So far this year 21 new members have joined our club. If you see someone sitting alone at a membership meeting they are probably a new member. Please introduce yourself and make them feel welcomed.

The City of NY Health Benefits Program reimburses Medicare-eligible retires and their Medicare-eligible dependents for any Medicare Part B income-related monthly adjustment amount (IRMAA) premiums (excluding any penalties or surcharges) paid during the calendar year—which means more than the standard Medicare Part B monthly premium amount. If this applies to you and/or your eligible dependent fill out the IRMAA Reimbursement Form that can be accessed at: https://www1.nyc.gov/assets/olr/downloads/pdf/health/irmaa-form-2019-2021.pdf

Be advised that if you were eligible to receive this reimbursement in 2019 and 2020, but never filled out the form, you can do so now.

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PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

The cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) for September 2022 through August 2023 benefit payments is 3%.

As a result, an eligible retired member with a maximum retirement benefit of \$18,000 or more will receive a maximum increase of \$45 per month beginning with the September 30, 2022 payment. (Eligible members receiving a maximum retirement benefit under \$18,000 will receive a lesser monthly increase.)

This latest COLA brings the cumulative maximum monthly increase since COLA legislation was enacted in 2000 to \$444 (see chart below).

New York's permanent, automatic COLA is designed to help offset inflation's adverse effects on the fixed retirement benefits of the state's public retirees. By law, the COLA can be no less than 1% and no more than 3% annually and is applied only to the first \$18,000 of the retirement benefit. The COLA percentage is calculated by taking 50% of the Consumer Price Index (CPI) increase from one March to the next and rounding up to the nearest tenth. The CPI increased 8.54% from March 2021 to March 2022.

To be eligible for a COLA, you must either be:

- At least age 62 and retired at least five years; or,
- At least age 55 and retired at least 10 years; or,
- A retiree receiving a disability benefit for at least five years (regardless of age); or,
- A surviving spouse of an eligible retiree receiving a lifetime benefit. (By law, the spouse receives an increase equal to one-half the COLA the retiree would have received.)

Retirees who become eligible for the COLA after September will receive their adjustment when first eligible.

The eighth amendment protects its citizens from excessive bail and things like cruel and unusual punishment when said person is charged and convicted of a crime.


The original Bill of Rights had 10 amendments. Today there are twenty seven. As a result of this, America is a country that others leave their families risk their lives to be here.

Below is a Press Release the National Fraternal Order of Police (NFOP) made regarding the recent Executive Order on Police Reform. Please keep in mind, that while we may individually disagree with some of what is in this Order, the National FOP along with the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), was instrumental in helping craft this Executive Order. One of the items missing in this Executive Order is references to ending qualified immunity for law enforcement. It was the work of the NFOP and IACP that led to the removal of this language. As you will read, the NFOP is willing to work with anyone who has an evidence-based approach to effective changes, something this Lodge agrees with as well.

This executive order is issued by the President of the United States, and you should be proud that the Fraternal Order of Police was involved in its development, for without it, this Order could have created a different outcome. If you have any questions or concerns, please let us know.

IACP and FOP Statement on Executive Order on Police Reform

For months the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) and the Fraternal Order of Police (FOP) have been engaged in extensive discussions with the Administration in good faith to develop the Executive Order on Advancing Effective, Accountable Policing and Criminal Justice Practices to Enhance Public Trust and Public Safety. We applied the Administration for listening to our constructive feedback and incorporating our suggestions into the Executive Order. Our organizations, which represent our nation's chiefs and the majority of rank-and-file officers, believe that it marks a significant step in our continuing efforts to strengthen the trust of the public in police and the criminal justice system.

During our discussions, the IACP and FOP remained focused on communicating the challenges facing the policing profession and making clear that our profession is comprised of dedicated individuals who are committed to the preservation of human life, maintaining the highest ethical standards, and treating all individuals with dignity and respect, while holding themselves and others accountable for their actions.

As the President noted in the Executive Order, many state and local police agencies across the county have taken the lead in efforts to make our communities safer, modernize policing practices, and make our broader criminal justice system more effective and more equitable. To that end, we stressed the need for support for proven training, agency accreditation, data collection initiatives, and more uniform policies based on evidenced-based leading practices, and we are grateful the Administration listened and then acted.

Specifically, the Executive Order -

- Directs the U.S. Justice Department to consult with state and local law enforcement to develop guidance and leading practices on recruitment and retention to address the shortage of officers nationwide;
- Supports officer wellness and takes affirmative steps to prevent suicides among law enforcement officers;
- Urges the development of standards for law enforcement accrediting bodies and encourages state and local law enforcement agencies to become accredited;
- Establishes a consistent Use of Force Policy for Federal Agencies that follows the National Consensus Use of Force Policy, the development of which was led by our organizations;
- Promotes development of an accurate Officer Accountability database that preserves and protects the due process rights of officers;
- Preserves state and local law enforcement access to needed equipment for mission-based public safety objectives from the 1033 and other surplus equipment programs and improves oversight and accountability;
- Promotes broad data collection efforts to better improve policing practices at all levels of government; and
- Directs federal departments and their components to use their grant-making authority to support and promote state and local law enforcement's improved policing practices, to gain access to better equipment and technology, to enhance accountability and transparency, and to make communities safer.

While this Executive Order's direct impact is limited to federal law enforcement agencies, the IACP and FOP see many components of the order as a blueprint for future Congressional action. We remain steadfast in our commitment to working with all interested parties who are willing to take an evidence - based approach to enact effective and lasting change to build a safer future for our communities and the men and women peace officers that serve them.

Much work remains to be done, as this Executive Order only touches upon one element of the criminal justice system – policing. It represents, however, a good faith effort by all involved to reach accord without compromising any core values or issues. A broader approach to overall systemic issues needs to be a priority of all elected officials and, just as our organizations have done from the start, stand ready to work together to make the entirety of our criminal justice system fairer and more equitable for all.

THIS AND THAT

North Carolina Concealed Handguns Reciprocity

Since 1995, North Carolina has allowed qualifying residents of the state to obtain a permit to carry a concealed handgun from the sheriff of the applicant's home county. The permit is valid for five years unless it is revoked. Please see North Carolina Firearms Laws for a list of "Do's and Don'ts" for carrying a concealed handgun in North Carolina. This information is designed as a reference guide only and should not be relied upon as legal advice.

Other States' Permits Honored Here

Effective December 1, 2011, North Carolina automatically recognizes concealed carry permits issued in any other state. Out-of-state permit holders should familiarize themselves with North Carolina's laws.

For example, in North Carolina, concealed handguns may not be carried:

- In law enforcement or correctional facilities such as a prison.
- In any space occupied by state or federal employees, including state and federal courthouses.
- In schools or on school grounds.*
- In areas of assemblies, parades, funerals or demonstrations.**
- In any place where alcoholic beverages are sold and consumed (such as some restaurants) the premises are posted
 as prohibited.
- In any area where concealed handguns are prohibited by federal law.
- In any place of business that has posted a sign banning concealed weapons on its premises.
- By any person while consuming alcohol or while under the influence of alcohol or any controlled substances (unless
 obtained legally and taken as directed by a physician).

*Effective October 1, 2013, unless prohibited by a private school, a concealed handgun permittee may store a handgun in the person's locked vehicle or in a locked container securely fixed to the person's vehicle while on campus. It may NOT be carried on the person.

**Effective October 1, 2013, unless posted as being prohibited, a concealed handgun permittee may possess a concealed handgun while at a parade or funeral. For more information on these exceptions see House Bill 937, Session Law 2013-369, North Carolina Firearms Laws, https://ncdoj.gov/download/98/concealed-carry-handgun/16346/firearms-publication-november-2018 and our chart: https://ncdoj.gov/download/16/general-information/15406/concealed-carry-chart-october-2013 showing where concealed handguns cannot be carried in North Carolina.

To possess a concealed handgun in North Carolina, you must:

- Carry your permit and a valid form of identification with you at all times.
- Disclose the fact that you have a valid concealed handgun permit when you are approached or addressed by any law enforcement officer in North Carolina.
- Inform the officer that you are in possession of a concealed handgun.

Present both the permit and valid identification at the request of an officer NOTE: You should not attempt to display either your weapon or your permit unless directed to by an officer.

Permits Honored in Other States

Permit holders should know that while they can legally carry a concealed handgun while visiting these states, they're subject to the laws of the state they are visiting and are responsible for learning about those laws.

 - o If the request has incomplete provider information, a reply will be emailed to the member requesting the additional information
 - · Advocates will not send a letter to a CNY Retiree member indicating that their network is closed

President Fahy mentioned the death of two FDNY members who recently died fighting a fire, and the recent passing of Dennis J. Fitzgerald, Past President of the Jersey Shore 10-13 Club. Prayers and sympathies were extended to their families. President Fahy then thanked the Hudson Valley 10-13 Club for the flowers his wife, Donna, received after undergoing surgery.

