## PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

**Club Event Changes: "Night at the Knights"** At our May membership meeting we announced that we would be attending a Knights baseball game on June, 18, but due to COVID 19 restrictions at that time the Charlotte Knights were not selling group tickets.

COVID 19 restrictions have now been lifted and a new date will be scheduled and announced at this months membership meeting.

**Barbecue:** Our yearly hamburger & hot dog barbecue dinner during our June membership meeting has been rescheduled for our July membership meeting.

Several club members have contacted me over the past few months about surprise medical bills for medical care they or a family member received that they believed would be covered by their health insurance. Most of these were the result of hospital emergency room visits. There is some good news down the road.

The pandemic relief bill signed into law on December 27, 2020 will go into effect January 1, 2022. Included in the law are provisions that, among other things, end balance billing (the practice of charging patients the difference between the provider charge and the insurance company's allowed amount), ensure that the emergency room care is billed at in-network rates and relieve patients of the burden of negotiating surprise bills with providers.

Hopefully you or a family member will not receive a surprise bill between now and the end of the year. Until then, if you receive a surprise bill here are excerpts of some suggestions that appeared in a Consumer Report article.

#### Fight the Bills

If you're stuck with a surprise medical bill, call the provider and explain that you didn't realize the care, which was essential, would involve out-of-network providers.

The billing office is a good place to start, but don't expect the person who picks up the phone to cut a deal. "The first response will be no, I can't do anything." You have to be persistent. Figure out who in the organization has the authority.

Keep asking for the manager of the person you're talking to—even if that takes you all the way up to the chief financial officer. Then use these tips to help you:

Frame your request around your ability to pay. This may work if you're in a health plan that comes with a high deductible, as a growing number are, or if you're uninsured.

**Talk about wanting to pay** a *fair* **price.** Medical pricing is a system built on discounts: No insurance company would ever pay sticker price, yet that's what's on the bill you receive. Pricing transparency websites such as Healthcare Bluebook - https:// healthcarebluebook.com/ can give you an idea of what health plans actually pay medical providers, often a fraction of the amount charged. Do not feel guilty about asking for a fair and reasonable price.

**The insanity continues:** The LaGrange, GA Police Department has begun training its officers to "shoot to incapacitate" in response to activists' calls for police reform.

The new policy being implemented by LaGrange Police Chief Louis Dekmar is the first of its kind in the United States.

Chief Dekmar said that law enforcement officers have traditionally been taught to shoot for "center mass" – meaning chest, upper torso, and head, instead of shooting places that are less-likely to kill the suspect.

But the new "Shoot to Incapacitate" program that LaGrange police started using in February calls for teaching officers to shoot below the torso, the Atlanta Journal-Constitution reported.

"It's a responsibility, in my opinion, of any police leader to look at options for their police officers so that a deadly force encounter doesn't necessarily end in a deadly result," Chief Dekmar explained.

The course teaches officers that in some situations that would traditionally call for deadly force, they have the option to shoot for a suspect's arms, pelvic region, and legs instead.

The concept behind the program is that shooting these other areas "could stop the threat while increasing the chance that the wounds will not be fatal," according to the Atlanta Journal-Constitution.

Some firearms experts have said the "shoot to incapacitate" protocol isn't just additional training to give officers more options and it requires a lot of work by police departments before implementation.

"It's like another level of force," retired Metro Transit Police Captain William Malone told The Police Tribune. "It's inserting another level of force in between less-lethal and lethal force – it could be lethal force, or the guy could keep coming for you. You just won't know til it happens and then it may be too late."

Malone, who taught firearms for 20 years and served as commander of his department's Special Response Team (SRT), said the added component of having to decide where to try to shoot the suspect so as not to possibly not kill them could delay some officers long enough to get them or other people killed.

"The chance that something 'could' stop an armed suspect isn't enough," he told The Police Tribune. "Just because you're shot and fall down, that doesn't mean you're 100 percent incapacitated."

"Plenty of times they go down and continue shooting, or they don't go down at all and lunge at you or whoever they were going after because you shot them and now they're even more enraged," Malone said.

He said that a lot of things that sound good in the context of an activists' police reform agenda aren't practical for keeping officers safe.

The former firearms instructor pointed out that there's no guarantee that a handgun is going to stop anybody immediately anyway.

"It's already a crapshoot," he said.

"There are only two ways guaranteed to stop a threat by shooting them – that's to hit them in the central nervous system – the brain or spinal cord – or make them bleed enough and cause their blood pressure drop quickly so they lose consciousness," Malone told The Police Tribune. "You're not going to achieve that by telling officers to shoot for an arm or a leg."

This is not the first time Chief Dekmar, who served as president of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) in 2017 and 2018, has made waves and been accused of caving to the mob.

He was one of the first police chief in the South to publicly apologize for his agency's role in the lynching of a black man more than 70 years earlier.

A voice of sanity: It's Not The Police Who Need To Be Retrained (Author unknown)

It's not the police who need to be retrained, it's the public. Don't mouth off, or refuse to comply... that escalates the situation.

Police officers are our sons and daughters, fathers and mothers, brothers and sisters. They're black, white, brown, all colors, all ethnicities, all faiths, male and female, they are us. They see the worst side of humanity... the raped children, the bloody mangled bodies of traffic victims, the bruised and battered victims of domestic violence, homicide victims, body parts... day after day.

They work holidays while we have festive meals with our families. They miss school events with their kids, birthdays, anniversaries, all those special occasions that we take for granted. They work in all types of weather, under dangerous conditions, for relatively low pay.

They have extensive training, but they are human. When there are numerous attacks on them, they become hyper vigilant for a reason, they have become targets. When a police officer encounters any person... any person, whether at a traffic stop, a street confrontation, an arrest, whatever... that situation has the potential to become life threatening. You, Mr & Mrs/Miss Civilian, also have the responsibility of keeping the situation from getting out of control.

Many, the majority, of law enforcement officers are Veterans. They've been in service to this nation most of their lives, whether on the battlefield or protecting us here at home. They are the only thing that stands between us and anarchy in the streets.

If you want to protect your child, teach them respect... for themselves, for you as a parent, for their teachers, for police officers. Police officers do not make the laws, they merely enforce them. If you don't like the law, be proactive in the political process. The police officer doesn't have, or want, the role of judge and jury.

If you get a speeding ticket... were you speeding? Don't blame the cop if you broke the law. Go to court, pay the fine, don't do it again.

It's easy to judge, it's harder to look within oneself and see what your role should be as a citizen, as a responsible person seeing both sides of the issue.

Now that COVID 19 restrictions have been relaxed, we will begin to schedule guest speakers at our membership meetings.



Det. Stanley Dash, 57, a veteran detective assigned to the 6th Precinct Squad in the West Village, died Saturday May 29 from COVID-19.

Dash, a married father of two, was a member of the force for 21 years.

"He was a fun-loving guy," Dash's former partner recalled. "He loved to lie about his age," the former partner said, laughing. "He would always say he was 10 years younger, even to the job. Everyone there thought he was 10 years younger. He changed his card, he was born 63 and he changed it to 73 so even the bosses thought he was younger.

Another source called Dash "a great guy," adding, "He was a good cop and had a great personality.

"He wasn't the typical detective to act with his nose up in the air. He was so personable with everyone and cool headed, when he walked into a room, it was like the Christmas party, he lit up the room. His smile was contagious," the source said.



### Harvey Schlossberg, Cop With a Ph.D. in Defusing a Crisis, Dies at 85



Harvey Schlossberg, a former New York City traffic cop with a doctorate in psychology who choreographed what became a model law enforcement strategy for safely ending standoffs with hostage takers, died on May 21 in Brooklyn. He was 85.

His death, at a hospital, was caused by cardiopulmonary arrest, said his wife, Dr. Antoinette Collarini Schlossberg.

The need for a standard protocol for hostage situations became more pressing in 1971 after the botched rescue of guards during the Attica prison riots in upstate New York. The next year, captives were taken in a Brooklyn bank robbery (the inspiration behind the 1975 Al Pacino film "Dog Day Afternoon") and Israeli athletes were seized and massacred by Palestinian terrorists at the Munich Olympics.

In a pioneering training film he made for the New York Police Department in 1973, Harvey Schlossberg said that in a hostage situation, police officers "all believed, 'If you gave me the right gun with the right bullet, I can put everybody out."

"But I don't think it works that easy," he said. "That's a Hollywood thing."

Instead, he counseled patience and "crisis intervention therapy." Delaying tactics, he said, allowed more time for the criminals to make mistakes and, just as crucially, to develop a rapport with their victims, leaving the hostage-takers less likely to harm them. "Harvey faced an uphill battle getting cops to 'negotiate with killers,' because for 130 years the N.Y.P.D.'s official M.O. in barricade situations had been to issue ultimatums, throw in smoke and tear gas, and, if necessary storm the building," Chuck Wexler, executive director of the Police Executive Research Forum, a law enforcement think tank, said in an email. "Many lives were lost. Harvey changed that."

The "Handbook of Police Psychology" (2011) called Dr. Schlossberg a "father of modern police psychology."

His tactics were successful in early 1973 during a 47-hour standoff at a Brooklyn sporting goods store that had begun with the murder of a police officer. It ended with the escape of nine hostages and the surrender of four gunmen.

The department then established its hostage negotiating team at the initiative of Inspector Simon Eisdorfer, with Dr. Schlossberg developing the team's strategy. Frank Bolz, a lieutenant in the Detective Division, became its first commanding officer.


Unless shots were fired or the hostage-taker was seen or heard specifically threatening a victim, Dr. Schlossberg recommended containing the situation to a confined physical space, opening negotiations, maintaining communications with the gunman and waiting him out to win his confidence and give him an alternative course of action, which might ultimately gain the hostages' release.

"When they talk about de-escalation, he changed the world of policing," Mr. Bolz said in a phone interview. "He trained me and sold me on it. He was the architect, and I was the practitioner."

Dr. Schlossberg was originally assigned as a traffic officer in the accident investigation unit. But one day Commissioner Patrick V. Murphy was perusing a printout of personnel and serendipitously discovered a hidden asset: an officer with a doctorate in psychology. Dr. Schlossberg was soon transferred to the Medical Bureau to perform emotional testing that would determine the well-being of prospective and current police officers. He was promoted to director of psychological services in 1974.

