describe a good friend? He was always someone you could rely on when you needed support."

Police sources said the longtime lawman had expressed sadness that his mandatory retirement was drawing near, according to the New York Daily News.

"He loved what he did," one of Chief Silks' fellow officers told the New York Post. "He was admired and loved by everybody. It's heartbreaking."

Detectives' Endowment Association President Michael Palladino said that Chief Silks was "one of the nicest human beings I ever met."

"He had such enthusiasm for the job and for life itself which makes this difficult to understand," Palladino said.



New York Police Detective Joe Calabrese served his department for 37 years.

Brooklyn, NY – New York Police Department (NYPD) Detective Joe Calabrese was found dead from a gunshot wound to the head on Thursday, June 6.

The 58-year-old detective was last seen at approximately 2 a.m., when he left Maimonides Medical Center after visiting his wife, who had undergone a minor procedure there, the <u>New York Post</u> reported.

About an hour later, another NYPD detective spotted his black Cadillac parked near Plumb Beach.

When Det. Calabrese failed to show up for work on Thursday and couldn't be reached, a massive search party was dispatched to the area surrounding his abandoned vehicle.

Approximately 100 law enforcement officers set out in search of the veteran detective using helicopters, boats, and K9s, the New York Daily News reported.

His body was found near some bushes at the beach later that afternoon, according to the New York Post.

Police said he died of an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound.

"I don't understand it," one of his stunned colleagues told the New York Post. "I don't understand why he would do this."

NYPD Chief of Detectives Dermot Shea released a statement in the wake of the beloved detective's tragic death, the New York Daily News reported.

"Today, we lost a pillar of the Detective Bureau. A gentleman who'd lend a hand to anyone in need. A seasoned homicide investigator determined to find justice for the victim and solace for those left behind," Chief Shea said. "Rest easy, Detective Joe Calabrese. You will be missed tremendously."

Det. Calabrese was assigned to NYPD's Brooklyn South homicide division, and was heavily involved in the Detectives Endowment Association (DEA) as a union trustee and board member, the New York Post reported.

"I am shocked and shattered beyond belief," DEA President Michael Palladino said.

"Joseph Calabrese was a dedicated detective, union official, husband and father," Palladino told the New York Post. "He was the salt of the earth."

He joined the department in 1982, and also has a son who is assigned to the NYPD's 67th Precinct, the New York Daily News reported.

He leaves behind his wife and four children, according to AM New York.

The discovery of Det. Calabrese's death came just hours after the body of NYPD Patrol Borough Queens North Deputy Chief Steven Silks was found inside his patrol vehicle near the 112th Precinct where he worked.



Staten Island, NY - New York Police Department (NYPD) Officer Michael Caddy died by suicide on June 14.

The 29-year-old off-duty officer's body was discovered inside a car on Wilcox Street near the 121st Precinct at approximately 3:45 p.m. by another off-duty officer, the New York Daily News reported.

He died from a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head, police said.

Officer Caddy was in the midst of divorce proceedings at the time of his death, according to his attorney, Brian Perskin.

"He was getting divorced, so he wasn't happy," Perskin said. "He was pretty stressed out. But this is totally unexpected. I feel bad for the wife, and especially his father, who he was very close to."

The attorney said that the divorce has been relatively "non-eventful," and that Officer Caddy and his wife "wanted to do the right thing by each other."

Officer Caddy, a six-year veteran-of-the-force, was assigned to the NYPD's 121st Precinct, where he worked on domestic violence cases.

He also served as a youth instructor for the Too Good for Drugs program during his time with the department, <u>Staten Island Live</u> reported.

Officer Caddy leaves behind his wife and two children, as well as his parents, sister, niece, and nephews, according to his obituary.

"Above all, Michael found joy as a father," his obituary read.

Approximately two dozen police vehicles and over 100 NYPD officers closed of a section of Dongan Hills during Officer Caddy's funeral procession on Wednesday, Staten Island Live reported.

Officer Caddy's death was the third NYPD suicide in a period of just nine days, according to Staten Island Live.

"Cops spend so much of their days assisting others...but before we can help the people we serve, it is imperative that we first help ourselves," NYPD Commissioner James O'Neill said in a statement.



New York Police Officer Kevin Preiss was just three days away from his 25th anniversary with the department.

Oyster Bay, NY – New York Police Officer Kevin Preiss died by suicide at his home on June 26.