READING OF THE MINUTES:

A motion was made to waive the reading of the minutes from the last meeting by John Briganti and seconded by Kathy McLaugh-lin.

Voted - Passed Unanimously

TREASURER'S REPORT:

Jill Killeen gave the following Treasurer's report as of March 31, 2022:

A motion was made to accept the report by John Briganti and seconded by Kathy McLaughlin. Voted – Passed Unanimously

OLD BUSINESS:

DEMONSTRATION - FEDERAL GOV'T CLOSING NYC VA HOSPITALS

President Fahy informed the Board that the Verrazano 10-13 Club let him know that there were demonstrations at NYC VA Hospitals to stop the Federal Government from closing the VA Hospitals. Provided as information to the Board.

NYC ORGANIZATION OF PUBLIC SERVICE RETIREES

President Fahy briefly discussed the NYC Organization of Public Service Retirees and their Legal Defense Fund, which helped to delay the implementation of the NYC Medicare Advantage Plus Plan from January 1, 2022 to April 1, 2022. President Fahy acknowledged their contribution to the State Court Case and then reminded the Board that the National NYCPD 10-13 is a member of the Alliance of Public Service Organizations of New York.

LAKE IDA, PA - INTEREST IN A NEW 10-13 CHARTER MEMBERSHIP

President Fahy advised the Board that there is a group of retirees from Lake Ida, PA, who are interested in forming a new 10-13 Chapter. President Fahy recommended that they meet with President Harvey Katowitz, Charlotte 10-13 to receive more information about opening a new Chapter. VP Briganti inquired on the distance between our existing NE PA 10-13 Chapter and the potential new Chapter. The President advised that the new group is approximately 40 miles away and about an hour drive from the NE PA 10-13. And the time & distance to attend meetings at the NE PA Chapter was a motivating factor for the group to develop a new Chapter. They have about 30 interested members who wish to join the new Chapter.

NEW BUSINESS: OPENING A NATIONAL NYCPD 10-13 "ZOOM" ACCOUNT

President Fahy advised the Board that he would like to open a National 10-13 "Zoom" account, so that our Chapter 10-13 Presidents who are unable to physically attend our Quarterly Executive Board Meetings will be able to do so, via "Zoom." The cost would be about \$9.00, a month. The Board discussed the "Zoom" account proposal by President Fahy, and a motion was made by Secretary Sal Pepitone to approve the opening of a National 10-13 "Zoom" account, and seconded by Hudson Valley 10-13 VP Kathy McLaughlin.

PROPOSED STATE BILLS TO INCREASE RETIREE INCOME FROM 35K TO 50K

President Fahy advised the Board that there are new NY State Bills being introduced by the Senate, S-4286A, and Assembly, A-9432, to increase Police Officer Retirees to work in School Districts, as "School Safety Officers," and to increase their allowed annual income from 35K to 50 K. Richard Molloy asked whether the National is going to provide a "Letter of Support" for the Bills. President Fahy stated that he is awaiting additional information about the Bills before submitting a "Letter of Support." The Bills will be placed on our Legislative Agenda.

2021 MEDICARE PART B REIMBURSEMENTS

President Fahy informed the Board that during April, the City of New York, Direct Deposited 2021 Medicare Part B Reimbursements into their Medicare recipient Retiree account. Those Medicare recipients without Direct Deposit Accounts will receive their checks via U.S. Mail.

STATE BILLS AFFECTING HOME OWNER AND RENTERS

President Fahy informed the Board that there are NY State Bills, Senate, S-3082, and Assembly, A-5573, which will affect Home Owners and Renters. The Bills are provided for our information only. There is a group opposing the Bill

<u>U.S. CONGRESSIONAL SBA BILL - FEDERAL FUNDS TO BE USED FOR TREATMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICERS WITH MEN-</u>TAL HEALTHCARE ISSUES

President Fahy informed the Board that the U.S. Congress is proposing an SBA Mental Healthcare Bill that will allow Federal Funds to be used to treat Public Safety Officers suffering from PTSD and other Mental Health issues. The Bill number isn't available, however, President Fahy would like to have our Chapter Presidents inform their membership of the SBA Bill, so that they may be able to contact their local U.S. Congressional representatives and U.S. Senators for their endorsement of the Mental Health Care Bill.

NY STATE SENATE AND U.S. CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT 2 (LONG ISLAND) RACES

President Fahy informed the Executive Board of the following NY State Senate and U.S. Congressional races involving retired NYC Police Officers who the National will support: NYS Senate District #6, James Coll,; NYS Senate District #8, Steve Rhoads; NY U.S. Congressional District #2, Michael Rakebrandt. In the following NYS Senatorial race for District #39, the National will remain neutral until after the primary: NY State Senator James Skoufis, against Ronald Diz.

National Advisor Frank Martarella informed the Executive Board that NY State Senator Diane Savino, District #23 (Staten Island/Brooklyn), is retiring. Senator Savino worked closely with Frank on many of our National 10-13 Legislative Bills. Her Executive Staff Member, Jessica Scarcella-Spanton, is running for the Senatorial seat, and is the niece of Committees Chairman, Tom Sullivan. A motion was made by Sal Pepitone to donate \$200.00 to Scarcella-Spanton's Campaign from our National PAC Account, and to submit a Letter of Support. The motion was then seconded by Richard Molloy.

Lee Zeldin is running for New York State Governor and his Lieutenant Governor Allison Esposito, is a retired NYCPD Inspector (ESU). After the New York State primaries, the National will determine which candidates to support.

LEGISLATION

President Fahy asked Rich Molloy, VP of Legislation, to provide an update of the National 10-13's Legislative Bills for 2022. Rich Molloy provided an in-depth overview of our Legislative Bills, as well as the Senate and Assembly members that he contacted, specifically, Healthcare Insurance Protection (Senate Krueger, S-5184, and Assembly Abbate, A-5108); Veterans Supplement (Senate Brooks & Jackson, S-5110, and Assembly Barrett & Abbate, A-6468A); COLA (Senate Gournardes & Jackson, S-6835B, and Assembly Steck & Abbate, A-8226). Rich Molloy impressed the importance for our National 10-13 membership, family & friends to contact the sponsors of our pending Legislative Bills.

Additionally, Rich Molloy requested that we seek the assistance from our Long Island 10-13 Club to meet with Senator Brooks, to solidify his support for our Veterans Supplement Bill, the Verrazano 10-13 Club membership to help with contacting Senator and Assembly personnel located in Brooklyn and Queens and the Hudson Valley 10-13 Club membership to call Senate and Assembly personnel located in the Counties of Putnam, Rockland, Orange, Dutchess, Sullivan, etc.

President Fahy will send "Letters of Support" to the following Senate Committees, Finance, Civil Service & Pension, and, Assembly Government Employees Committee, for their support to approve our following Legislative Bills; Health Insurance Protection, COLA and Veterans Supplement. President Fahy will also send out an e-mail to all Chapter Presidents requesting their assistance to have their membership, friends and family to contact the Sponsors of our Legislative Bills.



A question was asked by Frank Martarella on whether the State Assembly has received the Fiscal Notes for the 2022 Legislative Agenda to move our Bills. President Fahy indicated that he spoke to Chris Black, Assembly, and he has some of the Fiscal Notes, however, Chris Black is still awaiting the Fiscal Notes from the City of New York.

POLITICAL ACTION

A discussion ensued between Executive Board members regarding Letters of Support and political action donations to Legislative members. Richard Molloy also mentioned that there is a move from about 21 State Legislatures to remove Mario Coumo's name from the formerly named Tappan Zee Bridge.

2022 NATIONAL ANNUAL CONVENTION CHANGE OF DATES

The National NYCPD 10-13 Convention will be held at the Villa Roma Hotel, 356 Villa Roma Road, Calicoon, NY 12723, from Sunday, September 25th – Tuesday, September 27, 2022.

Tom Sullivan mentioned that there is a possibility that our organization may be able to obtain colored Villa Roma Flyers to mail to our Chapter Presidents to promote our National Convention. President Fahy will look into the cost to reproduce the Colored Flyers, and, if the cost is reasonable, he will have the Flyers printed.

2022 MEGA PRIZE RAFFLE TICKETS

Secretary Sal Pepitone mentioned that with the help of Marie Zolfo, all of the MEGA Raffle Tickets were mailed out to all of the Chapter Presidents on April 11th, with the exception of the Hudson Valley 10-13 Club, Verrazano 10-13 Club and National NYCPD 10-13, who received their MEGA Tickets via "Hand Delivery." Each Chapter was allotted the same amount of MEGA Raffle Tickets as they received in 2021. As a reminder, by August 15, 2022, all MEGA Raffle Ticket Stubs and Chapter check's, covering the amount of the tickets sold, must be sent to National Secretary Salvatore V. Pepitone, 168 Watson Road, Fanwood, NJ 07023.