He went on to coach thousands of officers in hostage negotiating. One was a Boston police sergeant, William Bratton, who would rise through the ranks to lead the police departments in Boston, Los Angeles and New York City.

Dr. Schlossberg's hostage-negotiating strategies accounted for all sorts of eventualities. He would advise, for example, against summoning a spouse or a priest to the scene of a crisis — a Hollywood tactic, he said, that often backfired because the hostage-taker's rage might be rooted in family tension to begin with.



And, as he wrote in his memoir, "Psychologist With a Gun" (1974, with Lucy Freeman), words were usually the best tools in disarming a criminal: "Drop that gun." "I won't drop it ... it's a new gun." "Well, then lay it down."

Harvey Schlossberg, a grandson of immigrants from Eastern Europe, was born on Jan. 27, 1936, in Manhattan to Harry and Sally (Frankel) Schlossberg. His father was a mechanic, his mother a homemaker.

After graduating from Eastern District High School in Brooklyn, he earned a bachelor's degree from Brooklyn College in 1958 as a chemistry major and joined the Police Department at \$4,000 a year (about \$37,000 today) to pay for his postgraduate studies.


When he wore his uniform home for the first time, his mother didn't recognize him. He barely recognized himself. "I felt taller than usual," he recalled in his memoir.

For his graduate studies he took night courses, leading to a master's degree in psychology from Long Island University and a doctorate in clinical psychology from Yeshiva University's Graduate School of Arts and Sciences in 1971.

His marriage to Cynthia Marks ended in divorce.

In addition to his wife, Dr. Collarini Schlossberg, who is chairwoman and associate professor of the Division of Criminal Justice, Legal Studies and Homeland Security at St. John's University in Queens, he is survived by four sons from his first marriage, Mark, Alexander, James and Steven Schlossberg; a daughter, Anna Elizabeth Schlossberg, from his second marriage; and two grandchildren.

Dr. Schlossberg founded the Police Department's psychological services division, where he pioneered treatment for violence-prone officers.

"In confessing to psychological problems, cops risked having their gun taken away and being put on clerical work," said Stefan Forbes, director of "Hold Your Fire," a documentary profile of Dr. Schlossberg that won the 2020 Library of Congress Lavine/Ken Burns Prize for Film. "The 'rubber gun squad' was seen as the ultimate humiliation. Harvey helped remove some of that stigma, which persists today." Mr. Forbes added: "It's important to remember what an outsider Harvey was in the N.Y.P.D. In a top-down, paramilitary, predominantly Irish police culture of command and control, in walked an iconoclastic Jewish intellectual pacifist, a beat cop with a Ph.D. in psychology."

But as a curly-haired, mustachioed officer from the streets who sported gold rings and a flashy watch, Dr. Schlossberg related to his colleagues. As Dr. Collarini Schlossberg said in the film: "He was a very humble man, who spoke in thick Brooklynese. He was one of them."

Dr. Schlossberg expanded his work into profiling crime suspects, including the so-called .44-caliber serial killer known as Son of Sam in the mid-1970s.

After leaving the police force in 1978, Dr. Schlossberg was chief psychologist for the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey from 1990 to 1999 and for the Police Department in Rye, N.Y., from 1988 to 1994. He taught from 1974 to 1982 at the John Jay College of Criminal Justice in New York and was an associate professor at St. John's for 27 years. He also maintained a private practice in Forest Hills, Queens, where he lived.

Dr. Schlossberg, who kept a portrait of Freud in his office, described his approach to a gunman in a standoff this way: "Let me see if I can see the world the way he sees it, see what he's feeling, what's pressuring him and then see what the alternate types of solutions are. And then I can offer them to him. And maybe he'll be able to see the same thing. It's kind of entering into his madness to help him find solutions."

In the Brooklyn sporting goods store siege, he said, when the gunmen sent out a note asking for a doctor and food, he knew that the police were doing the right thing by waiting, because, he knew, the gunmen had been bluffing when they insisted that they were willing to resist to the death.

As he told The New York Times in 1973, "If you're worried about food, you don't want to die."

### NYPD Medical Assistance & Durable Medical Supplies For Active And Retired Members And Their Families

The NYPD supplies oxygen therapy equipment, oxygen concentrators, portable oxygen, electric hospital beds, hip chairs, walkers, hoyer lifts, slings, orthro-biotic chairs, geriatric chairs, pulmo-aide equipment, wheel chairs, commodes, canes, crutches, trapeze bars, tent unit therapy and intravenous stands to its members and their families free of charge. Other equipment may be available upon request. You will need a prescription from your doctor. The items will be delivered to the home.

It also supplies ambulance service to transport none-ambulatory patients from their residence to medical facilities, from medical facilities service are highly trained EMT's as well as certified Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation experts. The patient must be active or retired member of the NYPD, their spouse, unmarried dependant children, father, mother, father-in-law, mother-in-law and brothers and sisters **who reside with the member and are supported by that mamber**. The ambulance can travel **up to 250 miles** outside the city but one point must be within the city.

This service cannot be used for EDP transfers, emergency maternity transfers, known air bourn communicable disease transfers, intensive care transfers or any patient with open or oozing wounds. **This service is available Monday to Friday from 0700 to 2300 hrs**. If this service is needed at other hours it may be available upon request.

### **6 Summer Health Tips for Seniors**

Ideally, in the summer seniors will be able to spend time inside an air conditioned space when not outside. When venturing out in the heat, these tips will help seniors stay healthy and cool through the summer months.

#### 1. Increase Liquids

Increasing liquids is in general a good idea for seniors but even more so in the hot summer. Especially when going out in the heat, seniors should drink extra liquids leading up to, during and after spending time outside.

Ideally choose unsweetened beverages such as water, iced tea or fruit flavored water over sweetened beverages. Make sure to pack a water bottle to take with you when spending time outside in the summer.

### 2. Stick with Light, Loose Fitting Clothes

Another way to help stay cool in the heat is by wearing the right clothes. Avoid wearing dark or tight clothes outside in the summer. Instead, opt for light, loose fighting clothes. This will help the body regulate temperature and release excess heat.

#### 3. Stav Protected From the Sun

Besides wearing light, loose clothes, wear sunglasses to protect eyes and a wide brimmed hat to offer protection from the sun. In addition, make sure to apply (and reapply) a broad spectrum sunscreen that is at least SPF 30 and protects against UVA and UVB rays.

When possible, stay under shade when outside. Avoid peak hours of hot temperatures, between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., for any yard work or other activities that will exacerbate heating the body's temperature.

### 4. Properly Store Medications

Besides keeping body temperature cool during the summer, it is also important to keep medications at cooler temperatures during the summer. According to <a href="mailto:care.com">care.com</a>, some medications can become less effective when stored over 86°F.

For this reason, be careful not to keep medications outside, in a hot car or anywhere else that can stay warm and humid.

### 5. Be Attentive of Unfamiliar Surroundings

Fall risks are generally associated with colder months when ice and snow can make surfaces extra slippery. However, an often overlooked senior summer health tip is to stay attentive of surroundings in the summer especially when traveling.

When going on trips or vacations, the risk for falling can be higher due to being in new surroundings. It can be easy to get swept up in finding the best photo op or videoing a new destination instead of looking at the ground. Therefore, it is important to stay attentive and pay attention to terrain in unfamiliar surroundings to avoid trips and falls.

### 6. Cool Down When Feeling Hot

If feeling hot, it is important to cool down before body temperature continues to rise. Besides drinking adequate fluids, come inside from the heat and take a lukewarm bath or shower if possible. If that is impossible, put cold, wet cloths on the neck, wrists, ankles or wherever else on the body that feels comfortable.

If a senior has confusion, weakness, cramping, heavy sweating or sudden shift in amount of sweating, contact 911 immediately. These could be signs of dangerous heat injuries that may need further medical attention.

Good news – The NYC retirement system posted an estimated 18% return on investments for the seven months ended Jan 31, 2020 according to a report from NYS Comptroller Thomas DiNapoli.

Additionally DiNapoli reported that the NYS Pension Fund increased by a record 33.5% during the fiscal year running from April 1, 2020 to March 31, 2021.





### NATIONAL NYCPD 10-13 ORG. NYPD ID CARD RENEWAL

For those members that reside locally, the ID Card Section (646-610-5150) is now on 2<sup>nd</sup> floor at 1PP, opposite the Operations Unit.

They will only renew a retiree ID card that has less than 3 months before expiration date or already expired

Please do not go at the end of month due to numerous active MOS retiring and it is very crowded.

Using the above number, call beforehand to make sure there is no promotion on the day you are going because it can get crowded and active will have priority.

For those out of state members, please follow the instructions when mailing in ID cards. I have received ID cards mailed to me using regular first-class mail. The issue with this is that it is not tracked and, therefore, not guaranteed that I will receive it. The Priority Mail procedure provides a tracking number so that the ID card can be accounted for throughout the entire mailing process.

If your ID card is lost or stolen, you must make a police report with your local precinct or police department for lost or stolen property and a copy of the report must accompany the ID card application. **The application will not be processed without a report.** 

The NYPD card section uses the photo that is in their system since November of 2002. If your ID card was issued prior to this period, you will have to appear at the ID Card Section in person to take a new photo. You cannot send in a passport photo or a jpeg file photo to update the picture.

**ONLY** cards issued after November 1, 2002, can be renewed this way. In all other circumstances, members will have to personally visit 1 P.P.

Regarding HR218/LEOSA qualifications: If your ID card does not have an expiration date, it does qualify as a valid ID card under the provisions of the laws. Unless you want to get a current photo on your ID card, you are not required to do so in order to satisfy the qualification. Also remember that some police departments in North Carolina that do the qualifications will require a current ID card so make sure that you check your expiration dates.

A completed PD form **MUST** accompany the card. The form can be downloaded from the National website; <a href="https://www.nationalnycpd10-13.org/">https://www.nationalnycpd10-13.org/</a>

Additionally, ID card expiration dates will be increased from 5 to 8 years.