Officer Preiss, 53, was on the porch of his Hicksville residence when he fatally shot himself in the head at approximately 10 p.m., neighbors told the New York Daily News.

A family gathering was being held inside the home at the time.

He was just three days away from his 25th year as a New York Police Department (NYPD) officer.

"He was going to retire next year...And he was always talking about all of the things he was looking forward to doing when he retired," a civilian NYPD employee told the New York Post. "I can't make sense of it."

Officer Preiss and his partner, Officer Roland Benson, made headlines in 2015 when they saved a heart attack victim at a Dunkin' Donuts shop by performing CPR, the New York Daily News reported.

"I've always enjoyed the part [of the job] where you actually help someone in need," Officer Preiss said at the time. "We do a lot of what you call lift jobs where we help old people that fall out of bed — that's the kind of thing that I enjoy."

In February, he and Officer Benson successfully helped a woman give birth in the hallway off her Broadway apartment building at approximately 2 a.m., <u>The Riverdale Press</u> reported.

"He was a hero," one of his fellow officers told the New York Daily News. "He saved babies and everything."

Officer Preiss spent nearly his entire career patrolling the 50th Precinct in the Bronx.

"He was a good guy. Just a really nice guy," one of his fellow officers told the New York Post. "It's so sad."

Officer Preiss' death was the fourth incidence of NYPD suicide in the month of June. A total of six NYPD officers have taken their own lives since January.

"It's something...everyone needs to talk about," NYPD Chief of Department Terence Monahan said. "We have to be willing to talk, and more important we have to be able to listen."

Officer Preiss leaves behind his wife, Juana, as well as his children, Veronica, Thomas, and Nicholas, according to his obituary.

He is also survived by his parents, siblings, and many extended family members.

Officer Preiss was laid to rest on Monday.









Retired NYPD Officer Thomas Waterman died on June 3, 2019 of World Trade Center-related illness.

9/11 NYPD Responder, Thomas Waterman, was diagnosed with esophageal cancer in January 2018, and fought valiantly against it. PEARL RIVER -

A funeral service was held Friday for Thomas Waterman, a retired NYPD officer from Pearl River who recently lost his brave battle with a 9/11-related cancer.

There were bagpipes, an honor guard and mounted police officers outside St. Aedan's Church in Pearl River for the 58-year-old who served 20 years in the 34th Precinct.

His sister, Anne Walter, told News 12 that her brother was only supposed to be on standby the day the towers came crashing down in Lower Manhattan.

"Him and three other guys, I think, said we're not just going to sit here. We're going to go down and volunteer," she said. "They didn't have to go, but that the way Tommy was."

She says he worked for months on the pile.

When Waterman finally retired in 2006, he decided to go back into the city, working underground to help build the city's many tunnels.

"We will never be the same without him. He truly was a hero in many ways," says Walter.

The family says Waterman lived in Pearl River for more than 40 years and had a big impact on the local community.



Beloved Port Authority cop, known for his toughness and tender heart dies of 9/11 cancer

A Port Authority police officer known for his dedication and true grit has lost his long bout with a 9/11 related cancer, the agency said Friday.

Police Officer William Leahy, who reminded colleagues of stoic western star John Wayne died at his parents' home on Thursday — one month after what many hoped would be a life saving surgery, friends said. He was 49.

"(He was) tough as nails and always got the job done," PAPD Lt. Daniel Rhein said. "At the same time, he would call his mother every day."

Rhein, who worked with Leahy, called his longtime friend a "straight shooter" who had a "John Wayne type personality."

He responded to the World Trade Center on 9/11 and spent weeks working at Ground Zero during rescue and recovery efforts.

Four days after 9/11, smoke continues to rise from the site of the World Trade Center after the deadly terrorist attacks. Despite his fatal illness, the 27-year veteran never left his post at Kennedy Airport, PA officials said.

"Officer Leahy served the Port Authority Police Department with pride and distinction," Port Authority Superintendent Ed Cetnar said. "His commitment to serving the public never wavered and his determination held steady as he battled his illness."


During his career, the Leahy spent time in PAPD's Marine Unit, Cargo Unit and heavy weapons unit. He also racked up more than 500 arrests while in plainclothes at JFK Airport. He also received the World Trade Center medal and an Excellent Police Duty Unit Citation, PA officials said.