NEW PBA DENTAL PLAN (CIGNA DENTAL)

President Fahy informed the Board that the PBA, effective July 1, 2022, is providing a new Dental Plan, Cigna Dental. The new Cigna Dental plan will expand Dental provider and specialist coverage, for active and retired members, within the NYC Metro area and outside the NYC Metro area. Further information about the new PBA Dental Plan will be sent to their members via a U.S. Mailing.

LEGISLATION AFFILIATIONS MEETING

President Fahy informed the Executive Board that he would like to create a means of communication, at the National NYCPD 10-13 level, to disseminate Legislative and law enforcement information to active and retired members through an affiliation of all Fraternal and Association law enforcement groups (Memo attached). President Fahy will strive to obtain the cooperation of the many Fraternal Groups to disseminate information affecting law enforcement personnel (active & retired) through multiple media avenues, such as E-Mail, Websites, Newsletters, Facebook and "word of mouth." President Fahy feels strongly that the technology is available and our organization should pursue this initiative to communicate to over 50,000 retired NYCPD members, and when you include family and friends, the number jumps to over 500,000. Additionally, when you expand the number through our association with other law enforcement groups the potential number of supporters is in the millions.

President Fahy stressed that law enforcement groups need to be unified in their message to create a powerful message. President Fahy emphasized that he isn't attempting to create another law enforcement entity, but will try to have other NYC law enforcement affiliations speak with a more powerful voice, by providing the same message in larger numbers, to our NY State Legislators, so that they will get the message that there are a great number of voters concerned on how they vote on our law enforcement bills. To this end, President Fahy will invite other fraternal organization and association members to our next Executive Board Luncheon Meeting in July. A motion was introduced by Kathy McLaughlin to allocate funds, not to exceed \$3,000.00, for the July Luncheon Meeting, The motion was seconded by Tom Sullivan. VOTED – PASSED UNANIMOUSLY

For those members that reside locally, the ID Card Section (646-610-5150) is now on 2nd floor at 1PP, opposite the Operations Unit.

They will only renew a retiree ID card that has less than 3 months before expiration date or already expired

Please do not go at the end of month due to numerous active MOS retiring and it is very crowded.

Using the above number, call beforehand to make sure there is no promotion on the day you are going because it can get crowded and active will have priority.

For those out of state members, please follow the instructions when mailing in ID cards. I have received ID cards mailed to me using regular first-class mail. The issue with this is that it is not tracked and, therefore, not guaranteed that I will receive it. The Priority Mail procedure provides a tracking number so that the ID card can be accounted for throughout the entire mailing process.

If your ID card is lost or stolen, you must make a police report with your local precinct or PD for lost or stolen property and a copy of the report must accompany the ID card application. **The application will not be processed without a report.**

The NYPD card section uses the photo that is in their system since November of 2002. If your ID card was issued prior to this period, you will have to appear at the ID Card Section in person to take a new photo. You cannot send in a passport photo or a jpeg file photo to update the picture.

ONLY cards issued after November 1, 2002, can be renewed this way. In all other circumstances, members will have to personally visit 1 P.P.

Regarding HR218/LEOSA qualifications: If your ID card does not have an expiration date, it does qualify as a valid ID card under the provisions of the laws. Unless you want to get a current photo on your ID card, you are not required to do so in order to satisfy the qualification. Also remember that some PDs in North Carolina that do the qualifications will require a current ID card so make sure that you check your expiration dates.

A completed PD form **MUST** accompany the card. The form can be downloaded from the National website; https://www.nationalnycpd10-13.org/

Additionally, ID card expiration dates will be increased from 5 to 8 years.

If your card has no expiration date, you do not need to have a new card issued. Your card is perpetually current. Keep it.

THE NATIONAL IS AUTHORIZED TO DELIVER MEMBERS CARDS TO 1 P.P. AND RETURN SAME TO THE MEMBER.

To insure security in the transfer of cards to and from our members the following procedure **MUST** be adhered to:

Items **MUST** be sent in a USPS Flat Rate Priority Mail envelope. You will receive a tracking number from post office. **DO NOT REQUEST SIGNATURE OF RECIPIENT**. The postage is \$7.95.

Place in the envelope: your PD ID card, the completed PD Form, and a check in the amount of \$7.95 to cover the cost of priority mail return of your new card.

F.A.Q.

My ID Card was issued before November 2002. Why can't I have it renewed via proxy?

Prior to November 1, 2002 cards were not digital. Consequently the photo cannot be reproduced.

My card has no expiration date. Do I need to have a new card issued?

Definitely not. If you have no expiration date your card is perpetually current. Keep it.

***** Please note: To make things easier for Frank Martarella, our Club will be collecting ID cards quarterly in January, Apr., July & October and mailing them to him. The club will also pay for the postage..

There is a new procedure for pre-merger Transit and Housing Police retirees.

The below information was received in an email from the NYCPD Transit Bureau Personnel Unit and has been verified.

Renewal of Transit ID card that is expired or nearing expiration.

For the retirees that live out of state, they can email a copy of their driver's license and id card and in the body of the email they can put their name, address and a phone number where they can be reached. We run a background check to make sure no one is wanted (you'd be surprised).

Also they need to attach a digital photo of themselves from the waist up in front of a neutral colored wall (please no hats or sunglasses).

We need a digital photo, not a photo of a photo, to put on a new id card that we mail certified.

Please tell your members they can call the Personnel Unit at 1-718-610-4660 and we will be more than happy to walk them thru the process.

Be well and keep collecting those retirement checks.

The NYC Office of Labor Relations (OLR) has made the IRMAA form for 2021 available at https://www1.nyc.gov/assets/olr/downloads/pdf/health/irmaa-form-2019-2021.pdf

IRMAA 2021 annual reimbursements will be issued in October 2022.

Medicare-eligible retirees and their Medicare-eligible dependents can submit an IRMAA application if they paid above the standard amount of \$148.50 per month. If you did not pay more than the standard amount then you are not eligible for IRMAA.

• If you are currently receiving your pension check through Electronic Fund Transfer (EFT) or direct deposit, your reimbursement will be deposited directly into your bank account. This is separate from your pension payment. If you don't have EFT or direct deposit, you should receive a check in the mail.

The NYC Organization of Public Service Retirees posted the following points regarding the implementation of Copays for those on Medicare and GHI that we have received from several members.

A note to the younger retirees. If you are under 65 you are not on Medicare yet and this does not affect your health care until you must go on Medicare at 65. Most of our membership is on Medicare, all retirees will get there!

- 1- Emblem chose to start charging copays 1/1/22 at the city's behest.

- 7- If the amount is difficult for you work out a payment plan with your providers.
- 8- There are different charges for different services. Call Emblem and ask for the list of copays for services. 1-212-501-4444.
- 9- We will have to wait until September to find out if the court will even choose to rule on this issue. When we know, you'll know.

How long should you keep tax records? Posted Tuesday, May 3, 2022 12:42 pm

Although the April tax-filing deadline has come and gone, it's a question many clients ask throughout the year. Depending on which person you ask, you might get a range of responses: from a few years to a lifetime. I strongly recommend you keep your tax returns forever. Take this example:

You bought a stock in 1992. You sell it in 2022. You claim a capital loss on your shares of stock. The IRS examines your return and alleges that you didn't have a loss; rather you made a large profit. Wouldn't you like to have proof of your purchase price?

The IRS recommends that you keep your tax records for a minimum of three years. Here are some guidelines:

The IRS generally has three years from the date you file your tax return to start an audit. You should retain all the W-2 forms, the 1099 forms and other receipts to document income reported and deductions claimed. For example: You will need to keep your 2018 tax return and related papers until April 18, 2022, after which it is generally safe to shred and discard them, with the exception of the scenarios described below:

Scenario 1: For investment transactions, such as stocks, you need to be able to prove your original basis (cost) in the year you sell it. This means keeping purchase confirmations, notices of splits and dividend reinvestments, until you sell the security and then for three years after that

Scenario 2: For real estate transactions, including your home, you need to be able to substantiate your original cost (i.e., closing statements) and any improvements made during your ownership. Once you sell the real estate, the three-year rule applies.

The IRS can start an audit within six years if gross income is understated by more than 25 percent. Also, if a taxpayer failed to file a return or has filed a false and fraudulent return, there is no time limit on how far back the IRS can go. There is no statute of limitations in this case.

Ultimately, the length of time you should hold on to tax records depends on the individual. If you decide to get rid of tax documents, make sure to shred them. Tax returns contain sensitive information that identity thieves adore. If you discarded or lost a tax return and later need a copy, don't worry. Copies of tax returns, all attachments and W-2 forms, are generally available from the IRS going back seven years and can be obtained by filing Form 4506, Request for Copy of Tax Form. You'll also be charged a nominal fee for requests.

If you are very conservative and want to keep all tax records, the space required to store tax returns and supporting documents is minimal. If you are very cautious, you can keep hard copies of tax documents in a fireproof safe. Also, you can scan your papers and keep a backup copy of the files on a cloud service.