If your card has no expiration date, you do not need to have a new card issued. Your card is perpetually current. Keep it.

THE NATIONAL IS AUTHORIZED TO DELIVER MEMBERS CARDS TO 1 P.P. AND RETURN SAME TO THE MEMBER.

To insure security in the transfer of cards to and from our members the following procedure **MUST** be adhered to:

Items **MUST** be sent to the National in a USPS Flat Rate Priority Mail envelope. You will receive a tracking number from post office. **DO NOT REQUEST SIGNATURE OF RECIPIENT**. The postage is \$7.95.

Place in the envelope: your PD ID card, the completed PD Form, and a check in the amount of \$7.75 made out to National NYCPD 10-13 Org.(to cover the cost of priority mail return of your new card).

There is a new procedure for pre-merger Transit and Housing Police retirees.

The below information was received in an email from the NYCPD Transit Bureau Personnel Unit and has been verified.

#### Renewal of Transit ID card that is expired or nearing expiration.

For the retirees that live out of state, they can email a copy of their driver's license and id card and in the body of the email they can put their name, address and a phone number where they can be reached. We run a background check to make sure no one is wanted (you'd be surprised).

Also they need to attach a digital photo of themselves from the waist up in front of a neutral colored wall (please no hats or sunglasses).

We need a digital photo, not a photo of a photo, to put on a new id card that we mail certified.

Please tell your members they can call the Personnel Unit at 1-718-610-4660 and we will be more than happy to walk them thru the process.

Be well and keep collecting those retirement checks.

Hopefully, the COVID 19 Virus will behind us and most of our older members have been vaccinated and by summer most of the country and world will also have been vaccinated and we return to some normalcy in our lives. I do not know about you, but I am looking forward to the summer and all the barbeques, picnics, and other great events that we all enjoy. I am not rushing the spring and summer time, but I always look forward to our National Convention. So, save the dates for our September 12-14, 2021, 32<sup>nd</sup> Annual Convention being held at Villa Roma Resort.

Below is legislation being supported by the National NYCPD 10-13 Organizations, Inc., for the 2022-2023 legislative session. The obligation and the focus of the National is to support legislation which helps benefit our members and their families. As you are aware, for the past decade we have rigorously submitted Health Protection legislation. This is one of the most important pieces of legislation for our members and their families. Even though we are protected by NYC's Administrative Code, intro 580, which gives us protection for our Health Insurance and Medicare Reimbursement, it only takes the Mayor and the NYC Council a strike of the pen to change these laws. This has already been done to NYS retirees, by changing the Civil Service Laws. It also has been done in other states and cities throughout the country. As I have reported recently, and as you are aware of by now, N.Y. State and N.Y.C are crying poverty due to the COVID-19 virus. Even with the Federal Stimulus Package that will send New York State & City approximately one hundred million dollars ballout funds. The Governor and Mayor are still talking about raising taxes and cutbacks. We have already been told by our Key Bill sponsors and co-sponsors that any legislation that has a Fiscal Note (COLA Bills) attached to it will be difficult to move forward this year. It should also be noted that for the 3d year in a row, the state is looking to freeze the Medicare Part B reimbursement at the current rate for retirees. We, along with the Alliance of Public Retiree Organizations of New York and its numerous organizations are strongly opposing this proposal.

It is important for us to support this type of legislation, as that would set a precedent to protect retirees who were guaranteed these benefits. Upon retirement, retirees

UFT Leader Tries To Dispel Retiree Fears About Medicare Shift

'Can Keep Your Doctor, Will Protect Benefits, And No Premiums'

By RICHARD STEIER May 7, 2021 the Chief- Leader

United Federation of Teachers President Michael Mulgrew said May 5 that he has been besieged by nervous union retirees concerned about "horror stories" regarding Medicare Advantage plans that are vastly different from the one he and other city labor leaders are pursuing in tandem with the city Office of Labor Relations.

"Everyone was looking at Medicare Managed Risk and Medicare Advantage individual plans," he said in a phone interview. "Everybody was quoting factual things about the Medicare Individual Plan. But that's not what we're interested in."

'Can Keep Their Doctors'

And, he continued, "We're not interested in anybody's off-the-shelf group plan."

Under the group plan being sought by the Municipal Labor Committee, the health-care-negotiating arm of city-employee unions, a key condition will be that "everybody can go to any doctor they currently have, even if they're not in-network," Mr. Mulgrew said. "We're not giving anything away. The goal is to protect all of the benefits, if not increase them, and keep them premium-free."

In addition to his obligation to UFT retirees to get the best deal possible in the switch to Medicare Advantage from the current Senior-Care plan, he said he has a personal stake: both he and his wife have their mothers enrolled under the union's plan.

The changes involve MediGap, the 20-percent of health-care costs not covered by the basic Medicare plan, which is "what we negotiate all the time," Mr. Mulgrew said of the talks with the city.

A steady stream of annual double-digit increases in health-care costs has prompted OLR to press the MLC since Mayor de Blasio took office in 2014 to find billions in health-care savings, which it has succeeded in doing. But each dollar spent to cover those rising costs, the UFT leader noted, was one less dollar available for wage increases.

#### 'Last Thing I Want'

"The last thing I want is for health care to be at the center of every collective-bargaining negotiation," Mr. Mulgrew said. "This is our way of not sitting back" while the rapid growth in health costs cuts into the pie available for pay raises and other benefits being improved.

Speaking of the portion of health-care costs not paid for by basic Medicare, he said, "If we go to a Medicare Advantage group plan, now the 20 percent is federally reimbursable. It's not easy to do, but it's the smart thing to do."

A day earlier, he had hosted a Town Hall meeting largely via conference call that wound up reaching 8,500 anxious, sometimes-angry UFT retirees. Not only had he been able to calm the fears of many of them, Mr. Mulgrew said, but the dialogue with the retirees "was great because I got some ideas from it" that will be explored in discussions with city negotiators.

Two weeks earlier, Labor Commissioner Renee Campion and Deputy Commissioner, Labor Strategies Claire Levitt had also spoken of the difficulty of cutting through the misinformation about what the two sides were discussing in trying to find a private insurer to take over administration of the retiree health plans. They expect that move to bring management efficiencies that would allow, Ms. Campion said, the city and unions to "increase quality and benefits while reducing costs to the city."

She had noted that one reason these aims could be accomplished was that the city wanted significant savings but was "not looking to save as much money as possible" by reducing benefits or boosting co-pays.

Ms. Levitt, speaking about the same opportunity Mr. Mulgrew subsequently mentioned regarding what was "federally reimbursable," had noted that "the higher the plan is [in terms of service delivery], the more [providers] get from Medicare."

**Uncertainties Linger** 

Even after they laid out their expectations, uncertainties remained among retirees, reflected in both the questions Mr. Mulgrew faced from UFT retirees and numerous letters written to this newspaper over the past two months. Part of the reason is that the city and the MLC have still not chosen a provider, making it impossible to address questions about particular benefits because they differ among those bidding for the contract; another is what some retirees have claimed is a reluctance to include them in the discussions.

Stu Eber, the president of the Council of Municipal Retiree Organizations, said a number of unions and their leaders in recent weeks have tried to offer a better sense of where the discussions are going and what the change is likely to mean. He noted that a list of 22 questions he had submitted about the shift had apparently been circulated among members of the MLC's technical and steering committees.

(Mr. Mulgrew, speaking a few hours earlier, acknowledged that union leaders themselves "still have questions. This is highly technical crap, but we realize every little detail matters.")

"Our initial point was they should be including retirees in the process," said Mr. Eber, a former president of the Managerial Employees Association. As more information has emerged, he added, "We do understand this is not the worst of all possible Medicare Advantage plans. We still need information about gate-keepers," referring to the need for approvals by the eventual provider before both tests and procedures can be done in cases where that isn't required under current Medicare coverage.

#### Some Pre-Authorization

Ms. Levitt acknowledged last month that pre-authorization was likely to be required, regardless of which of the finalists got the contract, for matters including "hospital inpatient, behavioral-health inpatient, ambulance [transport] and step therapy for certain high-cost drugs." But while traditional Medicare didn't require prior approval for some of those, she noted, "Medicare regulations state that 'Medicare covers ambulance services only if they are furnished to a beneficiary whose medical condition is such that use of any other means of transportation is contraindicated."

One union official, speaking conditioned on anonymity, said whichever finalist was chosen, there would not be a gate-keeper regarding referrals to specialists.

Mr. Eber also pointed out that two leading Manhattan hospitals, Sloan-Kettering and the Hospital for Special Surgery, don't currently accept Medicare Advantage, and wanted to know if that would change under the city's version of it. The union official said both those hospitals would be participating in the program.

Mr. Eber said that, his remaining reservations notwithstanding, "I think we've gotten a better explanation as to how they're going to save the money. That's encouraging: that they're listening."

He was also pleased when told that Mr. Mulgrew had said that the savings from the shift would be placed in the MLC Stabilization Fund, as well as helping to cover optical and dental benefits and hearing aids that are currently paid for from union welfare funds.

But Mr. Eber said that during a meeting of the MEA's retiree chapter earlier that day, one of the concerns was the confusion that might result during the transition to the Medicare Advantage program.

#### Not Quite That Simple

"It's going to be a problem to explain to thousands of retirees, 'It's the same Medicare, it's just a different card," he said. He cited one member who after retiring from city service had gone to work for the Greater New York.

Hospital Association and was computer- and Medicare-savvy, but still had a problem with Medicare Advantage and "it took him three months to navigate the system."

The problem could be compounded, Mr. Eber said, for those retirees who are not fully versed in working on computers, or in cases where programs used are difficult to understand. Mentioning one provider that is believed to be a finalist for the contract, he said, "What are they gonna do when the problem is not with Aetna but the computer program they wrote?"


Mr. Mulgrew had spoken of overcoming retiree fears that were rooted in partial information, remarking, "These horror stories about Medicare Advantage individual plans, they're true, but they're very narrow network plans," as opposed to the far-larger group plan the MLC will be signing on for.

Mr. Eber said, "We thank the MLC for being responsive [recently]. Individual presidents are talking to their retirees. Progress is being made, but we'd like to see more of that."