An estimated 90,000 first responders showed up at work on the pile in the aftermath of the 9/11 attacks. An additional 400,000 survivors lived and worked in the area at the time.

World Trade Center health care advocates are seeking to extend the \$7.3 federal Victims Compensation Fund, which provides monetary payouts to those stricken with a 9/11 illness to help offset living and medical expenses.

The fund is slated to expire in 2020, but so many people have requested help, that the fund is expected to run out money before the deadline. In February, the fund compensated for the expected shortfall by amending its award payouts — new applicants would get less money than those enrolled prior.

Funeral services for Leahy will be held Saturday and Sunday at the Charles J. O'Shea Funeral home in East Meadow. A funeral mass will be held at St. Louis de Montfort Roman Catholic Church in Miller Place at noon on Monday.





Andrea Renee Jacqueline Rainer, 58, of St. Augustine, passed away on June 25, 2019 at her home. Born in Montclair, NJ and moved to Pittsville, MA following her father's internship, where she attended grade school. In her teen years her family relocated to Laurelton, NY and she graduated from Andrew Jackson High School. After high school she worked as a banker for 2 years at City Bank and then went to work for IBM. In 1986 she joined the police force for the NYPD, where she worked her way to detective. Andrea played many roles for the NYPD; she worked in domestic violence, street narcotics, crime analysis unit, dignitary intelligence unit, forensic investigation division, quality assurance unit and her favorite ballistic unit in the forensic lab. She was also called upon to ground zero as a first responder during 9/11. Andrea retired in 2007 to Florida and called St. Augustine home. She loved the beach, crafting, pottery, painting and travelling. She spent time as a missionary, working in Jerusalem and Nicaragua, and also was a member of Habitat for Humanity. Andrea loved her family and friends and she will be greatly missed.










Retired New York City Poice detective Luis Alvarez, who was one of the first responders on 9/11, has died after a battle with colon cancer. Alvarez became a symbol of 9/11 first responders' struggle to secure extended federal funding when he testified before Congress earlier this month alongside comedian Jon Stewart. Alvarez had undergone 69 rounds of chemotherapy before his doctors told him there was nothing more they could do one day after his emotional testimony. He entered hospice care shortly afterwards. Alvarez's treatment was covered, but he said he wanted to use his last days to advocate for those who were not so lucky and permanently extend the 9/11 Victims Compensation Fund Bill, so his fellow first responders can get health coverage. "That's my ultimate goal, legacy, is to have this bill passed so first responders have the coverage they need," he said. Before his death, Alvarez said he was "at peace" with everything, because he could still "work from my bedside, I can still put the word out."



Det. Lt. Joseph C. Capriotti, Middletown PD

Joseph C. Capriotti, 62, of the Middletown Police Department, died of World Trade Center-related pancreatic cancer on June 6, 2019. Born in Staten Island, NY, he was a resident of Middletown most of his life. He served the Middletown Police Department for nearly three decades, rising from patrolman to detective lieutenant before retiring in 2011.

After retirement he was an active volunteer with Holiday Express, an organization that delivers music, food, gifts, financial support, and friendship to those in need during the holiday season and throughout the year. He also participated for many years in the Tour de Force, which honors the victims of 9/11 by keeping their memory alive through annual cycling events, and also raises funds to benefit the families of law enforcement officers nationwide killed in the line of duty.

He was a lifelong sports enthusiast, participating at various levels as a player and coach, and even as an umpire. Softball and baseball were his particular pleasures, and he was a passionate NY Yankees fan.

Family and friends meant everything to Joe: He was first a caring and devoted husband, father, and grandfather, but he was also loved by an extended family of siblings, cousins, nieces and nephews, aunts and uncles, and more. His work in the community also earned him innumerable friends and fans. He will be deeply missed by all those who knew, loved, or worked with him.

Thank you for taking the time to contact me about S. 546, the Never Forget the Heroes Act. I appreciate hearing from you.

The September 11th terrorist attacks tragically claimed the lives of nearly 3,000 Americans. This horrific attack will remain one of the most hurtful days in American history. Subsequently, Congress established the September 11th Victim Compensation Fund (VCF) to compensate families of those who lost their lives in the attacks, and survivors who suffered a serious injury during or in the immediate aftermath of the attacks. The original VCF operated from 2001 to 2004.