- Social Security Administration / Social Security: (800) 772.1213A surviving spouse or child may receive a special lump-sum death payment of \$255 if they meet certain requirements. In most cases, the funeral home will report the person's death to Social Security. If you want them to do that, you will need to give the deceased's Social Security Number to the funeral director so he or she can make the report.

If a veteran, notify the Veterans Administration. Call Toll-Free 1 (800) 827-1000 or Visit the Web Site at http://www.va.gov. The decedent may be entitled to Burial and Plot-Interment allowance, a VA National Cemetery Burial, a Headstone and Marker, a Presidential Memorial Certificate, and Burial Flag. Often times the Funeral Director will make this notification.

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Documents You Will need.

Death Certificates (when applicable): Death Certificates are needed in connection with many of the tasks associated with the successful administration of a decedent's estate; usually the Funeral Director will obtain certificates as part of their service cost. You should confer with each of the respective agencies listed below to ascertain if they require a "Certified Copy" of the Death Certificate or if they will accept a regular Photostatted copy. You will need Death Certificates for:

- Police Pension Fund
- Veterans Administration (If a Veteran); you may need more than one (1) death certificate depending on the benefits being submitted for.
- Motor Vehicle Bureau if auto was in decedent's name; one (1) for each insurance policy.
- State Department of Revenue (to obtain Non-Tax Certificate if real property is involved).
- Bank accounts held in Trust for another; one (1) for each account if property held in a Trust.
- NYC Dept. of Finance; Veteran's Exemption: This program provides a property tax exemption to veterans, the spouse or unremarried widow/widower of a veteran, or Gold Star parent (the parent of a child who died in the line of duty). Veterans are former members of the United States armed forces or the Merchant Marines (during World War II) called to active duty during a period of conflict or recipients of expeditionary medals. - Probate Court (If probate is needed).
- Personal records

NOTE: If estate is probated, some of the above entities will take a Letter of Testamentary instead of a Death Certificate.

Marriage Certificates with Official Raised Seal for:

- Social Security Administration (not necessary if surviving spouse is already receiving benefits)
- Veterans Administration (if a veteran)

NOTE: If you need to get a copy of your marriage certificate you should contact the specific religious institution at which you were married (i.e. Church, Synagogue) and/or the County Clerk in the Borough/Town you were married.

Letters of Testamentary or Letters of Administration (if applicable) for:

- Motor Vehicle Bureau if auto is in the decedent's name
- One (1) for each bank account, brokerage house account, share of stock or bonds, etc. that were in the decedent's name alone.

Armed Services Discharge Papers — DD 214 (if applicable)

Letters of Testamentary or Letters of Administration (if applicable) for:

- Motor Vehicle Bureau if auto is in the decedent's name
- One (1) for each bank account, brokerage house account, share of stock or bonds, etc. that were in the decedent's name alone.

Armed Services Discharge Papers — DD 214 (if applicable):

- The original papers are needed for Social Security, if spouse is not already receiving benefits (Service time counts toward qualification).
- NYC Dept. of Finance; Veteran's Exemption: This program provides a property tax exemption to veterans, the spouse or unremarried widow/widower of a veteran, or Gold Star parent (the parent of a child who died in the line of duty). Veterans are former members of the United States armed forces or the Merchant Marines (during World War II) called to active duty during a period of conflict or recipients of expeditionary medals. - One (1) for the Police Pension Fund; if probate is anticipated.
- One (1) for the Probate Court

Actions to be Taken to Close/Transfer Decedent's Accounts

Gather Assets:

This doesn't mean piling them all together. It means getting a list of all the assets at the time of the decedent's death, along with copies of statements, deeds, etc. This information may be needed for Probate. It is also essential for filing federal and state estate tax returns, if required.

Close/Transfer any Policies and/or Accounts (if applicable):

- Cancel the lease. If your parent or loved one rented a home, cancel the lease after clearing out the furnishings.
- Inform Insurance companies. File life insurance claims for any policies on the person's life, and request that the insurers send you Form 712, Life Insurance Statement (this is a statement about the life insurance that must be filed with the estate tax return).
- Make sure the car insurance company continues to cover the person's car until it is sold or transferred to a beneficiary.
- Make sure the homeowner's policy continues to provide adequate coverage for the home and the contents of the home until the contents are removed and the home is sold/transferred to a new owner.

Notify Companies the Person Did Business With:

- Cancel credit cards and close charge accounts.
- Tell airlines to transfer frequent-flier miles (in attendance with the Will to the primary beneficiary).
- IRAs: If the surviving spouse is the beneficiary, decide whether to roll an IRA over to the surviving spouse.

Note: In the case of couples, most property is routinely held in joint names and the survivor obtains it "by operation of law." However, there may be some items that were held in the decedent's name only. In that case, it would be necessary to go to Probate Court to transfer ownership of that property, unless it is listed in trust.

Survivor's Health Benefits

The survivor's and eligible dependent's Health Benefits, both major medical and benefits provided by the Superior Officers Council, cease with the passing of the Member. However, the survivor (Spouse/Domestic Partner) may apply for "COBRA for Life" Coverage through the City of New York. If you are the spouse/domestic partner of a member who has passed away, you have the right to continue coverage under any of the available NYC health benefits plans. Furthermore, effective November 13, 2001, New York State law provides that surviving spouses of retired uniformed members of the New York City Police and Fire Departments can continue their health benefits coverage for life. Such coverage will be at a premium of 102% of the group rate and must be elected within one (1) year of the date of the death of the member. Contact the NYC Retiree Health Benefits Section, in writing, to obtain an application; NYC Retiree Health Benefits Section if you are planning to move in the near future or if you are in fact moving so that they send the application to your proper address.

NOTE: The surviving spouse / domestic partner of retirees who had received an Accident Disability Pension should be cognizant of the fact that if the cause of the retiree's death is directly attributable to the condition for which they received the Accident Disability (i.e. retired on the Heart Bill and died from a heart attack), their surviving spouse / domestic partner may be eligible to continue receiving the deceased member's Major Medical and SOC benefits at no cost.

Benefits Payable on Behalf of Deceased Member

With respect to any benefits payable to a deceased member upon the date of death, or with respect to death benefits payable by virtue of the death of the member where the member's designated beneficiary has predeceased the member and a successor has not been designated, or where the member has not designated a beneficiary, then these benefits will be made payable to the first surviving class of the following classes of successive preference beneficiaries:

The covered member's:

- Surviving spouse/registered domestic partner;
- If no surviving spouse/domestic partner, to the covered member's surviving children equally, or
- If no surviving children, to the covered member's estate.

If you opted to convert the Death Benefit to the Surviving Spouse/Dependent(s) SOC Health and Welfare Fund Benefit your qualified dependents (defined below) are entitled to receive prescription, optical and dental coverage for **three years at no cost** and gives the survivors the added option of continuing the benefits indefinitely for a premium.

Qualified dependents are defined as your spouse, or qualified Domestic Partner and eligible dependent children. **Eligible children** include natural children, legally adopted, stepchildren (rules apply) and children for whom you have court appointed guardianship or legal custody and who live with you permanently. For the purpose of the **Dental and Optical Benefit**, **eligible dependent children** are covered to the last day of the month of their 19th or up to 23rd birthday (full time student). For the **Prescription Plan dependent children** who were previously enrolled in the Optional Prescription Drug Rider will be covered until December 31st of the year they reach the age of 19 or 23 years (full time student) or until they graduate.

Medicare Reimbursement Affidavit

Medicare Part B Reimbursement:

When the decedent, or one of their dependents became eligible for Medicare at age 65 (and thereafter) or through special provisions of the Social Security Act for the Disabled, their first level of health benefits was provided by Medicare. In order to maintain maximum health benefits, the decedent (and all retired NYC workers) was mandated to accept Medicare Part A (Hospital Insurance) and Part B (Medical Insurance). If the decedent was receiving a Social Security check, the premium for Medicare Part B was deducted from that check monthly. If the decedent was not receiving a Social Security check, they were billed on a quarterly basis by the Social Security Administration. The decedent must have been receiving a City pension check and been enrolled as the contract holder for City health benefits in order to receive reimbursement for Part B premiums.

NOTE: Spouses/Domestic Partners of members whose deaths are directly attributable to an injury/illness related to their receiving an Accident Disability Pension continue to receive the Medicare Reimbursement. This is due to the City continuing to pay for their health insurance at a reduced Medicare rate.

The City of New York reimburses retirees for the monthly premium for Medicare Part B, as well for their eligible dependents on Medicare. The Medicare Part B reimbursement is issued each April for the prior calendar year (January through December; i.e. Medicare reimbursement checks are issued in April 2014, reimburse Medicare deductions from 2013). You will only receive the reimbursement for the period of time that the decedent was enrolled in Medicare Part B and covered by a City of New York health plan as a retiree; Medicare Reimbursement ceases with the death of the member. (Retirees who reside outside of the United States are NOT eligible for the Medicare Part B reimbursement since Medicare is not your primary insurer).