Mr. Mulgrew, asked whether retirees would be apprised of the terms of whatever plan was tentatively accepted before the MLC formally approved it, said, "I think we'll be able to get that done. There's no obligation at that point to do anything [to finalize], regardless of what the city says."

He too spoke of forward steps being taken, and in a more-positive light than Mr. Eber.

"We've made a lot of progress getting to a plan that we can all be proud of," the UFT president said.

# LEGAL GUIDANCE ON CITY COUNCIL INT. NO. 2220-A AND THE ELIMINATION OF QUALIFIED IMMUNITY

Dear PBA, SBA AND CEA Members,

Please find below a letter from attorneys who represent members of the service in civil suits. This letter contains legal guidance on our new policing environment in light of the passage of City Council Int. No. 2220-A.

Re: City Council Bill Int. No. 2220-a-21 and the Elimination of Qualified Immunity

Dear Captain, Sergeant and Officer: As you may be aware, the City Council has passed a local law applicable to New York City Police Officers that creates another method by which you can be sued for damages. In a troubling aspect of the law, the City Council has eliminated your ability to defend your actions by asserting a "qualified immunity" defense. As counsel to the members of the PBA, SBA, and CEA who are sued civilly and not represented by the City, we write to share with you our joint legal assessment of this proposed legislation to ensure that you understand what it means for you, your families, and your professional responsibilities. Our hope is that the below guidance will educate you so that you may take the necessary steps to fulfill your sworn oath and legal obligations to ensure the safety of the citizens of the City, while simultaneously protecting yourself and your fellow officers from the consequences of this newly enacted legislation.

Introduction No. 2220-a-21, passed by the City Council on March 25, 2021 and awaiting the Mayor's signature, creates a local cause of action against NYPD members under the New York City Administrative Code. The law, which applies to NYPD members and the NYPD itself, allows an individual to sue a police officer for (1) excessive force and/or (2) unreasonable search and seizure. This cause of action provides for monetary damages and may be filed in addition to any other claims available under federal and state law. No physical injury is required: the proof of a violation is sufficient to sustain a lawsuit against you. Of course, the determination whether you actually used excessive force or engaged in an unlawful search and seizure may be made by the City, a judge or a jury. If the plaintiff prevails, the city - and potentially the officer – is required to pay damages and the legal fees to the plaintiff's attorney.

Significantly, the legislation specifically eliminates qualified immunity as a defense, but only as to the new City law. Qualified immunity is a judicially created defense that protects all government employees, not just police officers, from liability. Qualified immunity means that government employees are immune from lawsuits if they acted reasonably and not in violation of a "clearly established statutory or constitutional right." It is designed to protect all government employees and officials from lawsuits and liability when they perform their duties in good faith and within what one reasonably believes to be the scope of existing law. Unless there is clearly established law to the contrary, qualified immunity protects your good-faith actions and allows you the freedom to make decisions and take action without fear of being sued.

Although these terms are often confused, qualified immunity is not indemnification. Indemnification is the legal obligation of the City to pay all damages suffered by a plaintiff as a result of actions taken by its employees – including police officers – when acting within the scope of their employment. Indemnification protects individual police officers from personal liability for any monetary damages, except punitive damages. This new law does not by its terms affect your right to indemnification.

The New York City Police Department should ensure that all members, regardless of rank, are protected from civil liability. During the current administration, however, the City has increasingly declined indemnification and has required police officers to make personal financial contributions in civil settlements even for good-faith mistakes of law or fact. We have no expectation that the City's practice of requiring police officers to pay damages from their own pocket will be discontinued. Thus, the repeal of qualified immunity and the enactment of this new legislation significantly increases the possibility that you will be required to write a check and pay damages from your own pocket if you are sued for an event which occurs while you are on duty.

Further, since this new legislation allows suit in Supreme Court in the counties in New York City, rather than federal court, and permits the court to award plaintiff's attorney fees, we anticipate a flood of lawsuits against members of the NYPD.

As a direct result of the passage of this law, and the unavailability of the defense of qualified immunity under its provisions, we advise that you proceed with caution when taking any police action which could lead to physical engagement with any person, and avoid physical engagement to the greatest extent possible while also assuring your own safety and the safety of others. Also, you are strongly cautioned against engaging in any stop & frisk (unless doing so for your own or others' safety), search of a car, residence, or person unless you are certain that you are clearly and unequivocally within the bounds of the law, notwithstanding that your actions may be taken in good faith. It is a very real risk, particularly in the current environment, that each time you conduct a search or use force during the course of your tour of duty, your actions may subject you and your family to civil liability and monetary damages based on a suit brought by the person with whom you are interacting, a reality of our job that is made worse by this law and the City's increasing propensity to decline indemnification to our officers.

**UPCOMING CONTRACTUAL RAISES**: The current contract between the Lieutenants Benevolent Association and the City of New York expires on February 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2022. - July 1, 2021 = 1.25% wage increase for those members in the rank of lieutenant with five (5) or more years (completion of five (5) years in rank of Lieutenant) on that date.
- November 1, 2021 = 1.00% wage increase for those members in the rank of lieutenant with five (5) or more years (completion of five (5) years in rank of Lieutenant) on that date.

Also, some Borough Investigation's Commanding Officers are specifically focusing in on Lieutenants who have inadequate or no entries in their Activity Logs, even though the Lieutenant is present and involved at an incident(s).

They are also reviewing Lieutenants' and Sergeants' Activity Logs to ascertain if Lieutenants are properly inspecting the Activity Logs of those they supervise. The following information is provided so that our members may re-familiarize themselves with the pertinent Patrol Guide Procedures:

- \* Patrol Guide Procedure 202-13, Step 22: PLATOON COMMANDER
  - 22. Inspect and sign ACTIVITY LOG (PDI12-I45) of patrol supervisors daily.
- \* Patrol Guide Procedure 202-12, Step 9: SPECIAL OPERATIONS LIEUTENANT
  - 9. Inspect and sign ACTIVITY LOGS (PD112-145) of Anti-Crime, School Safety, SNEU, CPU and, where applicable, Peddler Enforcement Sergeants each month.
- \* Patrol Guide Procedure 202-15, Step 17: INTEGRITY CONTROL OFFICER
  - 17. Inspect and sign ACTIVITY LOG (PD112-145) of sergeants.
- \* Patrol Guide Procedure 202-10, Step 9: EXECUTIVE OFFICER
  - 9. Inspect and sign ACTIVITY LOGS (PD112-145) of platoon commanders, special operations lieutenants and patrol supervisors at least once a month.

Please re-familiarize yourselves with and follow the above procedures, and other Patrol Guide procedures pertaining to Activity Logs, to avoid being possibly penalized by Departmental investigative units.

The weekend shooting of three people in New York City's Times Square tells you all you must know about life in the Big Apple under the stewardship of Mayor Bill de Blasio and the legions of feckless elected officials and enablers dangerously masquerading as leaders.

Police officer Alyssa Vogel heard reports of shots fired at West 45th Street and Broadway over the Mother's Day weekend.

She hurried to the scene with nary a thought for her own personal safety. That's what cops do on a daily basis.

She observed fellow officers treating two wounded bystanders. One victim, a 23-year-old female tourist from Rhode Island, was shot in the leg.

Prior to the police rendering assistance, she was heard screaming: 'I don't want to die. I have a two-year-old. Please help me, I'm shot. Please help me.'

No one came to her assistance.

Instead, amid today's 'defund and denounce the police' culture, scores of bystanders took videos of the bloodshed. It is likely that the victim will have the bullet lodged in her leg for the rest of her life.

The other victim was a 43-year-old New Jersey woman who was shot in the foot.

When officer Vogel was advised there was another victim up the block, she raced to that scene and encountered a four-year-old girl who had been shot in the leg.

She quickly perused the girl's body for other injuries, tied a tourniquet around her leg to stem the bleeding, hoisted her into her arms, and ran through a crowd to the nearest ambulance. The only thing on her mind was saving the child's life.

This was the second incident in a month where a tourist was hit by random gunfire while walking in the Times Square area.

Just weeks earlier in April, a 44-year-old Kansas man who was visiting New York for the first time was struck in the shoulder on the corner of West 38th Street and Eighth Avenue. He was returning to his hotel after attending a baseball game. He won't be visiting the city again any time soon.

Because these incidents occurred in an area universally regarded as the Crossroads of the World, they received global news coverage. Mayor de Blasio thought it was prudent to weigh in on the matter.

Feigning indignation on the latter incident, he called it 'horrible and unacceptable' before adding with a flourish, 'this kind of thing should not happen in our city. There's a lot of ways we can address it.'

'The truth is New York City cannot afford to defund the police,' he said while also mentioning that he lived nearby.

One of the victims, Wendy Magrinat, 23, from Rhode Island, told how onlookers began filming as she pleaded for help after being shot in the leg. She is expected to survive

The only other time he voiced such concern for a victim, was the recent random stomping of an elderly Asian woman by a man on lifetime parole for killing his mother.

In that press conference, he also mentioned that he lived nearby.

As of May 2, more than 460 people have been shot in the city this year, compared with 259 last year and 239 the year before.

The fact that over 90 per cent of those victims were Black or Hispanic, and most of the shootings occurred north of 96th Street in Manhattan, or in distressed neighborhoods throughout the city's outer boroughs, makes the implicit bias of these purported leaders glaringly apparent.

There has been no outrage from Yang.

Nor was there any outrage from anyone in the political establishment when a one-year-old boy was shot and killed while sitting in a stroller at a July 4 barbecue last summer.

There was also eerie silence when a six-year-old witnessed her father being gunned down while she was holding his hand as they crossed a Bronx street. Both were African American.

The suspect in the shooting of the Kansas man is in custody. Not surprisingly, he has a long criminal history despite being just 21 years old.

The 31-year-old suspect in the latter shooting has been identified. He, too, is a career criminal who was walking the streets despite being arrested last year for the random attack of a stranger. In this incident, he was trying to kill his brother over a personal dispute.

There is little doubt that he will soon be arrested and indicted for the shooting of three innocent people.

Hopefully, he will be held on high bail because his offenses are some of the few crimes that are still eligible for bail in de Blasio's dystopian New York.