As you may know, in 2011, former President Obama signed legislation reestablishing the VCF. This legislation was then renewed and extended the VCF until December 18, 2020. The renewal included updated changes to policies and procedures when evaluating each claimant's loss.

On February 25, 2019, Senator Kristen Gillibrand (D-NY) introduced S. 546, which was referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee. If enacted, this bill would extend the VCF fund until 2090. I believe we have a responsibility to help the families of those who lost their lives in the vicious terrorist attacks on September 11th <u>and must do so in a responsible way.</u> You may be interested to know that I am a member of the Senate Judiciary Committee, and should this legislation come before the committee, <u>I will keep your views in mind.</u>

Again, thank you for taking the time to contact me. Please do not hesitate to contact me again about other issues that are important to you.





Proxy renewal is available **ONLY** to members living outside the five (5) boroughs of New York City and the 6 counties in which active members are permitted to live.

ONLY cards issued after November 1, 2002, can be renewed this way. In all other circumstances, members will have to personally visit 1 P.P.

ID Cards must be previously expired or expiring within 3-6 months of expiration date.

A completed PD form **MUST** accompany the card. The form is on the accompanying page of this newsletter, and can be downloaded from our website.

Additionally, expiration date will be increased from 5 to 8 years.

IF A MEMBER DIES - INFORMATION TO THE SURVIVING SPOUSE OR FAMILY

(Hopefully Not Needed For A Long Time)

Too often spouses and families are left in a quandary upon the death of a loved one. Few situations in life are more stressful than when a spouse passes. All too often we have a difficult time focusing on the issues at hand and need guidance to get the deceased affairs in order. The following is a general guide for the widow(er) or the decease's family regarding important notifications that must be made by the surviving spouse and information you should have on hand when a retiree dies.

I. PREPARATIONS BEFOREHAND

- GATHER ASSETS This doesn't mean piling them all together. It means getting a list of all the assets at the time of the
 decedent's death, along with copies of statements, deeds, etc. This information is needed for probate. It's also essential
 for filing federal and state estate tax returns, if required.
- REVIEW IRAs If the surviving spouse is the beneficiary, decide whether to roll an IRA over to the surviving spouse.
- GET GOOD ADVICE and get it now. The money you pay to attorneys and other advisers to resolve issues NOW can be much lower than if you deal with problems AFTER a person's death.
- In case of couples, usually most of the property is held in joint names and the survivor obtains same "by operation of law". However, there may be some items which were held in the name of the deceased only, and in that case it would be necessary to go to Probate Court to transfer ownership of that property, unless listed in a trust.
- GET ORGANIZED NOW When someone dies, one of the big problems for beneficiaries is locating the things necessary to settle the estate. Make sure you know before the death occurs where to find the following documents and information. (This is just a partial list)
 - 1. Will
 - 2. Living Will
 - 3. Trust
 - 4. Deeds (if any).
 - 5. Safe-deposit boxes (location of boxes, contents and keys).
 - 6. Life insurance policies.
 - 7. Funeral and burial instructions.
 - 8. Names and addresses of creditors and debtors.
 - 9. List of assets and where they are located.
 - 10. List of all advisers (attorney, accountant, insurance agent, stockbroker, etc.).

II. STEPS TO BE TAKEN AFTER DEATH - Notifications to be made:

- 3. Contact the NYPD Operations Unit located at One Police Plaza at (646) 610-5580, for pall bearers (Funeral Director will usually do this for you) for all five boroughs, all of Long Island and Upstate New York, but not beyond Dutchess County.
- 4. Contact Social Security: (800) 772-1213 (Funeral Director will usually do this for you).
- 5. Contact Fraternal Organizations to arrange for visitors, Color Guard and possible insurance benefits

- 6. If a veteran, notify the Veterans Administration at (800) 827-1000 for: Grave marker, Funeral Allowance and Flag (Funeral Director will usually do this for you). If can't find discharge papers or DD 214, you will need date of Enlistment, date of Discharge, Branch & Serial Number. If deceased had 100% disability for 10 years, spouse is entitled to an additional benefit.
- 7. Notify your Church or Temple for announcements.

(Funeral Director will usually do this for you).

8. Health Insurance: COBRA (Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1985) COBRA has a safety net. If spouse or dependent was covered under deceased's health plan they may continue coverage under COBRA for up to 36 months. New York State in 2001 amended the Administrative Code to continue Health Care Coverage for Surviving Spouses for Life (Download Information Regarding this Amendment). This enables the deceased's spouse and/or dependents to receive coverage at the group rate. The City and the Line Organization health benefits stop at the death of the members. The rate, though high, is cheaper than the non group rate.