In order to receive a "Medicare Reimbursement Affidavit" to claim Medicare reimbursement monies owed to the decedent and, if applicable, their eligible dependent(s) you must notify the Health Benefits Program of the members death, in writing, including the retiree's name, Social Security number, your name, your address, and a copy of the death certificate. Send the request for the affidavit form to the Retiree Health Benefits Section, **Attn: Medicare Unit**, 22 Cortlandt Street, 12th Floor, New York, NY 10007. If the survivor relocates, they must notify the Retiree Health Benefits Section, Medicare Unit, of the new address to ensure that they receive the reimbursement.

Please be aware that it will take several months for the Retiree Health Benefits Section to forward the reimbursement check, which will be in payment of the previous calendar year, and in some cases a second check will be issued for the months that the retiree was alive in the year of death.














Prevent shingles with the Shingrix vaccine

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Dear Lieutenant:

Two years ago, the city was in the midst of a pandemic, hospitals were stressed to breaking points with sick and dying patients, protestors flooded the streets every day and became violent rioters, looters and violently assaulted police officers at night. This was the working conditions that the members of the New York City Police Department came to every day. These officers put their health and physical safety at risk every day they came to work; they could fall victim to a ravaging virus or fall victim to a maniacal anti-cop crowd. This was the reality every officer faced every day during the riots of 2020.

Now the Career Criminal Revenge Board (CCRB) is attempting to rewrite history and create a new narrative. Once again, using the prism of time, CCRB is attempting to distort the reality of what actually occurred 2 years ago during the violent riots and acts of domestic terrorism targeting police officers in the spring, summer and fall of 2020. They are attempting to portray violent riots as peaceful protests and police officers as antagonists employing brutal tactics against a cooperative and submissive crowd. They are touting that 145 police officers have had allegations of impropriety substantiated against them for their actions during the riots. These allegations could involve what CCRB considers an officer using discourteous language or what they interpret as an officer being too physical in restraining a violent rioter.

Out of the thousands of arrests made during these riots, to the best of our knowledge only five (5) people were prosecuted. Only a small handful of those arrested were actually held accountable for criminal actions. Now, the Career Criminal Revenge Board wants to take punitive action against 145 police officers. Police officers were victimized during the pandemic and the riots and now they are being victimized by CCRB.

This city experienced widespread looting and basically no one was held criminally liable for this crime; DAs refused to prosecute many of these crimes. Now, city politicians are attempting to decipher why there is a sudden surge in criminals shoplifting and committing Smash and Grabs in boutiques and stores. These criminals are taking advantage of the weakness of the criminal justice system and the DAs refusal to prosecute. Criminals are not prosecuted for committing crimes, but CCRB wants to prosecute police officers for administrative infractions. Criminals pay no penalty, but police officers are docked pay.

So now, after almost two years of remaining in the safety of their homes during a pandemic and violent riot, the investigators and staff of the Career Criminal Revenge Board have emerged and are now looking to rewrite history and create a new distorted narrative of what happened in the spring through fall of 2020. Now, CCRB is attempting to portray cops as being out of control and the protestors as being peaceful.

Garvey also is the former Commanding Officer of a Neighborhood Stabilization Unit covering four Bronx precincts. Lt. Garvey holds Masters Degrees from both Bernard Baruch College of the City of New York and Cornell University, and successfully completed the rigorous Certificate program from the Wharton School, at the University of Pennsylvania, In the Fundamentals of Money Management Program..."

Dear Lieutenant:

As gun violence surges across the city, local and state politicians continue to place the blame for the proliferation of illegal guns saturating our streets and killing so many on irrelevant causes. These are the same politicians, who in recent memory were supporting those calling for less police in the subways and to defund the police. These politicians are not identifying the real reasons for the proliferation of illegal guns, the related gun violence, and the seeming inability to combat the surge.

Suspecting that many of the criminals being arrested by members of the NYPD for illegally possessing a firearm were not being conscientiously prosecuted by many of the City District Attorneys, the LBA requested a breakdown of all gun arrest in the city from 2021 to present – a copy of the report is attached to this e-mail.

The report revealed that since January 2021, members of the NYPD have recovered a record number of illegal weapons from the streets resulting in the arrest of 4,456 criminals. This equates to almost 12 illegal guns a day removed from the streets along with the criminal possessing the weapon. This number also equates to numerous lives saved and numerous less people victimized. This also equates to numerous members of the NYPD risking their lives in removing illegal guns from hard core criminals.

To make matters worse, of the 4,456 arrests incredibly only 711 criminals were convicted and jarringly of this 711, 698 were offered and accepted Plea Bargains; only one criminal case went to trial. This basically results in 698 convicted criminals, arrested for illegally possessing a gun, received little to no jail time and were quickly released back onto the street.

In addition, there are currently 1,784 open criminal cases for those arrested for illegally possessing a firearm. Thanks to the criminal advocacy of our state legislators and their vociferous support of Bail Reform (Catch & Release), this means that almost 2,000 people arrested for illegally possessing a firearm are back on the street awaiting trial.

Even more disturbing is the fact that 1,243 of the 4,456 people arrested for illegally possessing a firearm had their cases dismissed. This means almost a third of all people arrested for possessing a firearm over the last year and half were released with no consequences for their actions. Over a thousand people that could have killed or robbed innocents or shot and killed a police officer were immediately returned to the streets with no accountability for their criminal actions.

This report reveals that the members of the NYPD are arresting a record number of criminals possessing firearms however, due to DA's refusing to prosecute criminals and the legislators passing criminal friendly legislation, there is apparently no accountability nor repercussions. So, criminals are quickly released from custody and simply go out and retrieve another illegal gun and the cycle starts again.

Now, if this is how gun arrest are being addressed, with little to no criminal accountability and no real repercussions for the offender, how do you think the District Attorneys and courts are processing those arrested for robbery, burglary, GLA, assault, turnstile jumping etc.? The members of the NYPD are doing their sworn duty it is the "Criminal Justice Sieve" that is leaking criminals right back into society to commit more crimes and victimize more innocents. It is the politicians and the DA's who refuse to plug the holes in the sieve. This is why crime is surging.

I suggest you printout a copy of the attached Report, give a copy to the officers that work with you, and recommend to the officers that they provide copies of this report to the people in the command so that the average citizen can see that the cops are doing their jobs, it's the politicians and District Attorneys who are contributing to the surge in gun violence by not doing their jobs.

New York is at the forefront of the crime epidemic. Every day we read about so many violent crimes that there is no longer any shock value associated with them. Shootings, stabbings, slashings, random assaults of innocent people, and subway attacks have become the norm.

The NYPD is working hard to make arrests and remove guns from the street but in so many cases the suspects are quickly released with little or no bail.

The police are doing their job, but the system is not working. Sadly, the elected officials responsible for this chaos will not admit their mistakes and are even doubling down on the horrific "reforms" that brought us to this untenable place.



Update on Current Legal Matters May 25, 2022

DiGiacomo vs. CCRB

On November 10, 2021, the Supreme Court, New York County (Justice Laurence Love) denied our Petition and lawsuit filed against the CCRB challenging the 2020 amendments to their rules which we maintain are illegal and a clear abuse of their discretion. At the same time the Court issued this order, it also denied similar challenges brought by the PBA, SBA, LBA and CEA. We submitted a motion to reargue the case in front of Judge Love as his decision failed to address several arguments in our papers, but regrettably the Court denied that motion in its entirety. We have also appealed to the Appellate Division, First Department asking them to reverse this erroneous decision.

i). CCRB has recently recommended charges against several of our members stemming from the riots of May, June, and July of 2020. They are also bringing charges against more than 140 Officers of all other ranks. We will be seeking expedited trials dates for our members and asking the Police Commissioner to dismiss all charges related to the riots.

ii). In light of CCRB's overreaching, members must be fully prepared when being interviewed by CCRB. If they are not, or don't know what the interview pertains to, reschedule the interview. If a member was already "GOed" regarding the incident that is the subject of the CCRB interview, the member must listen to their "GO" prior to being interviewed. The GO can be obtained at the CCRB NYPD liaison office at 100 Church Street. Bring any issues to our attorney's attention as soon as possible.

iii). The DEA continues to have members found "Not Guilty" of CCRB charges in the NYPD Trial Room and by the Police Commissioner. CCRB can overstep all they want; our attorneys will continue successfully to challenge these cases at trial.

iv). Going to CCRB while a Defendant's Criminal Case is still active – When a member is notified to appear for an interview at CCRB regarding any criminal case that is still pending against a perpetrator, the member must notify the ADA assigned to that case. Particularly in regards to felony and "major crimes" prosecutions, ADAs will often contact CCRB and request a "hold" on the CCRB investigation so as not to jeopardize the outcome of the criminal prosecution. While there is nothing legally to prevent CCRB from conducting a simultaneous investigation, they often honor a DA's hold request.