As far as I am concerned, there are scores of unindicted co-conspirators who should also face justice for their role in the city's descent Into lawlessness.

Let's start with Governor Andrew Cuomo, who never met a murderer he did not want to parole, Mayor de Blasio, who never passes up an opportunity to bash the police, City Council Speaker Corey Johnson, who along with many cohorts was the chief architect of bail and police 'reform' laws which have rendered the cops all but impotent and turned New York into an urban facsimile of a Wild West frontier town.

His 'diaphragm law' disallows cops from putting pressure on a suspects torso, even if they are violently resisting arrest.

Then there are de Blasio enablers such as Police Commissioner Dermot Shea, who like his predecessors William Bratton and James O'Neill, are career police officers who shed their integrity and morality by signing on to the mayor's runaway agenda that is characterized by unfathomable ineptitude and downright lunacy.

In doing so, they defied every oath they ever took as guardians of public safety.

Words have consequences and, since first taking office in 2014, de Blasio's incendiary anti-police rhetoric has already resulted in three police officers being executed while sitting in police vehicles, Molotov cocktails being lobbed at officers and into police vehicles, armed assaults on police facilities, cops being pelted with debris, and wholesale damage to police and public property.

Despite these officials presenting themselves as beacons of hope for communities of color amid a mushroom cloud of systemic racism, they have all been notably silent despite there being a steady increase in violent crime since the 'reforms,' including a 166 per cent uptick in shootings from April 2020 to the same month this year.

The 2020 'reform' package has done nothing but kneecap the police and increase violent crime to levels not seen since the early 1990s. All the progressive changes meant to even the playing field for minority residents has only resulted in scores of Black and Hispanic becoming victims of crime.

#### Important Information for Retirees Who Did Not Get Their Full Medicare Part B Reimbursement

If you retired prior to 2016, you may not have received the full amount for your Medicare Part B reimbursement. If so, you will have to fill out the "differential form" each year.

# Why is it necessary to fill out the Medicare Part B Differential Form every year?

For Retirees whose Medicare Part B effective date is prior to 2016, the amount may change, because of how much a Retiree pays for his or her premiums. It could be an amount in addition to the base amount of between \$1 to \$26.50 per month (\$12 to \$318 per annum) per each individual. Therefore, the Medicare Part B Differential Form is required so that the Office of Labor Relations Health Benefits Program processes the differential amount.

Update Your Beneficiaries May 5, 2021

It is crucial in the event of an emergency that the DEA, the Police Pension Fund, and others with whom you have financial interests have your correct beneficiary information. You will want to ensure that your loved ones are the recipients of your insurance policy, your Annuity Fund, and all your other holdings.

If you are an active member, this can also affect not only City benefits, but the federal Public Safety Officers' Benefit (PSOB) to which your heirs would be entitled if you are killed in the line of duty.

To any member, active or retired, who is suffering from the aftereffects of 9/11, you will want to make sure your affairs are in order should your health decline because of the World Trade Center disaster.

Here is a list of the various agencies and offices you will need to update with your current beneficiary information. Since you can leave your various holdings to different beneficiaries if you so choose, please make sure you keep this checklist handy and update each agency accordingly:

COVID-19 Bill Extension Signed by Governor

May 12, 2021

The COVID-19 bill was first extended until **February 22, 2021**, and then a new State bill was proposed which would extend the deadline to **December 31, 2022**. The bill passed the Assembly and the Senate and the Governor signed the new bill. The DEA sent a Memo of Support. This bill ensures that any first responder who dies from COVID-19 is considered a death in the line of duty, and his or her family will be entitled to line of duty death benefits.

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A Message from the President Regarding the CCRB May 14, 2021

On Friday, May 14, 2021, the DEA filed a lawsuit against the CCRB and its Chair, Fred Davie, challenging the CCRB's recent amendment to their rules, which for the first time in their history sets forth an overbroad and expansive definition of "Abuse of Authority," one of their FADO bases of jurisdiction. Specifically, in this lawsuit we challenge CCRB's vague and ambiguous definition of "abuse of authority" as "misusing police powers." We are further challenging CCRB's determination that abuse of authority includes allegations of (1) "refusals to provide identifying information," (2) "intentional untruthful testimony and written statements made against members of the public," and (3) "sexual misconduct." We are asking the Court to strike down this definition and prohibit CCRB from conducting any investigations or taking any actions based on such definition. This is clearly an illegal power grab by the CCRB which we simply cannot accept.

The combined Article 78 proceeding and Declaratory Judgment action was filed in New York State Supreme Court, New York County. We are currently waiting for an Index number and a Judge to be assigned to the case. As soon as we have any updates, we will let everyone know.

This is only one of several lawsuits we have against CCRB challenging actions they have taken, or are proposing to take. Be assured that so long as CCRB continues to try and expand their powers, we will continue to challenge them each and every step of the way. In the meantime, our success rate against CCRB allegations, both at CCRB and in the Trial Room, remains very high. We must continue to educate our members and ensure that they are fully prepared when being interviewed by CCRB. Thank you for your constant help in this battle.

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

The handbook contains information of all of the medical coverage provided to NYC employees and retirees covered by GHI Comprehensive Benefits Plan.

Additionally, many members are still unaware of the GHI Catastrophic Coverage provided by the Superior Officers Council, Sergeants Benevolent Association and the Detectives Endowment Association.

This benefit was established to assist members and eligible dependents to defray some of the non-covered medical and surgical expenses incurred for services rendered by non-participating or out-of-net-work providers and to provide coverage for catastrophic illness.

The below information is listed on their respective websites.

#### SOC

Members must incur out-of-pocket expenses of more than \$4000.00 per year. (Out-of-pocket expenses are those medical and hospital charges that are considered reasonable and customary by GHI and that are not reimbursed by either the City Health Plan or private insurers).

Members must produce a statement of services, explanation of benefits form and cancelled checks for expenses submitted. Reimbursement is based on a contract year (January - Dec.) 100% of GHI reasonable and customary charges based on the current profile.

The maximum lifetime benefit is 2 million dollars.

The SOC provides a self-funded \$1,000 direct reimbursement payable to the member after the member has submitted, qualified paperwork under the GHI Catastrophic Rider outlined above and the member still has a minimum of at least \$4,000.00 of out-of-pocket qualified. The exclusions and restrictions are the same as the requirement for the catastrophic coverage benefit.

For example you may have paid \$10,000 dollars out-of-pocket expenses, but GHI's payment schedule only deems the reasonable and customary payment for the services to be \$6,000 dollars. The Member pays the remaining \$4,000 dollars of the balance and may now be eligible to receive \$1,000 dollars from the SOC Catastrophic Benefit.

The first \$25,000 is covered for Private Duty Nursing care and thereafter 50% of the remainder with a lifetime cap of \$50,000 per person. The cap for in-hospital Mental Health charges is \$10,000 individual lifetime maximum.

SOC – After a \$4000 annual family deductible, GHI pays 100% of reasonable and customary charges based on a current profile with a maximum lifetime payment of \$250,000 per person.

Limitations: The first \$25,000 is covered for private duty nursing care and 50% thereafter of the remainder with a lifetime cap of \$50,000 per person. The cap for in hospital mental health charges is \$10,000 per person.

#### SBA—Eligibility

SBA members are eligible, as well as spouses/domestic partners and dependent children who are covered under a participating provider organization (PPO) or a point-of service (POS) plan presently being offered by the New York City Employee Health Benefits Program.

#### **Definition of PPO and POS**

Participating provider organization (PPO) indemnity plans offer the option to use either a network provider or an out-of-network provider for medical and hospital care. PPO plans contract with health care providers who agree to accept a negotiated payment from the health plan and predetermined co-payments from subscribers as payment in full for a schedule of medical services provided. When the subscriber uses a non-participating provider, the subscriber is subject to deductibles and/or a higher price schedule. GHI/CBP is an example of a PPO.

Point-of-service (POS) plans offer the freedom to use either a network provider or an out-of-network provider for medical and hospital care.

SBA GHI Catastrophic Coverage continued......

If the subscriber uses a network provider, health care delivery resembles that of a traditional HMO, with prepaid comprehensive coverage and little out-of-pocket costs for services.

When the subscriber uses an out-of-network provider, health care delivery resembles that of an indemnity insurance product, with less comprehensive coverage and subject to deductibles and coinsurance. HIP PRIME POS and U S. Health Care (QPOS) are POS plans.

The SBA H&W Fund catastrophic coverage plan does not cover subscribers of exclusive participating organizations (EPOs) because they do not provide any out of network benefits.

#### The catastrophic coverage benefit

The benefit pays up to 100 percent of reasonable and customary eligible expenses after a \$2,000 out-of-pocket annual deductible per person has been reached. Eligible out-of-pocket expenses are those SBA H&W Fund medical and hospital expense charges that are considered reasonable and customary by the basic City Health Plan and are not fully reimbursed by the City Health Plan or private group insurers.

#### Benefit limits and maximums

There is a lifetime maximum benefit of \$250,000 per covered person. Within this lifetime maximum are the following:

- (1) Mental health in-hospital care of \$10,000.
- (2) Required and approved private duty nursing is covered in full for the first unpaid \$25,000 and then at 50 percent for the remainder up to a lifetime maximum of \$50,000.

Services or charges not covered by the catastrophic benefit

In addition the benefit exclusions of the SBA H&W Fund, the catastrophic benefit does not cover outpatient psychiatric care and prescription drug charges. Ineligible charges such as experimental procedures or services not approved by the member's health plan are likewise not covered by this benefit. Medical, surgical and hospital charges incurred for services rendered by non-participating PPO providers or out-of-network POS providers must be approved by the member's health plan.

#### Submitting an SBA catastrophic benefit claim

Once you have reached the \$2,000 out-of-pocket, per-person annual deductible, obtain and submit the catastrophic claim benefit form to the Fund office for processing. Instructions are printed on the form.

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DEA—There are two parts to the DEA Catastrophic coverage. The first part is an extra rider that the DEA purchased through GHI. There is a \$4,000 deductible (retired members) per calendar year.