THIS INFORMATION PERTAINS TO COBRA

Police Officers & Firefighter surviving spouses are to follow this procedure

Attach a machine copy of the death certificate to a request for an application for COBRA FOR LIFE and send it to:

They will send the surviving spouse a <u>pre-numbered application</u> allowing the spouse to continue the health coverage the member had at a cost equal to 102% of what the City pays, which includes administrative fees. This is fairly reasonable. <u>Applying for this must be done within 30 days</u>. Benefits are retroactive if the surviving spouse requires medical attention during this interim period.

At this time if a member and spouse are of Medicare age, and reside in an area covered by Aetna, I would strongly recommend they choose that plan over GHI/EBC/CBP.

Also, they would need to consider the respective union plans as those plans would only be available for 36 months, and whether the health plan rider would be a better choice.

THINGS YOU WILL NEED

DEATH CERTIFICATES - Death Certificates are necessary in every step to the successful administration of a decedent's estate. (Usually Funeral will obtain certificates as part of his service at current cost). They are usually needed for:

Pension Bureau

Veterans Administration (if a veteran)

Motor Vehicle Bureau if auto was in deceased's name. 1 for each insurance policy.

Court (If probate is needed).

Your State Department of Revenue to obtain non-tax certificate if real property is involved.

Bank accounts held in Trust for another 1 for each account if property held in a Trust.

Personal Records.

Note: If estate is probated, some of the above will take a Letter Testamentary instead of a Death Certificate.

MARRIAGE CERTIFICATE (With Official Raised Seal):

Social Security, (not necessary if surviving spouse already receiving benefits) Veterans Administration, if a veteran.

LETTERS TESTAMENTARY or LETTERS OF ADMINISTRATION:

Motor Vehicle Bureau, if auto is in the deceased's name.

One for each bank account

Brokerage house account (share of stock or bonds, etc. that were in the deceased's name alone)

DISCHARGE PAPERS: DD 214 - (Original needed)

Social Security, if spouse was not already receiving benefits. Remember that service time counts toward qualification. They will Photostat.

Veterans Administration, if a veteran

PAID FUNERAL BILLS:

1 copy for Pension Bureau

1 copy for Probate Court

1 copy for IRS, if taxable estate.

OTHER THINGS THAT MAY APPLY (usually after burial)

Cancel any leases. (If your parent or loved one rented a home, cancel the lease after clearing out the furnishings) Inform insurance companies.

File life insurance claims for any policies on the person's life, and request that the insurers send you Form 712, Life Insurance Statement (this is a statement about the life insurance that must be filed with the estate tax return).

Make sure the car insurance company continues to cover the person's car until it's sold or transferred to a beneficiary.

Make sure the homeowners policy continues to provide adequate coverage for the person's things until removed from the home.

Notify companies the person did business with.

Cancel credit cards, and close charge accounts.

Have airlines to transfer frequent-flier miles to the primary beneficiary. (Each airline has different policy concerning this issue. Check with carrier about rules)

Consideration should also be given to making pre-death funeral arrangements. This provision, no matter how painful, should be discussed by couples and by parents with their families. Too often, spouse and children spend much too much money on a funeral and do so without really knowing what were the deceased's wishes in this regard (Place of burial, Cremation, etc.)

Consideration should also be given to having a "Family Durable Power of Attorney" (Someone to take over your finances if you become incapacitated or incompetent)

There are no words of comfort at such a difficult time, however, if you have all the necessary information at the ready it will expedite any claim that is pending, make the process run smoothly, and your stress level can be minimized.

JAMES DUDDY, OLD DETECTIVE, RETIRED, DIES Veteran Sleuth Cited by Many Police Commissioners

James DUDDY, a retired detective of the New York Police Department, who saw service under many police commissioners and who was commended for his services by Commissioners ROOSEVELT, BINGHAM and ENRIGHT, died yesterday at his home, 254 Seventy-third street.

Detective DUDDY retired ten years ago while attached to the old 148th Precinct. He was widely known throughout the old Sixth Ward of Brooklyn. He was a son of the late John and Bridget COGAN DUDDY.