DEA Pursues Lawsuits Against Anyone Injuring Our Detectives

Any DEA member who is assaulted or otherwise injured in the performance of duty, whether intentional or through one's negligence (for example, a building or home owner, another driver, etc.), please notify our attorneys immediately so that they may potentially pursue a civil liability lawsuit against the perpetrator or person responsible. Our attorneys presently have several lawsuits pending at this time against individuals who have injured our Detectives both intentionally or through their negligence, such as RMP accidents, and injuries caused by the improper maintenance of residence building. There are several lawsuits pending at this time. Just recently, the DEA was able to freeze the bank account of an inmate who received a settlement in another matter under the "Son of Sam" law. Our Detective will now be receiving a financial settlement from those frozen funds.

Important Message Regarding Diaphragm Compression Law As Of May 25, 2022

As you know, over our objections, our elected officials both here in the City and in Albany, bowing to political pressure, have passed numerous law enforcement-related bills which have now made our job even more dangerous and challenging. Included in these laws is the reckless and dangerous Diaphragm Compression Law.

Although we were initially successful in having this law ruled unconstitutional, the City Council appealed that ruling and the Appellate Division has reinstated the law. The law reads as follows:

Be it enacted by the Council as follows:

Section 1. The administrative code of the city of New York is amended by adding a new section 10-181 to read as follows:

- 10-181 Unlawful methods of restraint. a. Unlawful methods of restraint. No person shall restrain an individual in a manner that restricts the flow of air or blood by compressing the windpipe or the carotid arteries on each side of the neck, or sitting, kneeling, or standing on the chest or back in a manner that compresses the diaphragm, in the course of effecting or attempting to effect an arrest.
- b. Penalties. Any person who violates subdivision a of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment of not more than one year or a fine of not more than \$2,500, or both.
- c. Any penalties resulting from a violation of subdivision a of this section shall not limit or preclude any cause of action available to any person or entity injured or aggrieved by such violation.

The DEA will always be here to support and protect our members' rights and will be asking the New York State Court of Appeals to overturn the law. Until that appeal is heard, however, the law is still in effect. Please protect yourselves and each other. Proceed with extreme caution when dealing with a non-compliant individual.

Veterans Property Tax Relief

To qualify for the disabled veteran homestead property tax relief under North Carolina law a person must meet the following criteria:

- The property owner must be a veteran of any branch of the US Armed Forces with an honorable discharge AND
- The property owner must have a permanent & total service connected disability of 100% OR
- Rated Permanently Individually Unemployable by the US Department of Veteran Affairs OR
- The property owner must be in receipt of Dependents Indemnity Compensation (Survivors Pension) as a surviving spouse.

The disabled veteran homestead exemption is the first \$45,000 of your assessed real property value. Co-owners **who are not spoues** and who are individually eligible for the benefit will receive no more than the first \$45,000 of the assessed real property. \$45,000 is the maximum allowed exclusion for property tax releif N.C.G.A 105.277.1C.

- Complete Sections 1 and 2 of the NCDVA-9 Form.

- 3. Once certified by the Veterans Benefit Administration the form will be returned to your primary residence. You will then submit the NCDVA-9 to your local county tax office.

The deadline to submit your documents to your county tax office is June 1st of the current tax year. It is recommended that you submit your application to the State Service Center well in advance of this date to allow time for the certification process.

Property Tax Exemptions For New York State Veterans

There are three different property tax exemptions available to Veterans who have served in the United States Armed Forces. The exemption applies to county, city, town, and village taxes. Exemptions may apply to school district taxes.

Veterans can receive one of the three following exemptions:

- 1. Alternative Veterans' Exemption
- Available only on residential property of a Veteran who has served during a designated time of war or received an expeditionary medal
- Currently available in over 95 percent of the county, city, town, and village taxing jurisdictions across the state. The remainder of these
 jurisdictions may choose to offer this exemption in the future
- Veteran applicants should check with the assessor or clerk in the municipalities in which they reside to see whether the Alternative Veterans' Exemption is offered
- Extra tax reductions available for combat and United States Department of Veterans Affairs service-connected disabilities. May be available for school district taxes. School districts must elect to offer the exemption
- 2. Cold War Veterans' Exemption
- Available only on residential property of a Veteran who served during the Cold War period
- Counties, cities, towns, and villages have the option to offer this exemption to qualified Veterans
- Extra tax reductions available for United States Department of Veterans Affairs service-connected disabilities
- Check with your assessor or clerk to see whether the Cold war Veterans' exemption is offered
- 3. Eligible Funds Exemption
- Provides a partial exemption
- Applies to property that a Veteran or certain other designated person purchases. Such owners must purchase the property with pension, bonus, or insurance monies
- May be available for school district and other taxes

Veterans should submit an amended application if the Veteran's United States Department of Veterans Affairs service-connected disability percentage changes.

Veterans may also be eligible for other exemptions based on income and disability.

How to Request an Exemption

Eligible Veterans must submit the initial exemption application form to the assessor. There is a deadline for filing. For additional details, including filing deadlines and applications, please contact your local tax assessor's office.





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I continually receive inquiries from members who are unsure of what medical coverage they have through Emblem Health/GHI.

Thanks to Club Trustee Dennis Cirillo here is a link to the New York City Summary Program Description Health Benefits Program https://www1.nyc.gov/assets/olr/downloads/pdf/health/health-full-spd.pdf

The handbook contains information of all of the medical coverage provided to NYC employees and retirees covered by GHI Comprehensive Benefits Plan.

Additionally, many members are still unaware of the GHI Catastrophic Coverage provided by the Superior Officers Council, Sergeants Benevolent Association and the Detectives Endowment Association.

This benefit was established to assist members and eligible dependents to defray some of the non-covered medical and surgical expenses incurred for services rendered by non-participating or out-of-net-work providers and to provide coverage for catastrophic illness.

The below information is listed on their respective websites.

SOC Catastrophic benefit (GHI/Emblem Health Members Only)

The GHI Catastrophic Rider was established to assist our members and their eligible dependents (includes spouses, registered domestic partners, and eligible dependent children; full-time students ages 19–23) to defray some of the non-covered medical and surgical expenses incurred for services rendered by non-participating or out-of-network providers and to provide coverage for catastrophic illness

- Members must incur out-of-pocket expenses of more than \$3,000 per year. (Out-of pocket expenses are those medical and hospital charges that are considered reasonable and customary by GHI and are not reimbursed by either the City Health Plan or private insurers).
- Members must produce a statement of services, Explanation of Benefits Form (EOB) and cancelled checks for expenses sub mitted.
- Reimbursement is based on a contract year (January December) 100% of GHI reasonable and customary charges, based on the current profile.
- The maximum lifetime benefit is \$2 million (limitations apply).

Limitations

The first \$25,000 is covered for private duty nursing care, and thereafter 50% of the remainder, with a lifetime cap of \$50,000 per person. The cap for in-hospital mental health charges is \$10,000 individual lifetime maximum.

\$1,000 SOC Catastrophic Benefit

The SOC provides a self-funded \$1,000 direct reimbursement payable to the member after the member has submitted the required documentation and has qualified under the GHI Catastrophic Rider outlined above. The member must have incurred the minimum of at least \$3,000 out-of-pocket to qualify. The exclusions and restrictions of the SOC Catastrophic Reimbursement are the same as the requirements outlined above for the GHI Catastrophic Benefit.

The benefit does not cover prescription drug charges. Ineligible charges such as experimental procedures or services not approved by GHI/CBP and/or Empire Blue Cross Blue Shield are likewise not eligible for this benefit.

Example: You paid \$10,000 in out-of-pocket expenses, but GHI's reasonable and customary payment for those services is deemed to be \$7,000. The member is responsible for and pays the remaining \$3,000 of the balance and is now eligible to receive \$1,000 from the SOC's Catastrophic Reimbursement Benefit.

SBA—Eligibility

SBA members are eligible, as well as spouses/domestic partners and dependent children who are covered under a participating provider organization (PPO) or a point-of service (POS) plan presently being offered by the New York City Employee Health Benefits Program.

Definition of PPO and POS

Participating provider organization (PPO) indemnity plans offer the option to use either a network provider or an out-of-network provider for medical and hospital care. PPO plans contract with health care providers who agree to accept a negotiated payment from the health plan and predetermined co-payments from subscribers as payment in full for a schedule of medical services provided. When the subscriber uses a non-participating provider, the subscriber is subject to deductibles and/or a higher price schedule. GHI/CBP is an example of a PPO.

Point-of-service (POS) plans offer the freedom to use either a network provider or an out-of-network provider for medical and hospital care.

SBA GHI Catastrophic Coverage continued.....

If the subscriber uses a network provider, health care delivery resembles that of a traditional HMO, with prepaid comprehensive coverage and little out-of-pocket costs for services.

When the subscriber uses an out-of-network provider, health care delivery resembles that of an indemnity insurance product, with less comprehensive coverage and subject to deductibles and coinsurance. HIP PRIME POS and U S. Health Care (QPOS) are POS plans.

The SBA H&W Fund catastrophic coverage plan does not cover subscribers of exclusive participating organizations (EPOs) because they do not provide any out of network benefits.