Claims for non-participating doctors are submitted through GHI for their basic allowance. Because GHI's payment schedule is so low the member always has an out of pocket expense. When the difference between what your doctor's charges and what GHI allows exceeds \$4,000 you may apply for the DEA catastrophic benefit.

(For example. Bills submitted to GHI are for \$20,000, GHI's basic allowance is \$5,000, your responsibility is the remaining \$15,000. You would send your GHI statements showing the above to the DEA, we would in turn forward it to GHI to be reprocessed under the DEA/GHI Catastrophic Rider. Of the remaining \$15,000 out of pocket expense\*\*\* GHI would minus the \$4,000 deductible and then GHI would send you a check for \$11,000. (Maximum benefit lifetime per family \$250,000).

The second part of the DEA catastrophic benefit is when you receive the Catastrophic payment from GHI, send the statement showing the \$4,000 deductible was met to the DEA and then the DEA itself will issue you a check for an additional \$3,000.

\*\*\* Please be advised that if GHI does not make an allowance for services rendered, that specific service will not be included in the calculations for catastrophic coverage.

There is also an additional benefit for Retired members under the DEA Catastrophic program . If your out of Pocket expense does not exceed \$4,000 but does exceed \$2,000

The DEA will refund expense between \$2,000 & \$4,000.

# Understanding Different September 11th Assistance Programs

The James Zadroga 9/11 Health and Compensation Act of 2010 (Zadroga Act) authorized the World Trade Center (WTC) Health Program and the September 11th Victim Compensation Fund (VCF) to serve the 9/11 responder and survivor communities. Both programs have their own distinct mission, eligibility criteria, and enrollment process.

Enrolling in one program does not automatically enroll you in the other.



#### World Trade Center (WTC) Health Program

Provides: Medical monitoring and treatment of WTC-related health conditions for 9/11 responders and survivors

Administered by: National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), part of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), part of U.S.

Department of Health and Human Services (HHS)

Serves: Responders at the WTC and related sites in New York City. Responders to the Pentagon and Shanksville, Pennsylvania sites. Survivors who were present in the dust or dust cloud, and/or lived, worked, or went to school in the WTC Health Program's New York City Disaster Area.

**Deadline:** None. The WTC Health Program is authorized until 2090.

More info: Care is provided through Clinical Centers of Excellence (CCEs) in the New York metropolitan area and a Nationwide Provider Network (NPN). Each CCE employs 9/11 health experts who have been diagnosing, treating, and linking conditions to 9/11 exposures since 2001. The NPN provides care through local medical providers across the country.

#### September 11th Victim Compensation Fund (VCF)

**Provides:** Financial compensation for physical injuries, illnesses, or deaths that happened as the result of the 9/11 attacks.

Administered by: U.S. Department of Justice

Serves: Responders and survivors who were present at a 9/11 crash site (New York City, the Pentagon, Shanksville, Pennsylvania), on routes of debris removal, or at any location within the VCF's New York City Exposure Zone at any point from September 11, 2001, through May 30, 2002. Families of deceased individuals may also apply. The VCF does not distinguish between responders and survivors when evaluating eligibility and calculating awards.

**Deadline:** Yes. The VCF is authorized to accept claims through 2090, but you must meet your registration deadlines based on individual circumstances. Learn more at www.vcf.gov/pdf/RegisterChart.pdf

More info: VCF registration is different than filing a claim. Registration preserves your right to file a VCF claim in the future. You do not have to be sick or injured to register. WTC Health Program members with a certified condition have two years after the date on the certification letter to register with the VCF.

# **NYC Health Benefits Program**

**City Coverage for Medicare-Eligible Retirees** 

In order to maintain maximum health benefits, it is essential that you join Medicare Part A (Hospital Insurance) and Part B (Medical Insurance) at your local Social Security Office as soon as you are eligible. If you do not join Medicare, you will lose whatever benefits Medicare would have provided.

#### **Medicare Enrollment**

You must notify the Health Benefits Program in writing immediately upon receipt of your, or your dependent's, Medicare card by completing the Medicare Part B Reimbursement Application: https://www1.nyc.gov/assets/olr/downloads/pdf/health/med-b-application.pdf

For retirees 65 and older Social Security has sent the IRMA letters indicating your Medicare part B deductions for 2019. When you receive your Medicare reimbursement check in the spring of 2020 you submit that letter, a copy of the 1099 from Social Security and the reimbursement form for any addition money that was withheld. You are also reimbursed for your spouse's Medicare deductions. If you have not filed in the past you can go back and file for up to 3 past years.

#### **Medicare Part B Reimbursement**

The City will reimburse retirees and their eligible dependents for Medicare Part B premiums paid, excluding any penalties. You must be receiving a City pension check and be enrolled as the contract holder for City health benefits in order to receive reimbursement for Part B premiums.

For most retirees, the refund is issued automatically by the Health Benefits Program. If you are currently receiving your pension check through Electronic Fund Transfer (EFT) or direct deposit, your reimbursement will be deposited directly into your bank account. This will be separate from your pension payment. If you don't have EFT or direct deposit, you will receive a check in the mail in June.

The reimbursement amount is based on the standard Medicare Part B premiums. If your Medicare Part B reimbursement amount was less than what you paid in Medicare Part B premiums, excluding penalties, you may be eligible for a Medicare Part B Differential reimbursement. To receive the differential reimbursement, please complete the Medicare Part B Differential Request form (below).

If you were eligible for Medicare Part B Reimbursement for prior years but did not enroll by providing a copy of your Medicare card, reimbursement is limited to the previous three (3) calendar years. To enroll, please complete the Medicare Part B Reimbursement Program Application.

#### 2019 Medicare Part B Premium Reimbursement ANSWERS TO FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

The standard reimbursement amount for Calendar Year 2019 is \$109.00 per person, per month. For those newly enrolled in Medicare in 2019, currently, the standard amount is \$135.50. The reimbursements will be issued in Apr.. If you are currently receiving your pension check through Electronic Fund Transfer (EFT) or direct deposit, your Medicare Part B reimbursement will be deposited directly into your bank account. This will be a separate payment from your pension payment. If you don't have EFT or direct deposit, you will receive a check in the mail in Apr..

Question: How do I enroll for the Medicare Part B reimbursement?

Answer: Complete the Medicare Part B Reimbursement Program Application and return it with a copy of your Medicare card to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit.

Question: I am a City retiree. Is my spouse/domestic partner/Medicare-eligible dependent entitled to the Medicare Part B reimbursement?

Answer: Yes. They are eligible if they are covered under your City health plan and enrolled in Medicare Part B Reimbursement and the health plan has the dependent in Medicare status. Complete the Medicare Part B Reimbursement Program Application and return it with a copy of their Medicare card to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit.

Question: I received the standard premium amount of \$109.00 per month for 2019 for the Medicare Part B reimbursement. However, I paid more than the standard amount. Can I be reimbursed for the difference?



# NYC Health Benefits Program City Coverage for Medicare File W. -

Answer: Yes. If your 2019 monthly Medicare Part B premium was between \$110.00 and \$135.50, you may be eligible for an additional reimbursement amount referred to as a differential payment. In order to receive the differential payment, the retiree and/or dependent must submit a copy of proof of this additional payment (for example, the Form SSA-1099, bank statements, CMS-500 Notice of Medicare Payment Due) to our office for review. If approved, you will receive the differential payment during the first quarter of 2021. For further information and to download the Medicare Part B Differential Request form, visit our website at nyc.gov/hbp.

If, however, you are enrolled in Medicare Part B as of 2016, you should have received reimbursement of \$135.50 per month automatically and no action will be required on your part.

Question: Many people received their reimbursement and I didn't get mine yet. What should I do?

Answer: Medicare reimbursements were deposited directly into the same account that you use for your pension payment. Please check your bank statement.

Question: I don't have direct deposit for my pension payment and still have not received my Medicare reimbursement. What should I do? Answer: You should write to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit. Please include your name, retiree spouse's name (if applicable) retiree's Social Security number, agency from which the retiree retired, current address, telephone number, and a copy of your Medicare card/ your spouse's Medicare card (if applicable). This review process may take up to 8 weeks from receipt of the above information. Question: The reimbursement I received is not the correct amount. What should I do?

Answer: You should write to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit. Include your name, Social Security number, current address and telephone number, and a copy of your Medicare card. State the reason you believe the amount is incorrect. This process may take up to 8 weeks from receipt of the information.

Question: The check that I received is torn/ripped and the bank will not cash it. What should I do?

Answer: You should return the check to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit. Include your name and Social Security number. It may take up to 8 weeks for a replacement check to be issued.

Question: I am the retiree and received a reimbursement for my spouse/domestic partner/Medicare- eligible dependent who died during the reimbursement year. What should I do?

Answer: Contact the Health Benefits Program in writing. Include both the retiree's and deceased individual's name, both Social Security numbers, address, phone number and a copy of the death certificate. Mail the information to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit.

Question: My spouse/dependent was a City retiree who died before the reimbursements were issued. How do I claim the reimbursement?

Answer: You should write to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit. Include the retiree's name and Social Security number, your name, your address, phone number and a copy of the death certificate. Upon receipt of the death certificate, we will contact you if further documentation is required.

Question: Do I have to re-enroll every year for the Medicare Part B Reimbursement?

Answer: No, but if you change your address, or if one of the eligible Medicare Part B recipients dies, you must notify the Health Benefits Program, in writing.

Question: What if my bank account information changes?

Answer: Please notify your pension system directly of any bank account changes. The changes will be automatically used for the Medicare Part B reimbursements.

Question: I paid more than the standard premium for Medicare Part B. Am I entitled to the higher premium reimbursement (IRMAA)?

Answer: You may be entitled to the higher reimbursement through Income Related Monthly Adjustment Amount (IRMAA). Vist our website at nyc.gov/hbp for further information.

#### **IRMAA Medicare Part B Reimbursement**

If you paid more than the standard monthly reimbursement rate for Medicare Part B, as an Income Related Monthly Adjustment Amount (IRMAA), you may be eligible for additional reimbursement. If you submit the required documentation for Medicare Part B IRMAA reimbursement, your reimbursement will be deposited directly into your bank account.