He was a member of the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association and the Police Veterans Association. He is survived by his widow Fanny STODDARD DUDDY; a son, James DUDDY, Jr.; three daughters, Mrs. Francis MORRIS, Mrs. Paul DWYER and Mrs. John BRADLEY and a sister, Mrs. Ann MONAHAN.

The funeral will be held at 9:30 A.M. Monday with requiem mass at the Church of Our Lady of Angels, Fourth avenue and Seventy-fourth street, by the Rt. Rev. Mgr. O'HARA. Interment will be at Holy Cross Cemetery.

COP SHOT IN UNDERTAKER SHOP; COMPANIONS TELL OF HOLDUP Empty Beer Containers and Shells Found by Investigators

Patrolman John HOWELLS, attached to Traffic Squad O, was shot through the abdomen early today while he was in the company of a group of men in a room at the rear of the undertaking shop of Dennis KENNEDY at 5723 Roosevelt avenue, Woodside. He was taken to St. John's Hospital, Long Island City where it was said his condition was critical.

Detectives who questioned the men that were with HOWELLS said these men told them two holdup men had entered the shop early this morning, pointed guns at the group and demanded money. HOWELS had placed his service pistol in its holster on a table, they said. As he reached for the weapon, one of the holdup men shot him, according to his companions.

Police officials began an inquiry and inspected the rear room where they said they found a number of pasteboard beer containers. Two empty .38 caliber shells were found in the basement where detectives said they had apparently been thrown through a trap door in the floor of the rear room of the shop upstairs.

While the investigation was underway, however, a general alarm was sent out for two men described by HOWELLS' companions as the holdup men. These were young men, dark complexioned, who wore caps and dark suits.

PATROLMAN SHOT IN FLIGHT FROM CAFÉ BRAWL SUSPENDED Held in Hospital With Man He Is Accused of Wounding

Deputy Police Commissioner LEACH announced today the suspension from the department of Patrolman Phillip FOX, 27, of the Rockaway Beach Station, Queens, now under arrest in the Norwegian Hospital on a charge of felonious assault.

FOX was arrested following the shooting late last night of James GODFREY, 20, of 426 Forty-ninth street, who was critically wounded during an altercation in front of a café at 6120 Third avenue. GODFREY was shot in the stomach.

FOX was shot in the right leg while being chased from the scene by Patrolman Thomas CARROLL of the Fourth Avenue Station. FOX was off duty at the time.

After the felonious assault charge against FOX has been disposed of in magistrate's court, he will appear before Deputy Commissioner LEACH on departmental charges.

There are two versions given by witness of the shooting, police say. According to one, FOX had been drinking and had tried to force his way into the speakeasy despite GOD-FREY's efforts to prevent his entrance, finally becoming enraged and shooting GODFREY at close range.

According to the other FOX had been admitted to the speakeasy and had started an argument with GODFREY, during which he took out his gun and fired.

After the shooting, FOX ran along Third avenue, with Patrolman CARROLL of the Fourth avenue station, pursuing. CARROLL was unable to catch him and finally fired at him after shouting several times. FOX fell with a bullet in his left leg and was taken to the station house where he was recognized as a policeman and arrested before going to the hospital.

SQUIRREL BITES COP-DIES

Patrolman Has Exciting Evening on Beat in Prospect Park

Patrolman William DUNBAR, 30, of 1193 St. Marks avenue, had a 'hot time' in Prospect Park last night. He was not on his day off.

He was on duty and preserving law and order among the thousands who went to seek relief from the heat.

He was musing to himself how lucky he was to be stationed at the recreating centre and was 'pounding the pavement' near the bandstand in the music grove when an excited citizen rushed up and reported that a squirrel had been injured and was causing quite a commotion.

Patrolman DUNBAR rushed to the scene of the excitement and took the squirrel in his arms to render first aid. The squirrel did not take kindly to the samaritan act of one of the city's finest and promptly bit Patrolman DUNBAR on the left hand. In the excitement which followed, the animal was killed.

Patrolman DUNBAR called an ambulance 'not for the squirrel which was now beyond aid' but for himself. Dr. ROSENBLUTH of Methodist Episcopal Hospital responded.

Police Commissioner MULROONEY today announced seven promotions including one from deputy inspector to inspector.

Membership Meeting Minutes June 11, 2019

The meeting was called to order with the Pledge of Allegiance at 7:45pm.