The catastrophic coverage benefit

The benefit pays up to 100 percent of reasonable and customary eligible expenses after a \$2,000 out-of-pocket annual deductible per person has been reached. Eligible out-of-pocket expenses are those SBA H&W Fund medical and hospital expense charges that are considered reasonable and customary by the basic City Health Plan and are not fully reimbursed by the City Health Plan or private group insurers.

Benefit limits and maximums

There is a lifetime maximum benefit of \$250,000 per covered person. Within this lifetime maximum are the following:

- (1) Mental health in-hospital care of \$10,000.
- (2) Required and approved private duty nursing is covered in full for the first unpaid \$25,000 and then at 50 percent for the remainder up to a lifetime maximum of \$50,000.

Services or charges not covered by the catastrophic benefit

In addition the benefit exclusions of the SBA H&W Fund, the catastrophic benefit does not cover outpatient psychiatric care and prescription drug charges. Ineligible charges such as experimental procedures or services not approved by the member's health plan are likewise not covered by this benefit. Medical, surgical and hospital charges incurred for services rendered by non-participating PPO providers or out-of-network POS providers must be approved by the member's health plan.

Submitting an SBA catastrophic benefit claim

Once you have reached the \$2,000 out-of-pocket, per-person annual deductible, obtain and submit the catastrophic claim benefit form to the Fund office for processing. Instructions are printed on the form.

DEA—There are two parts to the DEA Catastrophic coverage. The first part is an extra rider that the DEA purchased through GHI. There is a \$4,000 deductible (retired members) per calendar year.

Claims for non-participating doctors are submitted through GHI for their basic allowance. Because GHI's payment schedule is so low the member always has an out of pocket expense. When the difference between what your doctor's charges and what GHI allows exceeds \$4,000 you may apply for the DEA catastrophic benefit.

For catastrophic medical expenses after your G.H.I. basic refund, the DEA requires an out-of-pocket deductible of \$4,000 per family per calendar year. When G.H.I. original Explanation of Benefit (EOB) statements are submitted to the DEA reflecting the deductible, we will refund \$3,000 of the \$4,000 deductible. All covered expenses i.e., those claims in which GHI has made some level of payment, after the deductible will be processed at a 100% reimbursement level not to exceed \$250,000 lifetime per family. This catastrophic medical benefit applies only to members enrolled in the GHI-CBP program offered through the City of New York Health Benefits office.

There is an additional benefit under the DEA Catastrophic Benefit Program for Retired Members who do not qualify for the Catastrophic benefit described above.

For members who have out of pocket expenses ranging between \$2,000 and \$4,000 in a calendar year, the DEA Health Benefits Fund will reimburse you the amount between \$2,000 and \$4,000. GHI Explanation of Benefits (EOB) statements will be required for submission to the DEA in order to obtain reimbursement. City Coverage for Medicare-Eligible Retirees

In order to maintain maximum health benefits, it is essential that you join Medicare Part A (Hospital Insurance) and Part B (Medical Insurance) at your local Social Security Office as soon as you are eligible. If you do not join Medicare, you will lose whatever benefits Medicare would have provided.

Medicare Enrollment

You must notify the Health Benefits Program in writing immediately upon receipt of your, or your dependent's, Medicare card by completing the Medicare Part B Reimbursement Application: https://www1.nyc.gov/assets/olr/downloads/pdf/health/med-b-application.pdf

For retirees 65 and older Social Security has sent the IRMA letters indicating your Medicare part B deductions for 2019. When you receive your Medicare reimbursement check in the spring of 2020 you submit that letter, a copy of the 1099 from Social Security and the reimbursement form for any addition money that was withheld. You are also reimbursed for your spouse's Medicare deductions. If you have not filed in the past you can go back and file for up to 3 past years.

Medicare Part B Reimbursement

The City will reimburse retirees and their eligible dependents for Medicare Part B premiums paid, excluding any penalties. You must be receiving a City pension check and be enrolled as the contract holder for City health benefits in order to receive reimbursement for Part B premiums.

For most retirees, the refund is issued automatically by the Health Benefits Program. If you are currently receiving your pension check through Electronic Fund Transfer (EFT) or direct deposit, your reimbursement will be deposited directly into your bank account. This will be separate from your pension payment. If you don't have EFT or direct deposit, you will receive a check in the mail in June.

The reimbursement amount is based on the standard Medicare Part B premiums. If your Medicare Part B reimbursement amount was less than what you paid in Medicare Part B premiums, excluding penalties, you may be eligible for a Medicare Part B Differential reimbursement. To receive the differential reimbursement, please complete the Medicare Part B Differential Request form (below).

If you were eligible for Medicare Part B Reimbursement for prior years but did not enroll by providing a copy of your Medicare card, reimbursement is limited to the previous three (3) calendar years. To enroll, please complete the Medicare Part B Reimbursement Program Application.

2019 Medicare Part B Premium Reimbursement ANSWERS TO FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

The standard reimbursement amount for Calendar Year 2019 is \$109.00 per person, per month. For those newly enrolled in Medicare in 2019, currently, the standard amount is \$135.50. The reimbursements will be issued in Apr.. If you are currently receiving your pension check through Electronic Fund Transfer (EFT) or direct deposit, your Medicare Part B reimbursement will be deposited directly into your bank account. This will be a separate payment from your pension payment. If you don't have EFT or direct deposit, you will receive a check in the mail in Apr..

Question: How do I enroll for the Medicare Part B reimbursement?

Answer: Complete the Medicare Part B Reimbursement Program Application and return it with a copy of your Medicare card to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit.

Question: I am a City retiree. Is my spouse/domestic partner/Medicare-eligible dependent entitled to the Medicare Part B reimbursement?

Answer: Yes. They are eligible if they are covered under your City health plan and enrolled in Medicare Part B Reimbursement and the health plan has the dependent in Medicare status. Complete the Medicare Part B Reimbursement Program Application and return it with a copy of their Medicare card to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit.

Question: I received the standard premium amount of \$109.00 per month for 2019 for the Medicare Part B reimbursement. However, I paid more than the standard amount. Can I be reimbursed for the difference?



Answer: Yes. If your 2019 monthly Medicare Part B premium was between \$110.00 and \$135.50, you may be eligible for an additional reimbursement amount referred to as a differential payment. In order to receive the differential payment, the retiree and/or dependent must submit a copy of proof of this additional payment (for example, the Form SSA-1099, bank statements, CMS-500 Notice of Medicare Payment Due) to our office for review. If approved, you will receive the differential payment during the first quarter of 2021. For further information and to download the Medicare Part B Differential Request form, visit our website at nyc.gov/hbp.

If, however, you are enrolled in Medicare Part B as of 2016, you should have received reimbursement of \$135.50 per month automatically and no action will be required on your part.

Question: Many people received their reimbursement and I didn't get mine yet. What should I do?

Answer: Medicare reimbursements were deposited directly into the same account that you use for your pension payment. Please check your bank statement.

Question: I don't have direct deposit for my pension payment and still have not received my Medicare reimbursement. What should I do? Answer: You should write to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit. Please include your name, retiree spouse's name (if applicable) retiree's Social Security number, agency from which the retiree retired, current address, telephone number, and a copy of your Medicare card/ your spouse's Medicare card (if applicable). This review process may take up to 8 weeks from receipt of the above information. Question: The reimbursement I received is not the correct amount. What should I do?

Answer: You should write to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit. Include your name, Social Security number, current address and telephone number, and a copy of your Medicare card. State the reason you believe the amount is incorrect. This process may take up to 8 weeks from receipt of the information.

Question: The check that I received is torn/ripped and the bank will not cash it. What should I do?

Answer: You should return the check to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit. Include your name and Social Security number. It may take up to 8 weeks for a replacement check to be issued.

Question: I am the retiree and received a reimbursement for my spouse/domestic partner/Medicare- eligible dependent who died during the reimbursement year. What should I do?

Answer: Contact the Health Benefits Program in writing. Include both the retiree's and deceased individual's name, both Social Security numbers, address, phone number and a copy of the death certificate. Mail the information to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit.

Question: My spouse/dependent was a City retiree who died before the reimbursements were issued. How do I claim the reimbursement?

Answer: You should write to the address listed above, Attention: Medicare Unit. Include the retiree's name and Social Security number, your name, your address, phone number and a copy of the death certificate. Upon receipt of the death certificate, we will contact you if further documentation is required.

Question: Do I have to re-enroll every year for the Medicare Part B Reimbursement?

Answer: No, but if you change your address, or if one of the eligible Medicare Part B recipients dies, you must notify the Health Benefits Program, in writing.

Question: What if my bank account information changes?

Answer: Please notify your pension system directly of any bank account changes. The changes will be automatically used for the Medicare Part B reimbursements.

Question: I paid more than the standard premium for Medicare Part B. Am I entitled to the higher premium reimbursement (IRMAA)?

Answer: You may be entitled to the higher reimbursement through Income Related Monthly Adjustment Amount (IRMAA). Vist our website at nyc.gov/hbp for further information.