#### U.S. Passport Changes Are Coming: Here's What You Need to Know

Passport changes are coming, and if you plan on traveling in the near future—especially if you're among the 49 million Americans whose passports will expire in the next few years—you need to know what passport changes are in store.

While it may seem easy enough to acquire or renew a passport if and when you plan a trip, the State Department says there's about to be a massive backlog of passport applications. (More on that in a minute.) Plus, passports themselves are going to change. Here's what you should know about both the expected passport application delays and the passport changes coming in the years ahead.

#### U.S. Passport Changes

#### You Should Renew Your Passport Now

A decade ago, an important piece of travel legislation made American passports much more in-demand. The State Department saw an "unprecedented surge" in applications when a 2007 law enacted by the 9/11 Commission established passports as necessary for all travel to and from Canada, Mexico, and the Caribbean. Millions of travelers acquired 10-year passports that year as a result, and now they're all about to expire. It's safe to assume many of those passport holders will need to renew, which means that passport applications will jump significantly once again.

Concerned about wait times yet? Passport renewal already takes about six weeks, and many destinations require foreign passports to be valid for months after your trip. Factor in unknown delays, and you might have a lot less time to renew than you thought.

#### REAL ID Changes Aren't Helping

A newer federal law, the REAL ID Act, will soon enforce updates to all state-level identification in the form of security features like machine-readable data. Now people in some states that are lagging behind in the technology are realizing that their licenses might soon be invalid for air travel—even on domestic trips. That could mean a rise in passport applications as well.

Travelers using IDs issued by certain states—for example, Maine and Missouri—could be turned away at the gate starting in 2018 if their state doesn't adjust to the new standards in time. Some states are under review and have been given a deadline extension, but all licenses must comply with the standards by 2020. Frequent travelers worried that their state won't comply in time may go ahead and renew or acquire a passport instead. Find out if your state has complied or been given an extension here.

#### **Expect New Security Features**

Like state IDs, passports will now include added technology to ensure security and decrease fraud. Catching up with many other countries, U.S. passports changes mean that new passports will include a data chip that can provide all your personal info upon scanning it onto a computer. You can also expect your new passport to be lighter—rather than the 52-page passports of the past, only 28 pages will be included unless you opt to get more.

#### Double Check Children's Passports

If you've lost track of when your own passport needs renewing and you travel with children, double-check your child's passport as well.

Child passports are only valid for five years, and they're subject to more paperwork, like parental consent forms and proof of a parent-child relationship.

#### How to Renew Your Passport

You can apply for or renew a passport online through the State Department, https://travel.state.gov/content/passports/en/passports.html or in person, https://iafdb.travel.state.gov/ at an eligible local agency like the post office. Make sure you follow instructions carefully and meet all the requirements, https://travel.state.gov/content/passports/en/passports/forms.html like the new rule against wearing glasses in your passport photo. Doing so could further delay the process.

Ruger has discovered that a small number of Ruger-57™ pistols may have right safety levers that do not meet our specifications and may be prone to cracking. In some rare instances, the internal "leg" of the right safety lever may crack or break, rendering the manual safety ineffective. If present, this condition may cause the manual safety to appear to be functioning properly when it is not. Although only a very small number of pistols appear to be affected, Ruger is committed to safety and is asking owners of Ruger-57 pistols to immediately perform a routine function check of the safety lever to ensure its proper operation and, if necessary, sign up for this retrofit.

Potentially affected pistols include any Ruger-57 pistol with a serial number of 642-26274 or lower (including all Ruger-57 pistols with a "641" prefix). If your Ruger-57 pistol is within this range (641-00000 to 642-26274), you should follow the inspection procedure outlined in the **Safety Bulletin** to determine whether your pistol requires a retrofit. **Ruger-57 pistols with a serial number of 642-**

#### 26275 and above are not affected by this Safety Bulletin.

#### IF A MEMBER DIES - INFORMATION TO THE SURVIVING SPOUSE OR FAMILY

(Hopefully Not Needed For A Long Time)

Too often spouses and families are left in a quandary upon the death of a loved one. Few situations in life are more stressful than when a spouse passes. All too often we have a difficult time focusing on the issues at hand and need guidance to get the deceased affairs in order. The following is a general guide for the widow(er) or the decease's family regarding important notifications that must be made by the surviving spouse and information you should have on hand when a retiree dies.

#### I. PREPARATIONS BEFOREHAND

- GATHER ASSETS This doesn't mean piling them all together. It means getting a list of all the assets at the time of the
  decedent's death, along with copies of statements, deeds, etc. This information is needed for probate. It's also essential
  for filing federal and state estate tax returns, if required.
- REVIEW IRAs If the surviving spouse is the beneficiary, decide whether to roll an IRA over to the surviving spouse.
- GET GOOD ADVICE and get it now. The money you pay to attorneys and other advisers to resolve issues NOW can be much lower than if you deal with problems AFTER a person's death.
- In case of couples, usually MOSt of the property is held in joint names and the survivor obtains same "by operation of law". However, there may be some items which were held in the name of the deceased only, and in that case it would be necessary to go to Probate Court to transfer ownership of that property, unless listed in a trust.
- GET ORGANIZED NOW When someone dies, one of the big problems for beneficiaries is locating the things necessary
  to settle the estate. Make sure you know before the death occurs where to find the following documents and information. (This is just a partial list)
  - 1. Will
  - 2. Living Will
  - 3. Trust
  - 4. Deeds (if any).
  - 5. Safe-deposit boxes (location of boxes, contents and keys).
  - 6. Life insurance policies.
  - 7. Funeral and burial instructions.
  - 8. Names and addresses of creditors and debtors.
  - 9. List of assets and where they are located.
  - 10. List of all advisers (attorney, accountant, insurance agent, stockbroker, etc.).

#### II. STEPS TO BE TAKEN AFTER DEATH - Notifications to be made:

- Sergeants Sergeant's Benevolent Association (SBA at (212) 431-6555

- Contact the NYC Health Benefits Program for Special Continuation of Coverage application (coverage for life) located at 40 Rector Street, 3rd Floor, New York 10006 (212) 513-0470.
- 3. Contact the NYPD Operations Unit located at One Police Plaza at (646) 610-5580, for pall bearers (Funeral Director will usually do this for you) for all five boroughs, all of Long Island and Upstate New York, but not beyond Dutchess County.
- 4. Contact Social Security: (800) 772-1213 (Funeral Director will usually do this for you).
- 5. Contact Fraternal Organizations to arrange for visitors, Color Guard and possible insurance benefits.

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- 6. If a veteran, notify the Veterans Administration at (800) 827-1000 for: Grave marker, Funeral Allowance and Flag (Funeral Director will usually do this for you). If can't find discharge papers or DD 214, you will need date of Enlistment, date of Discharge, Branch & Serial Number. If deceased had 100% disability for 10 years, spouse is entitled to an additional benefit.
- 7. Notify your Church or Temple for announcements. (Funeral Director will usually do this for you).
- 8. Health Insurance: COBRA (Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1985) COBRA has a safety net. If spouse or dependent was covered under deceased's health plan they may continue coverage under COBRA for up to 36 months. New York State in 2001 amended the Administrative Code to continue Health Care Coverage for Surviving Spouses for Life (Download Information Regarding this Amendment). This enables the deceased's spouse and/or dependents to receive coverage at the group rate. The City and the Line Organization health benefits stop at the death of the members. The rate, though high, is cheaper than the non group rate.

#### THIS INFORMATION PERTAINS TO COBRA

Police Officers & Firefighter surviving spouses are to follow this procedure

Attach a machine copy of the death certificate to a request for an application for COBRA FOR LIFE and send it to:

Retired Employees Benefits Section Att: Linda Harris (Cobra for Life) 40 – Rector Street – 3<sup>rd</sup> Floor New York, NY 10006

They will send the surviving spouse a <u>pre-numbered application</u> allowing the spouse to continue the health coverage the member had at a cost equal to 102% of what the City pays, which includes administrative fees. This is fairly reasonable. <u>Applying for this must be done within 30 days.</u> Benefits are retroactive if the surviving spouse requires medical attention during this interim period.

At this time if a member and spouse are of Medicare age, and reside in an area covered by Aetna, I would strongly recommend they choose that plan over GHI/EBC/CBP.

Also, they would need to consider the respective union plans as those plans would only be available for 36 months, and whether the health plan rider would be a better choice.

#### **THINGS YOU WILL NEED**

DEATH CERTIFICATES - Death Certificates are necessary in every step to the successful administration of a decedent's estate. (Usually Funeral will obtain certificates as part of his service at current cost). They are usually needed for:

Pension Bureau

**Veterans Administration (if a veteran)** 

Motor Vehicle Bureau if auto was in deceased's name. 1 for each insurance policy.

Court (If probate is needed).

Your State Department of Revenue to obtain non-tax certificate if real property is involved.

Bank accounts held in Trust for another 1 for each account if property held in a Trust.

Personal Records.

Note: If estate is probated, some of the above will take a Letter Testamentary instead of a Death Certificate.

#### MARRIAGE CERTIFICATE (With Official Raised Seal):

Social Security, (not necessary if surviving spouse already receiving benefits)

Veterans Administration, if a veteran.

#### LETTERS TESTAMENTARY or LETTERS OF ADMINISTRATION:

Motor Vehicle Bureau, if auto is in the deceased's name.

One for each bank account

Brokerage house account (share of stock or bonds, etc. that were in the deceased's name alone)

#### **DISCHARGE PAPERS: DD 214 - (Original needed)**

Social Security, if spouse was not already receiving benefits. Remember that service time counts toward qualification. They will Photostat.

Veterans Administration, if a veteran

#### **PAID FUNERAL BILLS:**

1 copy for Pension Bureau

1 copy for Probate Court

1 copy for IRS, if taxable estate.

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#### OTHER THINGS THAT MAY APPLY (usually after burial)

Cancel any leases. (If your parent or loved one rented a home, cancel the lease after clearing out the furnishings) Inform insurance companies.

File life insurance claims for any policies on the person's life, and request that the insurers send you Form 712, Life Insurance Statement (this is a statement about the life insurance that must be filed with the estate tax return).