IRMAA Medicare Part B Reimbursement

If you paid more than the standard monthly reimbursement rate for Medicare Part B, as an Income Related Monthly Adjustment Amount (IRMAA), you may be eligible for additional reimbursement. If you submit the required documentation for Medicare Part B IRMAA reimbursement, your reimbursement will be deposited directly into your bank account.

THE DO'S AND DON'TS OF CARRYING A CONCEALED HANDGUN IN NC

- 1. Your permit to carry a concealed handgun must be carried along with valid identification whenever the handgun is being carried concealed.
- 2. When approached or addressed by any officer, you must disclose the fact that you have a valid concealed handgun permit and inform the officer that you are in possession of a concealed handgun. You should not attempt to draw or display either your weapon or your permit to the officer unless and until he/she directs you to do so. Your hands are to be kept in plain view and you are not to make any sudden movements.
- 3. At the request of any law enforcement officer, you must display both the permit and valid identification.
- 4. You may not, with or without a permit, carry a concealed weapon while consuming alcohol or while alcohol or any substance, controlled or otherwise, is in your blood unless the substance was obtained legally and taken in therapeutically appropriate amounts.
- 5. You must notify the Sheriff who issued the permit of any address change within thirty (30) days of the change of address.
- 6. If a permit is lost or destroyed, you must notify the sheriff who issued the permit and you may receive a duplicate permit by submitting a notarized statement to that effect along with the required fee. Do not carry a handgun without it.
- 7. Even with a permit, you may not carry a concealed handgun in the following areas: a) Any law enforcement or correctional facility; b) Any space occupied by state or federal employees; c) Any premises where the carrying of a concealed handgun is prohibited by the posting of a statement by the controller of the premises; d) Public educational property, however, a permittee may secure a handgun in a locked vehicle; e) Areas of assemblies or demonstrations; f) State occupied property; g) Any state or federal courthouse; h) Any area prohibited by federal law; i) Any local government building if the local government had adopted an ordinance and posted signs prohibiting the carrying of concealed weapons. 8. If you are in a vehicle and stopped by a law enforcement officer, you should put both hands on the steering wheel, announce you are in possession of a concealed handgun and state where you have it concealed, and that you are in possession of a permit. Do not remove your hands from the wheel until instructed to do so by the officer.

IF A MEMBER DIES - INFORMATION TO THE SURVIVING SPOUSE OR FAMILY

(Hopefully Not Needed For A Long Time)

Too often spouses and families are left in a quandary upon the death of a loved one. Few situations in life are more stressful than when a spouse passes. All too often we have a difficult time focusing on the issues at hand and need guidance to get the deceased affairs in order. The following is a general guide for the widow(er) or the decease's family regarding important notifications that must be made by the surviving spouse and information you should have on hand when a retiree dies.

I. PREPARATIONS BEFOREHAND

- GATHER ASSETS This doesn't mean piling them all together. It means getting a list of all the assets at the time of the
 decedent's death, along with copies of statements, deeds, etc. This information is needed for probate. It's also essential
 for filing federal and state estate tax returns, if required.
- REVIEW IRAs If the surviving spouse is the beneficiary, decide whether to roll an IRA over to the surviving spouse.
- GET GOOD ADVICE and get it now. The money you pay to attorneys and other advisers to resolve issues NOW can be much lower than if you deal with problems AFTER a person's death.
- In case of couples, usually most of the property is held in joint names and the survivor obtains same "by operation of law". However, there may be some items which were held in the name of the deceased only, and in that case it would be necessary to go to Probate Court to transfer ownership of that property, unless listed in a trust.
- GET ORGANIZED NOW When someone dies, one of the big problems for beneficiaries is locating the things necessary
 to settle the estate. Make sure you know before the death occurs where to find the following documents and information. (This is just a partial list)
 - 1. Will
 - 2. Living Will
 - 3. Trust
 - 4. Deeds (if any).
 - 5. Safe-deposit boxes (location of boxes, contents and keys).
 - 6. Life insurance policies.
 - 7. Funeral and burial instructions.
 - 8. Names and addresses of creditors and debtors.
 - 9. List of assets and where they are located.
 - 10. List of all advisers (attorney, accountant, insurance agent, stockbroker, etc.).

II. STEPS TO BE TAKEN AFTER DEATH - Notifications to be made:

- 5. Contact Fraternal Organizations to arrange for visitors, Color Guard and possible insurance benefits.

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- 6. If a veteran, notify the Veterans Administration at (800) 827-1000 for: Grave marker, Funeral Allowance and Flag (Funeral Director will usually do this for you). If can't find discharge papers or DD 214, you will need date of Enlistment, date of Discharge, Branch & Serial Number. If deceased had 100% disability for 10 years, spouse is entitled to an additional benefit.
- 7. Notify your Church or Temple for announcements. (Funeral Director will usually do this for you).
- 8. Health Insurance: COBRA (Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1985) COBRA has a safety net. If spouse or dependent was covered under deceased's health plan they may continue coverage under COBRA for up to 36 months. New York State in 2001 amended the Administrative Code to continue Health Care Coverage for Surviving Spouses for Life (Download Information Regarding this Amendment). This enables the deceased's spouse and/or dependents to receive coverage at the group rate. The City and the Line Organization health benefits stop at the death of the members. The rate, though high, is cheaper than the non group rate.

THIS INFORMATION PERTAINS TO COBRA

Police Officers & Firefighter surviving spouses are to follow this procedure

Attach a machine copy of the death certificate to a request for an application for COBRA FOR LIFE and send it to:

Retired Employees Benefits Section Att: Linda Harris (Cobra for Life) 40 – Rector Street – 3rd Floor New York, NY 10006

They will send the surviving spouse a <u>pre-numbered application</u> allowing the spouse to continue the health coverage the member had at a cost equal to 102% of what the City pays, which includes administrative fees. This is fairly reasonable. <u>Applying for this must be done within 30 days.</u> Benefits are retroactive if the surviving spouse requires medical attention during this interim period.

At this time if a member and spouse are of Medicare age, and reside in an area covered by Aetna, I would strongly recommend they choose that plan over GHI/EBC/CBP.

Also, they would need to consider the respective union plans as those plans would only be available for 36 months, and whether the health plan rider would be a better choice.

THINGS YOU WILL NEED

DEATH CERTIFICATES - Death Certificates are necessary in every step to the successful administration of a decedent's estate. (Usually Funeral will obtain certificates as part of his service at current cost). They are usually needed for:

Pension Bureau

Veterans Administration (if a veteran)

Motor Vehicle Bureau if auto was in deceased's name. 1 for each insurance policy.

Court (If probate is needed).

Your State Department of Revenue to obtain non-tax certificate if real property is involved.

Bank accounts held in Trust for another 1 for each account if property held in a Trust.

Personal Records.

Note: If estate is probated, some of the above will take a Letter Testamentary instead of a Death Certificate.

MARRIAGE CERTIFICATE (With Official Raised Seal):

Social Security, (not necessary if surviving spouse already receiving benefits)

Veterans Administration, if a veteran.

LETTERS TESTAMENTARY or LETTERS OF ADMINISTRATION:

Motor Vehicle Bureau, if auto is in the deceased's name.

One for each bank account

Brokerage house account (share of stock or bonds, etc. that were in the deceased's name alone)

DISCHARGE PAPERS: DD 214 - (Original needed)

Social Security, if spouse was not already receiving benefits. Remember that service time counts toward qualification. They will Photostat.

Veterans Administration, if a veteran

PAID FUNERAL BILLS:

1 copy for Pension Bureau

1 copy for Probate Court

1 copy for IRS, if taxable estate.

OTHER THINGS THAT MAY APPLY (usually after burial)

Cancel any leases. (If your parent or loved one rented a home, cancel the lease after clearing out the furnishings) Inform insurance companies.

File life insurance claims for any policies on the person's life, and request that the insurers send you Form 712, Life Insurance Statement (this is a statement about the life insurance that must be filed with the estate tax return).

Make sure the car insurance company continues to cover the person's car until it's sold or transferred to a beneficiary.

Make sure the homeowners policy continues to provide adequate coverage for the person's things until removed from the home.

Notify companies the person did business with.

Cancel credit cards, and close charge accounts.

Have airlines to transfer frequent-flier miles to the primary beneficiary. (Each airline has different policy concerning this issue. Check with carrier about rules)

Consideration should also be given to making pre-death funeral arrangements. This provision, no matter how painful, should be discussed by couples and by parents with their families. Too often, spouse and children spend much too much money on a funeral and do so without really knowing what were the deceased's wishes in this regard (Place of burial, Cremation, etc.)

Consideration should also be given to having a "Family Durable Power of Attorney" (Someone to take over your finances if you become incapacitated or incompetent)

There are no words of comfort at such a difficult time, however, if you have all the necessary information at the ready it will expedite any claim that is pending, make the process run smoothly, and your stress level can be minimized.

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


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





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