Make sure the car insurance company continues to cover the person's car until it's sold or transferred to a beneficiary.

Make sure the homeowners policy continues to provide adequate coverage for the person's things until removed from the home.

Notify companies the person did business with.

Cancel credit cards, and close charge accounts.

Have airlines to transfer frequent-flier miles to the primary beneficiary. (Each airline has different policy concerning this issue. Check with carrier about rules)

Consideration should also be given to making pre-death funeral arrangements. This provision, no matter how painful, should be discussed by couples and by parents with their families. Too often, spouse and children spend much too much money on a funeral and do so without really knowing what were the deceased's wishes in this regard (Place of burial, Cremation, etc.)

Consideration should also be given to having a "Family Durable Power of Attorney" (Someone to take over your finances if you become incapacitated or incompetent)

There are no words of comfort at such a difficult time, however, if you have all the necessary information at the ready it will expedite any claim that is pending, make the process run smoothly, and your stress level can be minimized.

After answering some security questions and setting up a secure account MOSt participants will be able to access their information like earnings and what is their retirement age for full social security. For persons born 1943 to 1954 the full social security retirement age is 66. For those born after that your full social security age is available on page 2 of the statement available on line. # Some things to consider

Retirement can have more than one meaning these days. It can mean that you have applied for Social Security retirement benefits or that you are no longer working. Or it can mean that you have chosen to receive Social Security while still working, either full or part-time. All of these choices are available to you. Your retirement decisions can have very real effects on your ability to maintain a comfortable retirement.


If you retire early, you may not have enough income to enjoy the years ahead of you. Likewise, if you retire late, you'll have a larger income, but fewer years to enjoy it. Everyone needs to try to find the right balance, based on his or her own circumstances.

We hope the following information will help you as you plan for your future retirement and consider your retirement options.

# What is the best option for you?

Everyone's situation is different. That is why Social Security has created several retirement planners to help you decide what would be best for you and your family. Social Security has an online calculator that can provide immediate and accurate retirement benefit estimates to help you plan for your retirement.

The online Retirement Estimator is a convenient, secure, and quick financial planning tool. It uses your own earnings record information, thereby eliminating any need to manually key in years of earnings information. The estimator also will let you create "what if" scenarios. You can, for example, change your "stop work" date or expected future earnings to create and compare different retirement options. To use the Retirement Estimator, go to our website at www.socialsecurity.gov/estimator.



### Avoid a Medicare Penalty Sign Up at Age 65

Even if you don't plan to receive monthly benefits, be sure to sign up for Medicare three months before turning age 65. If you don't sign up for Medicare Part B (medical insurance) when you're first eligible, your coverage may not start right away and you may have to pay a late enrollment penalty for as long as you have it. You can apply online. Visit www.socialsecurity.gov/medicareonly for information and to apply.

There is one more thing you should remember as you crunch the numbers for your retirement. You may need your income to be sufficient for a long time, because people are living longer than ever before, and generally, women tend to live longer than men. For example:

- The typical 65-year-old today will live to age 83:
- One in four 65-year-olds will live to age 90; and
- One in ten 65-year-olds will live to age 95.

Once you decide on the best age for you to actually retire, remember to complete your application *three* months before the month in which you want retirement benefits to begin.

# It's so easy to apply online for benefits

The easiest way to apply for Social Security retirement benefits is to go online at www.socialsecurity.gov/applyforbenefits. If you do not have access to the Internet, you can call 1-800-772-1213 (TTY number, 1-800-325-0778) between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m., Monday through Friday, to apply by phone. You also can apply at any Social Security office. To avoid having to wait, call first to make an appointment.

# Receiving benefits while you work

When you reach your full retirement age, you can work and earn as much as you want and still receive your full Social Security benefit payment. If you are younger than full retirement age and if your earnings exceed certain dollar amounts, some of your benefit payments during the year will be withheld.

This does not mean you must try to limit your earnings. If we withhold some of your benefits because you continue to work, we will pay you a higher monthly benefit amount when you reach your full retirement age. In other words, if you would like to work and earn more than the exempt amount, you should know that it will not, on average, reduce the total value of lifetime benefits you receive from Social Security—and may actually increase them.

Here is how this works: after you reach full retirement age. we will recalculate your benefit amount to give you credit for any months in which you did not receive some benefit because of your earnings. In addition, as long as you continue to work, we will check your record every year to see whether the additional earnings will increase your monthly benefit.

Many people can continue to work and still receive retirement benefits. If you want more information on how earnings affect your retirement benefits, ask for How Work Affects Your Benefits (Publication No. 05-10069), which has current annual and monthly earnings limits, and is available on our website.

# Retirement age considerations

Full retirement age

For persons born during the years 1943-1954, the full retirement age is 66. If you were not born in this period, you can find your full retirement age on page 2 of your Social Security Statement.

### Retiring early

If you've earned 40 credits (credits are explained on page 2) of your Statement), you can start receiving Social Security benefits at 62 or at any month between 62 and full retirement age. However, your benefits will be reduced based on the number of months you receive benefits before you reach full retirement age.

If your full retirement age is 66, benefits will be reduced:

25 percent at age 62;

20 percent at age 63; 131/3 percent at age 64; or

63/3 percent at age 65.

### Delaying retirement

You may decide to wait beyond your full retirement age before choosing to receive benefits. If

so, your benefit will be increased by a certain percentage for each month you don't receive benefits between your full retirement age and age 70. This table shows the rate your benefits increase if you delay retiring.

Year of birth	Yearly increase rate	
1941 - 1942	7.5%	
1943 or later	8.0%	

### Rules that may affect your survivor

If you are married and die before your spouse, he or she may be eligible for a benefit based on your work record. If you start benefits before your full retirement age, we cannot pay your surviving spouse a full benefit from your record. Also, if you wait until after your full retirement age to begin benefits, the surviving spouse benefits based on your record will be higher.

#### 2 June 1907

LIEUT. DULFER AN ATHLETIC "COP"

Few of those who come in contact with Lieutenant John DULFER, of the Fifth avenue precinct, either in a social or business way, are aware that for nearly twenty years he was an acrobat of international fame.

Lieutenant DULFER has entertained audiences by his acrobatic feats, both in the country and abroad. Under the name of Herman, he formed a partnership with two other acrobats, also known as the Hermans, and the three toured this continent and Europe, playing some of the largest amusement places in both countries. DULFER, who was born in Germany, is a graduate of the University of Heidelberg. Long before leaving college he showed an aptitude for athletic work, and while he studied there his athletic feats were the talk of the town. When he came to this country, he became associated with the Hermans, and the first performance the young acrobats gave was at the old Academy of Music, Manhattan. The trio then went to Chicago, where they performed at the La Salle Theatre. DULFER then left the Hermans and went to Europe touring the continent in company with another acrobat with great success. He returned to America and joined the Police Department. Lieut. DULFER served in the Brownsville precinct the greater part of his police career. He was recently transferred to South Brooklyn.

#### 11 June 1907

POLICE SEEK EX-CAPTAIN FOR RUNNING ROULETTE

James GANNON, once a police captain, now knows how a man feels when he realizes that the cops are after him. They're after GANNON now, but can't get trace of him. GANNON, when dismissed for failure to suppress a disorderly house in the Manhattan Tenderloin, opened a saloon at Twenty-ninth street and Sixth avenue. For some time it has been suspected that gambling was carried on in the place. A raid was made last night. The police found a double roulette wheel and a quantity of chips. GANNON slipped away during the raid.

The police arrested the bartender , Patrick DACEY, charging him with being a "suspicious person with gambling paraphernalia on the premises."

Another gambling raid was made on a four-story house in West Twenty-sixth street, where the police got three men besides recovering a roulette wheel and table, and a faro layout. The prisoners said they were Joseph COYNE, "Fred" CARTER and John MATHEWS, a negro.

COYNE was charged with keeping and maintaining a gambling house and the other two men, the negro being the doorkeeper, were charged with aiding and abetting COYNE.

Detectives also made a raid on two alleged disreputable houses. One was in Thirty-third street, between Sixth (cut off).

#### 17 June 1907

Four Police Lieutenants Transferred By Bingham Commissioner BINGHAM to-day transferred Lieut. Richard BERKELEY from the Sixteenth precinct to the Seventy-seventh; Lieut. Peter CARTER to Inspector FLOOD's office; Lieut. Alfred THOR from the Seventy-seventh to the Sixteenth, and Lieut. Thomas FLANNERY from the Twenty-sixth to the Twenty-seventh precinct.

#### 19 June 1907

Ten Policemen On Carpet

There was a short calendar at the trials at Police Headquarters yesterday afternoon. Deputy Commissioner O'KEEFFE had only twenty cases to dispose of, and about half of these were adjourned for one week. No heavy fines were imposed, all the charges, except two, were trivial.

The exceptions were the cases of: Patrolman John HANSON of the Ralph avenue station.

According to Captain COONEY, HANSON was absent from the station house without leave for five days. When the five days were up HANSON sent his shield to the station house, saying that he was sick of the job and resigned. Deputy O'KEEFFE recommended has dismissal from the department.

Patrolman Joseph J. MCCAFFERTY, of the Bergen street station.

The charge against MCCAFFERTY was that he was absent twentyfour hours from the station house without leave, and when he showed up and was asked the cause of his absence, it is alleged, he said to Lieut. Burke: "Ah, cut it out! To h\_\_\_ with it!" and threw his shield on the desk." Are you sick of your job now, MCCAFFERTY? "asked Commissioner O'KEEFFE.

" No," answered the patrolman, "  ${\tt I}$  was disgusted that morning, but  ${\tt I}$  have changed my mind since."

Deputy O'KEEFFEE didn't know exactly what to do with MCCAFFERTY.

He asked Capt. MAUDE if MCCAFFERTY was a drinking man, and the Captain said he never appeared at the station house under the influence of liquor." I will look into the case," said Deputy O'KEEFFE, "and see what I will do with you, MCCAFFERTY, but I don't think you will amount to much in the department, as you don't seem to have any ambition. I will reserve decision in your case.

The other 8 patrolmen tried were fined one day each for slight infractions of the rules.

#### TATTOOMARK THAT ISN'T

John J.
